

OLD SUFFRAGES PRIMARY BALLOTS

Secretary of State Forwards Complete Lists to Various County Clerks.

NAMES ON BALLOT ROTATE

Order to Be Arranged to Avoid Giving Alphabetical Preference. Few Democrats Out for Legislative Offices.

SALEM, Or., April 20.—(Special).—Certification of the primary ballots for both the Republican and Democratic primaries to be held May 17 was made by Secretary Oloft by registered mail to the various County Clerks today.

The order that the names appear on the ballot as sent out to the County Clerks will not be adhered to, as under the law whenever two or more persons are candidates for the same office, the names on the ballot will rotate to avoid giving an alphabetical preference. Under the 1917 act all the names in any one precinct will be identical by the same order, but that names will be rotated among the various precincts so as to have each name appear at the head of the list when possible.

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240 MEN EXPECTED

Men From Various Camps Are Coming to Corvallis.

COLLEGE WILL TRAIN BOYS

Special Work for Military Service Is Arranged—Arrangements Are Made to Provide Quarters for Soldiers.

ORIGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, April 20.—(Special).—An assignment of 240 men from various military camps of the country at O. A. C. for training in technical work, will begin May 15.

The college has been designated as one of the land-grant institutions to train men in specialized work for military service. E. H. Shepherd, assistant director of vocational education for the War Department committee for the Northwest states, with President W. J. Kerr, his associate, and other officials, decided last night that the college could accommodate this group of men, and plans were at once put on foot to carry out the plan.

Regular Army officers will be in charge of the men, and F. H. Shepherd will direct the training. Arrangements are being made to provide quarters for the soldiers. The training will extend over two months and will be, for the greater part, shop and laboratory work, with some class recitation and instruction. Mr. Shepherd stated at the conference that the Government has need of 12-235 men within the next two months, and the men who will be trained at O. A. C. will be included in this group. One hundred will be taught auto trades, including gas engine repairing and auto driving; 40 will be in the blacksmithing department; 60 will be taught army carpentry and construction foremen.

RATE INCREASE DENIED

BURNS LIGHT & POWER COMPANY'S PETITION TURNED DOWN.

Concern Is Sharply Criticized by Service Commission for Alleged

Law Methods.

SALEM, Or., April 20.—(Special).—The Public Service Commission today denied an application from the Electric Light & Power Company of Burns for an increase in rates, and in so doing sharply criticized the company for alleged law methods.

The commission states that in its opinion "the market for electric energy in Burns will probably be higher today than those now in effect and under conditions of adequate service and careful management, a return more reasonable in proportion to the investment necessary for such service than is now received."

The commission declares that the patrons of the company display utter lack of confidence in the devices used for the measurement of the energy consumed and that the management does not by its proposed increase in rates keep itself sufficiently informed as to the accuracy of this equipment.

"In these and other respects," asserts the order, "the business methods of this company are lax to such an extent as to eliminate the possibility of co-operation with the public."

