

TWO ACCUSED OF SPYING ARRESTED

One Prisoner Said to Admit Sending of U. S. Transport Data to Berlin.

MEN CAUGHT AT NEW YORK

Allen Teachers in Oakland, Cal., Schools to Be Dismissed—Home of German at Butte Found Stocked With Explosives.

NEW YORK, April 20.—On instructions from the Department of Justice in Washington, two Germans suspected of furnishing Germany with information relating to the departure of American troop transports for France, were arrested today by Federal Marshal Powers, of Brooklyn.

The men were described as August Herlich, aged 35, and Theodore H. Martens, 27, both of New York. According to a confession which Herlich is alleged to have made, he gathered data about troop movements for Berlin, who, it is declared, claimed to be in direct communication with Berlin.

ST. PAUL, Minn., April 20.—A. C. Townley, of St. Paul, president of the National Non-Partisan League, today telegraphed Senator George E. Chamberlain at Washington, taking issue with testimony which J. E. Nease, of Minneapolis, gave yesterday before the Senate military affairs committee.

Disloyalty Charge Denied. Townley's dispatch stated statistics showing the loyalty of Judge Mackey's charges that disloyalty is rife in Minnesota.

Townley declared that "farmers of Minnesota have increased their wheat acreage approximately 40 per cent, although they could have made more money at present prices by growing corn, rye or barley."

ELLSWORTH, Kan., April 20.—Joseph L. Bristow, former United States Senator from Kansas and now candidate for the Republican nomination for the same office, who was denied a hearing here last night, on either war or political topics, because it was said his public utterances on these subjects do not conform to views held by Ellsworth citizens, was unable to obtain a hall in Kansasopolis earlier in the day.

Mr. Bristow did speak in the City Council chambers at Wilson, however. It was reported here tonight.

CHICAGO, April 20.—After three preliminary challenges had been used during the day, George F. Vanderveer, of counsel for more than 100 witnesses, today charged violation of the espionage law, late today tendered the jury to the Government.

Frank Nebeker, government prosecutor, had just begun his examination of the veniremen at adjournment.

Ex-Chicagoan Governor of Siberia. A. Stroller Toblison, formerly a Chicago attorney, is now Governor of Siberia, according to a letter from him received today by Valdimir Loeffler, one of the defendants. Toblison left Chicago for Russia last Fall.

OAKLAND, Cal., April 20.—While five Oakland high school teachers are facing Federal investigation, the result of charges of pro-German utterances, five more holders of alien registration cards are to be summarily dismissed from the school department as a result of the present anti-foreigner campaign. The charges were not known until they registered as enemy aliens.

BUTTE, Mont., April 20.—Louis Neunthal, a native born German, was arrested in a raid on his home today in which a large quantity of dynamite, six boxes of caps and more than 1000 feet of fuses were found.

Federal Action Awaited. Chief of Police Murphy has placed a close guard over the prisoner and he is being held for the Federal authorities.

LINCOLN, Neb., April 20.—Five persons alleged to have made remarks tending to obstruct recruiting were convicted in Federal District Court here this week on charges of violating the espionage act.

HELENA, Mont., April 20.—Payne Templeton, president of the Montana Public Forum, has appealed to Governor S. V. Stewart to protect that body from the activities of the local defense society, which, it is stated, is not the officially accredited county council of defense, but a separate organization.

Governor Stewart has referred the matter to the County Council of Defense, of Montana County—Sid J. Coffey, Herbert McLeod and Stanley Seacore, asking it to investigate and report.

Non-Partisan League Harred. The trouble started when the defense society declared it would not allow E. B. Martin, a Non-Partisan League organizer, to speak before the Forum Sunday and ordered the latter body to hold further meetings during the duration of the war.

Templeton says the Montana Public Forum is composed of representative people, including the president of the state university, three of the university professors and the president of the Chamber of Commerce.

Unmarried Women May Be Drafted.

LONDON, April 20.—Sir William James Bull has given notice that he will submit to the House of Commons a resolution to extend a military service act to all unmarried women between the ages of 19 and 30 for work of national importance. Sir William is Unionist member for Hammersmith.

HOUSE ACTION UNSETTLING

BOYS TO AID FARMERS

LADS ENLIST TO HELP HARVEST CROPS THROUGHOUT OREGON. About 2000 Loganberry Pickers Will Be Needed This Year Near Salem. Other Help Also in Demand.

To handle the 1918 crops of Oregon, including hay, grain, fruits and berries, farmers must be helped. The shortage of farm labor is said to be acute. The United States Boy Working Reserve, it is expected, will prove a big factor in relieving the situation, for several thousand boys who are now enlisted will be available. This year there will be needed in the vicinity of Salem about 2000 loganberry pickers. Other parts of the Willamette Valley will take as many more. From 1200 to 1500 strawberry pickers will be needed at Hood River and about 500 cherry pickers will be needed at The Dalles and vicinity. Up to the present time the Federal Labor Bureau, 247 Davis street, has been able to supply about 75 per cent of all calls for farm help. The wage in the wheat-growing district is \$6 a month and board, and higher salaries are paid elsewhere.

RAILROAD SAVING BEGINS

Schedule of Six Trains Daily to Puget Sound Recommended.

Traffic and operating officials of the Northwest railroads will meet again at Seattle tomorrow. It is expected passenger train service between Portland and Puget Sound will be simplified by a schedule of six trains daily. This has been recommended and awaits only the sanction of Regional Director Alington. It is proposed that all trains be run on a seven-hour schedule and that tickets be interchangeable.

Passenger officials will meet in Seattle tomorrow to consider central locations for general ticket offices in Portland, Seattle, Tacoma and Spokane. After May 1 separate ticket offices will be abolished.
