Flour Stocks Below Normal. The seriousness of the situation was the food administration that existing flour stocks are only 29 per cent of the normal quantity needed until July 1. Food Administration officials thought the department's estimate of 180,000,000,000 hushels of wheat in elevators and on farms March I was optimistic and said their best information was that 125,000,000 bushels was the greatest

amount that could be expected.