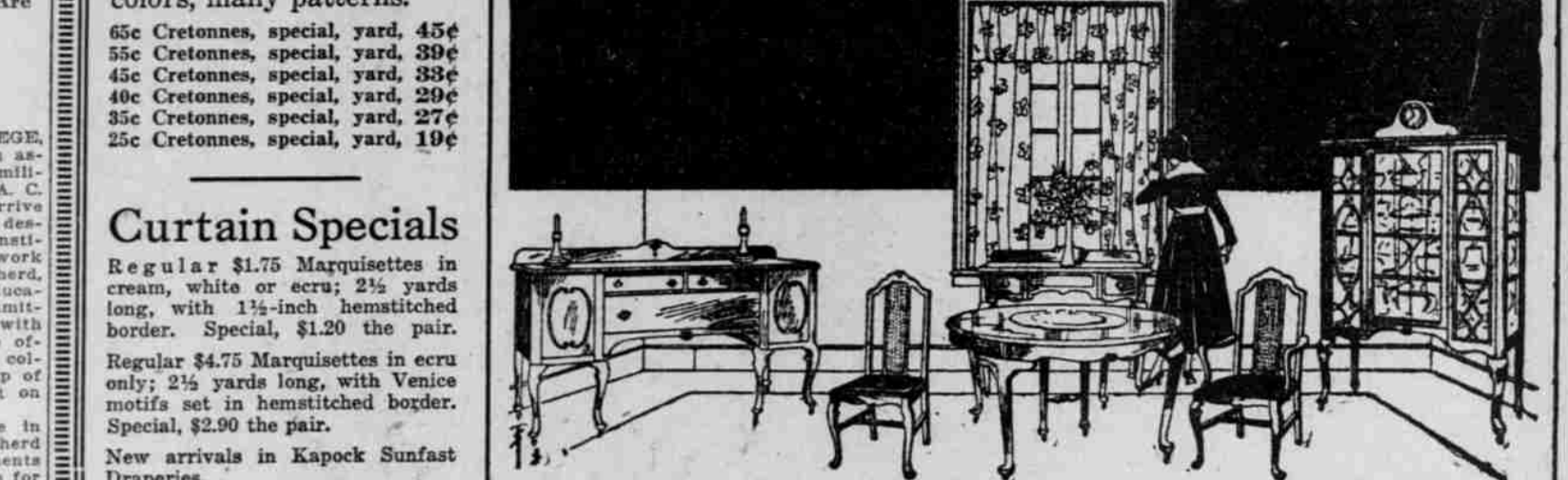

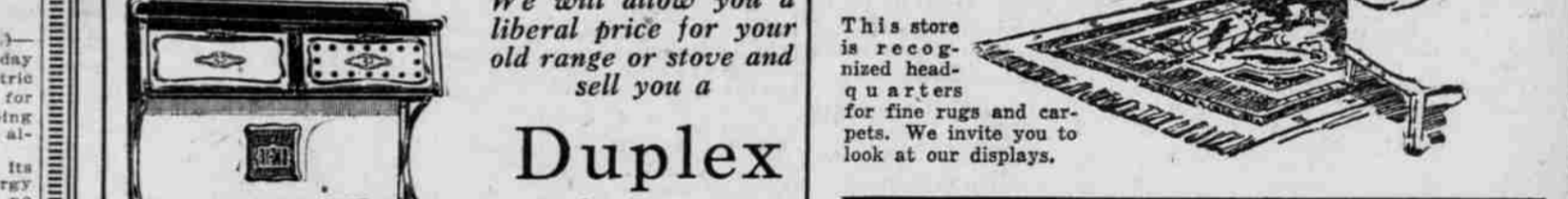

YANKEE APPETITES GOOD. American Soldiers Consume Average of 4.5 Pounds Daily. WASHINGTON, April 20.—The American soldier consumes four and one-half pounds of foodstuffs daily, according to a statement made yesterday by the Quartermaster's department of the Army. To feed a million and a half men it is necessary to obtain 1,500,000 pounds of beef, 225,000 pounds of pork, 135,000 pounds of ham, 135,000 cans of tomatoes, 225,000 cans of jam and 3000 bottles of tomato catsup, aggregating some 6,750,000 pounds. Every pound passed for consumption of the Nation's fighting men, the statement said, is subjected to the most rigid inspection.

FRENCH TO IGNORE HOLIDAY

Because of Drive Work Will Go On Same as Ever on May 1.

WASHINGTON, April 20.—Because of the German drive on the western front work in France will not be interrupted on May 1, according to an official dispatch today from France. The committee of the General Federation of Labor, the dispatch said, will recommend to the trades unions that there be no stopping of work, as is customary on May day.

DEPUTY MARSHAL SENT

FEDERAL OFFICIALS TAKE COGNIZANCE OF ROGUE RIVER FURS.

Threat of Fishermen to Destroy Nets of Those Who Are Satisfied With Price Paid to Be Investigated. Federal officials yesterday intervened in the trouble threatened by fishermen operating on the Lower Rogue River in Curry County. In response to instructions from Washington, United States Marshal Alexander sent Deputy Marshal Mass to Curry County in the hope of reconciling the dissatisfied fishermen and, in any event, protecting property that has been threatened. Reports first reached Federal Food Administrator Alexander that some of the fishermen were dissatisfied with the price of 7 cents a pound that had been paid for chinook salmon and had refused to fish and deliver their catch to the canneries. Mr. Ayer was later advised that the dissatisfied fishermen were threatening to destroy the gear and equipment of those who were fishing and seriously interfere with the industry. Based on this information, Mr. Ayer referred the matter to the food administration at Washington, which presented the entire situation to the Attorney-General, who yesterday notified United States Attorney Haney to direct Marshal Alexander to send an officer to Curry County and, if possible, avert any trouble.
