DEMOCRAT NAMES PLEDGE

Formal Announcement Sent to Secretary of State Says Candidate Will Uphold Administration and Help Develop Oregon.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, March 28.—Judge Will R. King, of Oregon, chief counsel for the Reclamation Service, today formally announced his candidacy for the United States Senate. He is after the Democratic nomination. The formal announcement occasioned no surprise, as it long has been known that Judge King contemplated entering the contest for the long term, beginning March 4, 1919. Judge King's formal announcement, sent today to Ben Olcott, secretary of state, reads as follows:

To Ben W. Olcott, Secretary of State of the State of Oregon, and to the Members of the Democratic Party and the Editors of the State of Oregon:

I, Will R. King, residing during the term of my Federal official work at Highgate and the streets, Washington, D. C., but my permanent residence, domestic and social address is in Oregon. I am a duly registered member of the Democratic Party. I am nominated for the office of United States Senator in Congress at the primary election to be held in the State of Oregon the 17th day of May, 1918. I will accept the nomination for the term of the above-mentioned office, known as the "long term" of six years, in June, March 4, 1919, and will not withdraw, and if I am elected I will qualify as such.

If I am not nominated, I will not accept the nomination or endorsement of any party other than the one in which I am registered.

I am nominated and elected, I will, during my term of office, unreservedly support President Wilson's war aims and the Administration in the reconstruction, industry after war for a greater democracy, industrially and politically. An for development of Oregon's untapped resources, the promotion of human and property rights, human rights first, for the best in the world for the boys in the trenches, and for the peace and all for the redemption of all and peace and progress for all and for good peace and progress for all.

NON-PARTISANS OPPOSED

Wasco Farmers Want Nothing to Do With Organization.

DUFUR, Or., March 28.—(Special.)—The Wasco County Farmers' Union, at its meeting here today, went on record as unalterably opposed to the Non-Partisan League and to its entrance into this state by adopting a resolution disavowing any connection with the league and affirming confidence in the present form of state government. The meeting of the county farmers' union was well attended, every local union in the county except one being represented.

News, Brewer and Baldwin, of the United States Department of Labor, were present and each addressed the meeting on the labor situation and told of the means being taken to supply the necessary harvest help.

Crater Snow Ten Feet Deep.

KLAMATH FALLS, Or., March 28.—(Special.)—A total depth of snow of seven feet at headquarters camp and about 10 feet at the rim of Crater Lake is reported by H. E. Momyer, assistant superintendent, who came down last night for a short time after several weeks' solitary vigil keeping up the records and attending to Government routine duty.

Body Found in River.

ASTORIA, Or., March 28.—(Special.)—The body of an unidentified man was found floating in Young's River, opposite Greenwood Cemetery, this afternoon. The body was evidently that of a longer and had been in the water about a month. Nothing was found to lead to the identity and no one has been reported as missing.

Candy Conceals Liquor.

ASTORIA, Or., March 28.—(Special.)—The fifth case of "candy" comprising the consignment recently shipped from San Francisco to the S. & M. Candy Company, arrived on the steamer Beaver and was seized by the Federal authorities today. Like each of the other four cases, this one contained a 19-gallon keg of Robin Hood whisky.

Bay Rum Seized.

ASTORIA, Or., March 28.—(Special.)—Acting under instructions from the Treasury Department, Chief Grant this morning seized four cases of bay rum which arrived on the steamer Beaver from San Francisco for the Red Cross Drug Company. The consignment is being held to await orders from the Federal District Attorney's office.

Newberg People Give Freely.

NEWBERG, Or., March 28.—(Special.)—During the week 10 big boxes of clothing and shoes were collected for the Belgians through the local chapter of the Red Cross. The clothing was sent to Portland in one of the transfer company's trucks.

Cottage Grove Plant Enlarged.

COTTAGE GROVE, Or., March 28.—(Special.)—Machinery arrived this week for the Cottage Grove Electric Company, which, when installed, will more than double the present capacity of the plant.

BIG GATHERING ASSURED

NORTHWEST EDUCATORS TO MEET AT SPOKANE WEDNESDAY.

Convention of Inland Empire Teachers' Association Promises to Be Best in Its History.

SPOKANE, Wash., March 28.—(Special.)—Reservations by more than 600 teachers from cities and towns in Washington, Oregon, Idaho and Montana have already been made at local hotels, and before the opening of the Inland Empire teachers' convention, next Wednesday, this number is expected to be three times as large. At the Davenport Hotel this morning between 300 and 400 reservations had been made by out-of-town teachers, while practically all of the other leading hotels reported reservations numbering from 10 to 50.

"The approaching session of the Inland Empire Teachers' Association promises to be the greatest meeting of the educators ever held in the Northwest," said James A. Burk, secretary. "Never before have there been so many expressions of interest from every class of school people in the territory represented by the association."

TEUTON'S TALK OFFENDS

GERMAN ARRESTED AT ILWACO ON DISLOYALTY CHARGE.

Vigilance Squad Visits Every House in Town and Demands Oath of Allegiance From All.

ILWACO, Wash., March 28.—(Special.)—Carl Mattick, a German, was arrested here today by Deputy Sheriff Farmer, at the instance of the Federal authorities, and is confined at Fort Canby, charged with making seditious statements. Mattick has been under suspicion for months and since the big German drive a few days ago has been unusually outspoken. He has been in the United States eight years.

Several Finnish Socialists are under surveillance and arrests may be made at any time. Yesterday members of the vigilance squad visited every house in town and demanded that every one sign an oath of allegiance to the Constitution. Several refused, but were finally convinced that the squad meant business and before 9 o'clock this morning, the specified time, every one of the Socialists had signed the declaration. Tuesday, Patriotic day in Ilwaco, all of these people, as well as other citizens, will be asked to salute the flag publicly.

28 TRUE BILLS RETURNED

Grand Jury Finds Eight Not True Bills and Calls 156 Witnesses.

John Storms and Elmer Green were indicted on a charge of appropriating an automobile, in the final report of the grand jury as submitted yesterday.

FRED STADTER IS NAMED

Successor to Prosecutor Deich in Municipal Court Appointed.

Fred Stadter is to take the place of Richard Deich as prosecutor for the city in the Municipal Court. Announcement to this effect was made yesterday by Mayor Baker. Mr. Deich has been appointed chief of the state police force.

This makes one vacancy in the city's legal department. Mayor Baker said last night that he has a man selected for the position, but is not ready yet to make public his name.

Aberdeen Invites Governor.

ABERDEEN, Wash., March 28.—(Special.)—An invitation has been mailed Governor Ernest Lister asking him to review the Aberdeen High School Cadets on May 15, at which time the students will hold their military maneuvers.

Big Tractor Moves House.

KELSO, Wash., March 28.—(Special.)—Coville County's new 10-ton tractor, which was delivered at Castle Rock the first of the week, demonstrated its power almost immediately.
