

## SPOKANE RESISTS GOVERNOR'S OFFER

Martial Law Held Necessary  
If Mr. Lister Desires to  
Control City Forces.

### MAYOR FASSETT EMPHATIC

Official Says City Will Be Able to  
Control I. W. W. Situation as  
Well as Governor Unless Mil-  
itary Rules Are Invoked.

SPOKANE, Wash., April 6.—(Special.)—Governor Lister must declare martial law in Spokane city and county if he expects to have the city police and county sheriff obey his orders on the industrial workers of the world situation. He cannot have control of Spokane police agencies under any other terms than martial law.

This was made certain this afternoon when the attitude of the City Commissioners, voiced by Mayor Fassett, was ascertained.

Mayor Fassett said:

"Governor Lister cannot take charge of our police department without declaring martial law. This he has hoped is unnecessary, and it was for this reason that the city officials decided to proceed under their local police powers.

"So far as the Governor's contention that the petition for state aid must be countermanded by all the officials who signed the original petition is concerned, I believe this is absurd. Our action of yesterday, in my opinion, is sufficient notice of our withdrawal of application for Lister's assistance.

"I believe with the efforts we have already put under way, we will be able to handle the situation just as well as the Governor can if he proposes to use only the police and sheriff's forces. What we wanted was general action.

"If there is anything Governor Lister can do to supplement what we have already done and are prepared to continue to do in the full exercise of our police powers, why, let him go to it."

This was the content of Commissioner of Public Safety Tillyer.

"We have never been given any further official information as to what the Governor's plans are. So far as I was able to discern the idea was to do nothing else than to give local relief to a serious situation, which we could do under our own police powers, instead of handing the matter as a state-wide proposition, as was the desire, I believe, of every official who signed the petition in question."

### WRIT REALLY MARTIAL LAW

Governor to Take Charge of Sheriff  
and Police Forces in Spokane.

OLYMPIA, Wash., April 6.—(Special.)—Spokane city and county will be under state police power Monday with Governor Lister personally in charge unless either the Governor or Spokane officials recede from positions taken today. Governor Lister this forenoon signed and issued the writ asserting state authority over county and city. Enforcement of its summary directions now awaits only the Governor's order to the Adjutant-General.

Although not specifically so designated, the writ amounts to a declaration of martial law so far as police supervision is involved. Suspension of civil administration is not contemplated in the present plan. It provides for the Governor's taking charge of Sheriff and police forces instead of using state troops, but it is understood that the latter will be promptly supplied if needed and that the state secret service will not remain idle.

The present situation has developed from action taken by the Spokane authorities last Monday, when Governor Lister was summoned there and notified in a written declaration signed by city and county officials that a crisis existed in the I. W. W. situation which demanded military intervention. This they invoked through the Governor's constitutional and statutory authority, as the petition read.

In later discussion of what happened Governor Lister pointed out that he expressed doubt of the situation being so serious and asked further consideration of the petition. As it was still sustained in the particular that local authorities were unable to furnish adequate protection, the Governor formally announced that he would undertake to police both city and county by state authority and returned to Olympia to set the machinery in motion.

The next day Mayor C. M. Fassett, W. H. McVey, chairman of the County Commissioners, and Sheriff G. L. Reid, who had signed the original petition, wired objections to turning their police powers over to the Governor, saying they would handle the situation themselves. They protested that they had meant to ask only that troops be sent to Spokane to close up the I. W. W. hall as they did in Portland, and that they added that the local authorities were seriously handicapped by lack of a law against criminal syndicalism, an act which Governor Lister vetoed in 1917.

In reply Governor Lister declared that these statements did not change the situation, as it had been urged upon him and the state that the city would not be recalled unless every city and county official who signed the first petition for state aid should sign another, assuming full responsibility for anything that might happen thereafter. Spokane officials did not comply with this condition, but they immediately raised the I. W. W. hall and made numerous arrests. Governor Lister today said that this did not alter the state's position, and proceeded with his preparations.

It was also stated that after troops sent to Spokane, several months ago, were withdrawn to war duty, the city authorities permitted the I. W. W. headquarters to be built and occupied without once disturbed them. This centered around Empire agitation in Spokane and aroused the resentment of tributary mill and camp towns to the extent, it is said, that a general boycott was about to be declared on the larger city. It is understood that the Governor has lost confidence in the ability of Spokane forces permanently to remedy this condition, and intends to make a thorough renovation if state power is exerted.

