CHICAGO, April 5.-Federal Judge Lindis tonight dismissed the entire Landla tonight dismissed the entire venire in the trial of 112 L. W. W. charged with violating the esplonage set, after a number of prospective jurers had testified that they had been approached by agents of the organization relative to their views on Social-lem and the L. W. W.

OMAHA, Neb., April 6.—George Ka-pinski, Socialist candidate for City Commissioner, was arrested by Federal agents today on charges of violating the espionage act.

Seditions Talk Alleged.

Seditious Talk Albeged.

Kapinski, it is charged, at a Socialist meeting several days ago, upposed a resolution asking the Socialists to so on record as favoring the war. The resolution was defeated, mainly through Kapinski's talk, it is charged.

The trial was postponed until a week from next Monday and another panel of 180 reniremen called for that time. The climax of a week of legal debate over the selection of jurors came when George F. Vanderveet, counsel for the stefense, suddenly arose and asked that the first four jurors accepted by both

the first four jurous accepted by both sides be aworn in.

Charles F. Clyne, District Attorney, who had some time previously asked that the jurous be aworn, immediately asked the court to dismiss the 12 men in the box and the 100 awaiting experience.

"Four of these jurors have testified "Four of these jurors have testified that they were approached, directly or indirectly, and asked whether they sympathized with the Socialist party or the I. W. Just before the election last week," Mr. Clyne said. "I now ask an adjournment until Monday so that the Government may conduct an investigation. We will show that every venireman summoned was approached immediately after the names were drawn from the bex."

Vanderveer Admits Charge.

Mr. Vanderveer made a statement to the court in which he admitted that the organization had made an attempt to ascertain the views of veniremen. but denied that there was any inten-

ion of influencing their views.

"We were in trouble and we turned to our nearest friends, the Socialists," he said. "We prepared maps and divided the district into sections and it was no secret that several hundred workers looked up the records of the veniremen.

"If some of these fooligh friends be-

"If some of these foolish friends became too active it was not at our direction. I take exception to Mr. Clyne's statements that we were violating the law and attempting to corrupt jurors."
"If I had some so far outside the law as Mr. Vanderveer has in permitting tampering with jurors, I would resign from the bar," Mr. Clyne said. "Wives of veniremen have even been approached by these agents and some became so frightened they asked for protection, declaring they feared they were tection, declaring they feared they were being taken for spies."



Yankees Kill Large Number of Enemy and Take Two of Boches Prisoner.

ASSAILANTS BEAT RETREAT

U. S. Corporal Cracks Huge German Wearing Iron Cross Over Head With Rifle, Then Drags Him to Trench by His Throat.

WITH THE AMERICAN ARMY IN FRANCE, April 6.—(By the Associated Press.)—The Germans attempted a raid this morning on the American positions northwest of Toul, after a violent artillery preparation. They were driven on by the American artillery and machine gun fire and suffered comparatively heavy casualties, leaving two prisoners in the hands of the Americans.

From the German point of view, the raid was a complete fallure, as not a single American was captured.

As soon as the German barrage fire lifted, the American outposts saw the enemy infantry advancing and called for a counter barrage, which fell within two minutes just in front of the enemy. WITH THE AMERICAN ARMY IN
