Another bout on the card that is attracting a good deal of interest and speculation among the fans is the match between Larry Madden and Jack Clifford.

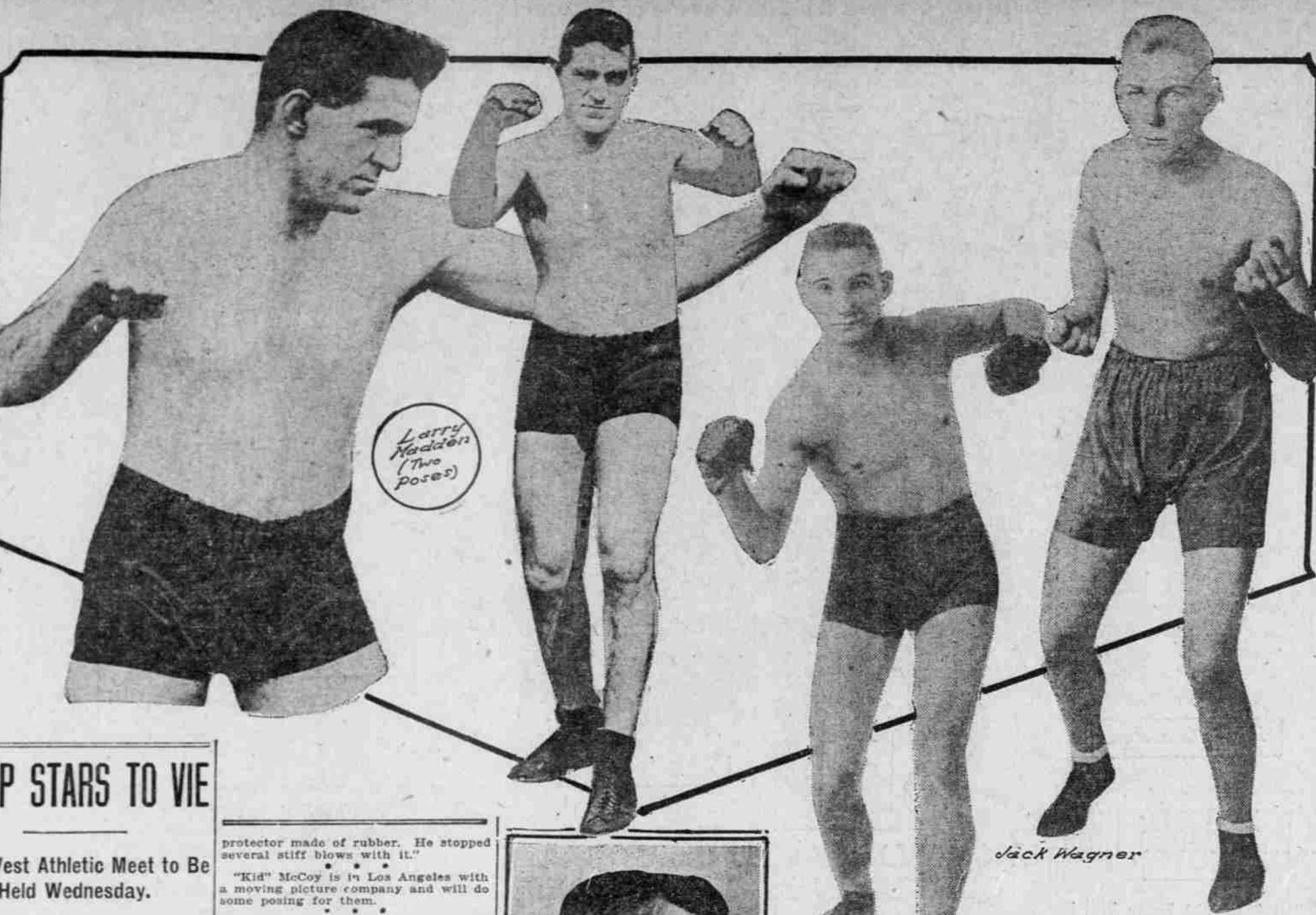
Madden is being backed by a syndicate of Portland portmen who think he is a comer, and they look for him to trim Clifford without much trouble.