### Sartain's Painting Loaned.

The new loan to the permanent gallery at the Museum of Art, Sartain's beautiful painting, "The Aqueduct Builders," is now hung. There is also shown in the room of the Japanese prints an extensive and curious Chinese carving in camphorwood, decorated with gilt and colors. In the studios there may be seen today a display of Indian and Pacific island baskets and fiber. The regular sessions of the Art School begin on Monday after the Spring vacation. The regular hours of the museum are: 9 to 5 o'clock weekdays, 2 to 5 Sundays, free the afternoon of Sunday, Tuesday, Thursday, Friday and Saturday.

## 80 ASPIRANTS FILE

Ninety-nine Offices Open to  
Primary Candidates.

### THREE OUT FOR GOVERNOR

Time in Which Candidates May File  
Formal Declarations for Office  
as Primary Election Expires  
Next Friday.

SALEM, Or., April 6.—(Special.)—With 49 offices to fill and only six days left in which candidates for the primaries in May may file their declarations of intention, only a few more than 80 filings had been received by the legislative offices no filings have been received.

For the office of Governor but three of the five candidates have filed their official declarations, while two of the Senatorial candidates are still missing. The next few days, it is expected, a heavy list will be received from various parts of the state.

## PATRIOTS PLEDGE MILLIONS FOR WAR

Enthusiastic Response Made  
by American Public to the  
Third Liberty Loan.

### MANY QUOTAS EXCEEDED

Over 200 Communities Reported to  
Have Gained Place on Honor  
Roll by Reason of Over-  
subscriptions.

WASHINGTON, April 6.—This was a day of enthusiastic patriotic celebrations, backed up by subscriptions to Government bonds of the third liberty loan.

Throughout the United States communities observed the anniversary of the Nation's entrance into the war and gave material evidence of their support by pledging millions of dollars to insure successful conclusion of the struggle against Germany.

While public meetings were in progress in nearly every city telegrams were pouring into liberty loan headquarters at the Treasury telling of towns that had exceeded their quotas in the first day of the four weeks' campaign, or even within the first hour. More than 150 had reported when the headquarters closed tonight, and more still were coming in.

Sioux City, Ia., and Lynn, Mass., were the largest cities exceeding their allotments and thereby winning the right to fly the honor flag of the third liberty loan.

The fact that most others were small towns prompted announcement by the treasury that their aggregate subscriptions "were infinitesimal" compared with the \$3,000,000,000 campaign goal, and that today's reports should not be conducive to undue optimism regarding the final result.

It was impossible tonight even to estimate the day's subscriptions, since workers in most cities reported they were too busy celebrating to tabulate their pledges.

Strong Appeals Made.

Millions of persons today heard pleas for financial assistance of the war from speakers of National prominence. President Wilson at Baltimore tonight; Vice-President Marshall at St. Louis; Secretary McAdoo at Philadelphia, and Secretary Daniels at Cleveland, led the battalion of speakers.

All next week the campaign will continue intensive, with the well-organized committees in each state, county and town working systematically to gather in the subscriptions.

Officials tonight estimated that more than 200 communities had placed themselves on the honor roll today by over-subscriptions.

The South made a particularly good showing today, so far as reports from small towns were concerned, and this placed emphasis on the fact that efforts have been made to gather big subscriptions in the South.

San Francisco reported tonight that many small towns on the Pacific Coast had over subscribed without giving their names.

New York reported that Far Hills, N. J., had subscribed its quota of \$11,700 ten times.

Even one small town in Alaska, Petersburg, came through late today with announcement that it had filled its quota.

Film Stars Enlisted.

The National capital had four moving picture stars—Mary Pickford, Marie Dressler, Douglas Fairbanks and Charles Chaplin—to lead its celebration of the loan opening. After meeting President Wilson at the White House, they started on a round-up of pledges. The movie stars later led a parade of soldiers and civilians down Pennsylvania avenue to the White House ellipse, where a great throng scrambled to subscribe and get the autographs of the screen actors. The quartette will leave tomorrow separately for speaking tours of the country.

By Monday or Tuesday campaign headquarters expects to have precise reports from every Federal Reserve district and to be able to mark the daily harvest of the Nation's war credit drive.

### RETURNS ARE HEAVY IN EAST

New York Federal Reserve District  
Reports \$102,000,000 Subscribed.

NEW YORK, April 6.—Subscriptions of \$102,000,000 were reported to the liberty loan committee of the New York Federal Reserve District for the first day of the campaign, later the third loan. Official subscriptions received at the Federal Reserve Bank amounted to \$74,000,000. The returns exceeded those for the first day in the preceding loans.

CHICAGO, April 6.—The first bond application received by the liberty loan committee was from the mother of Captain Harry McHenry, of Des Moines, recently killed in action in France.

Sioux City, Ia., won the distinction today of being awarded the first service flag given to cities in the Seventh Federal Reserve District for reaching its allotment of the third liberty loan, having taken subscriptions for \$2,652,100 before noon today as against its quota of \$2,400,000.
