Entire Venire Dismissed at Chicago in Trial of 112 Persons.

OMAHA SOCIALIST JAILED

Candidate for City Office Accused of Violating Espionage Act; Swiss Government Inquires Into Detention of Dr. Muck.

CHICAGO, April 6.—Federal Judge Landis tonight dismissed the entire venire in the trial of 112 I. W. W. charged with violating the espionage laws...

OMAHA, Neb., April 6.—George Kapinski, Socialist candidate for City Commissioner, was arrested by Federal agents today on charges of violating the espionage act.

Seditious Talk Alleged. Kapinski, it is charged, at a Socialist meeting several days ago, opposed a resolution asking the Socialists to go on record as favoring the war.

The trial was postponed until a week from next Monday and another panel of 100 veniremen called for that time. The climax of a week of legal debate over the selection of jurors came when George F. Vanderveer, counsel for the defense, suddenly arose and asked that the first four jurors accepted by both sides be sworn in.

Charles F. Cline, District Attorney, who had come here previously asked that the jurors be sworn, immediately asked the court to dismiss the 12 men in the box and the 100 awaiting examination.

"Four of these jurors have testified that they were approached, directly or indirectly, and asked whether they sympathized with the Socialist party or the I. W. W. just before the election last week," Mr. Cline said. "I now ask an adjournment until Monday so that the Government may conduct an investigation. We will show that every venireman summoned was approached immediately after the names were drawn from the box."

Vanderveer Admits Charge. Mr. Vanderveer made a statement to the court in which he admitted that the organization had made an attempt to ascertain the views of veniremen, but denied that there was any intention of influencing their views.

"We were in trouble and we turned to our nearest friends, the Socialists," he said. "We prepared maps and divided the district into sections and it was no secret that several hundred workers looked up the records of the veniremen."

"If some of these foolish friends became too active it was not at our direction. I take exception to Mr. Cline's statements that we were violating the law and attempting to corrupt jurors."

"If I had gone so far outside the law as Mr. Vanderveer has admitted tampering with jurors, I would resign from the bar," Mr. Cline said. "Wives of veniremen have even been approached by agents and some became so frightened they asked for protection, declaring they feared they were being taken for spies."

WASHINGTON, April 6.—The Swiss government, through Minister Sulzer, today inquired of the State Department the American Government's reasons for internment of Dr. Karl Muck, who is technically a Swiss citizen, though a German citizen by naturalization.

Dr. Muck, formerly leader of the Boston Symphony Orchestra, is classed as an enemy alien. He was arrested in Boston two weeks ago.

Citizenship Claim Weak. Dr. Muck bases his claim to Swiss citizenship on the fact that when he was 8 years of age his father, who was a native of Bavaria, obtained naturalization papers in the canton of Zug, Switzerland. The Department of Justice claims that Muck made no profession of Swiss citizenship, however, until recently.

SACRAMENTO, Cal., April 6.—An indictment charging five alleged Industrial Workers of the World with a conspiracy to hamper the Government in its prosecution of the war and to encourage a campaign of treason and sabotage was returned today by the United States grand jury here. Three of the five men are in custody.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., April 6.—Governor Lowden today ordered Adjutant-General Dickson to take whatever measures are necessary to maintain order and to suppress sedition at the Socialist meeting in Wicker Park Hall, Chicago, tomorrow night.

BUTTE, Mont., April 6.—Claude Hudspeth and H. P. Lucas were arrested today charged with violation of the sedition law passed by the last session of the Legislature.

Hudspeth is alleged to have bragged that he was an Industrial Worker of the World. He tore up an American flag and threw it into the face of a soldier of the Fourteenth United States Infantry when ordered to move on.

U. S. Corporal Cracks Huge German Wearing Iron Cross Over Head With Rifle, Then Drags Him to Trench by His Throat.

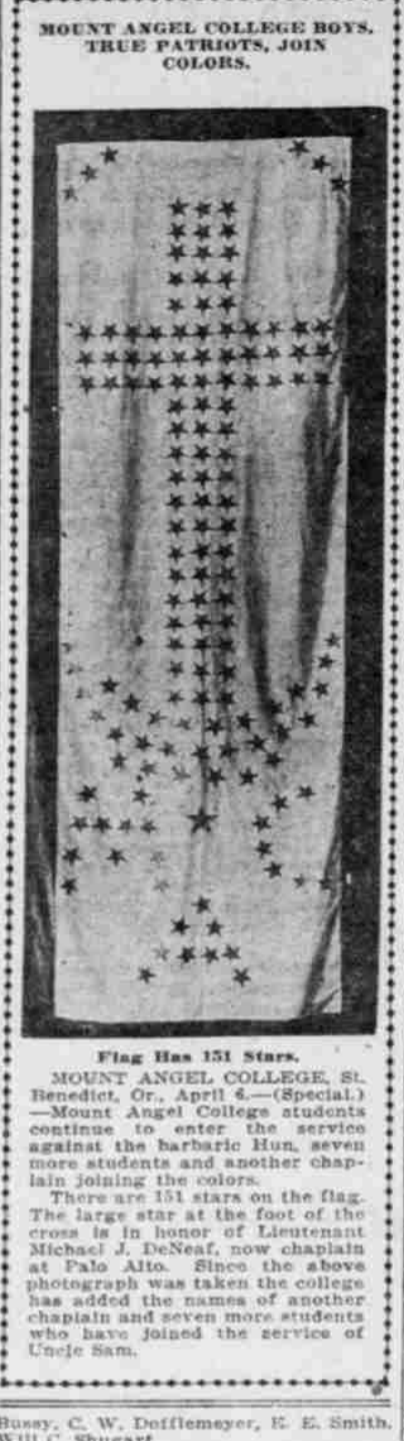

T.R.'S WORD QUESTIONED CRITICISM OF SEDITION BILL HELD TO BE 'FALSE STATEMENT'

Overman, in Course of Senate Debate, Suggests That Roosevelt Make Apology.

WASHINGTON, April 6.—The charge that Theodore Roosevelt had made "a false statement" in declaring the sedition bill punishing disloyal utterances would prohibit criticism of the President, was made by Senator Overman, of North Carolina, today when debate was resumed on the measure.

Senator Overman said Mr. Roosevelt probably was misinformed, but he declared he should correct his statement and "apologize" to the public.

Defending Colonel Roosevelt, Senators Lodge, of Massachusetts; Borah, of Idaho; Kellogg, of Minnesota, and other Republicans, said he probably was misled by press reports and admitted that no provision of the bill would penalize criticism of the President.

"If Mr. Roosevelt has courage and love of truth," said Senator Overman, "he will apologize to the people of the United States."

Reverting to Colonel Roosevelt's statement, Senator Smoot, of Utah, Republican, retorted that the Associated Press, on April 2, sent out the report on which Mr. Roosevelt based his criticism.

"I find it was sent by the Associated Press and given them by someone—a clerk—of the judiciary committee," said Senator Smoot, "and I am sure regarding Colonel Roosevelt applies to the Associated Press or any other newspaper publishing this," retorted Senator Overman.

"The language used by the Associated Press is exactly the language in the bill, as reported to the Senate, except for the words 'the President of the United States,'" replied Senator Smoot.

Senator Overman said the committee's chief clerk denied giving out the language.

Suggesting that Senator Overman had been "trapped" by the Associated Press, Senator Kellogg, of Minnesota, said: "It is surprising that this created no sensation until Colonel Roosevelt wrote about it."

The words "the President of the United States" appeared in the draft given to the Associated Press, but did not appear when the measure was printed for consideration. Apparently they had been eliminated.
