WASHINGTON, April 27.—The casualty list today contained 163 names, divided as follows:

Killed in action, 11; died of accident, four; died of disease, one; wounded severely, 47; wounded slightly, 27; missing in action, two.

Twelve officers are named. Lieutenants John B. Arnett and Charles R. Long were killed in action; Lieutenants Thomas J. Mooney and Charles E. Williams died of accident; Captain John T. English and Lieutenants Clement A. Fogarty, Richard R. Farling and Harvey C. Updegrave were severely wounded; Lieutenants William F. Andrews, Howard I. Demio and Samuel A. Tyler were slightly wounded.

HOLLAND APPEASES GERMANY IN PART

Questions of Customs and Use of Limburg Railway Are Settled Satisfactorily.

RHINE TRAFFIC BAN VEXES

Tentious Also Express Dissatisfaction Over United States' Seizure of Dutch Ships—Feeling at The Hague Depressed.

LONDON, April 27.—Dispatches from Holland this afternoon say that although, according to The Hague Vademecum, the questions of customs difficulties, of which Germany had complained, and the use of the Limburg Railway, which Germany demanded, have been settled in her favor.

Germany still maintains her ground on the sand and gravel question. Germany has expressed much annoyance at the stoppage by Holland of Rhine traffic and the fact that Holland negotiated with the United States regarding the seizure and concealment of these negotiations from Germany.

As a dispatch from The Hague to the Amsterdam Telegraaf, the feeling there has never been more depressed. There is an impression in some quarters that the attitude of Von Kuehlmann remains German Foreign Secretary Holland will not be pressed to the extreme.

WASHINGTON, April 27.—The German Minister for Foreign Affairs, Dr. Zimmermann, is still at The Hague and did not leave for Germany as reported. The Netherlands Legation announced today.

The legation took occasion to deny that Holland had put an embargo on the export of tin, cinchona and kapok from the Dutch East Indies, and said that the government had merely issued an order requiring that exports be licensed.

WASHINGTON, April 27.—Negotiations between the State Department and the War Trade Board with The Netherlands government regarding the monetary consideration of the amount of grain and raw materials to be allowed to go forth from Holland in return for the use of Dutch shipping seized in American ports, have reached a point where a mutually satisfactory agreement has been brought in sight.

The main concern of the officials here now is the outcome of the negotiations between Germany and Holland growing out of the new German demands, which include the right to transport across the border sand and gravel, part of which would be used for military purposes.

SHIPS TO BE BOMB-PROOF

Construction of Five Non-sinkable Steel Steamers Authorized.

NEW YORK, April 27.—Construction by the Foundation Company, of this city, at a new yard to be built near New Orleans of five non-sinkable steel cargo steamers—the first of the type to be built in the United States—was announced here today.

WASHINGTON NOT SURPRISED

Hun Hand Seen in Reported Overturn in Russia.

WASHINGTON, April 27.—Reports from Copenhagen of persistent rumors from Finland that Grand Duke Alexis Nikolaevich, son of the former Emperor of Russia, has been proclaimed Emperor of Russia, were taken here to indicate that Germany was attempting to carry through a well-formulated plan for restoring monarchy in that revolution-torn country.

While no reports of a new revolt in Petrograd have been received at the State Department, reports from Ambassador Francis at Volodga, an uprising would not cause any surprise.

Prominent Men to Speak.

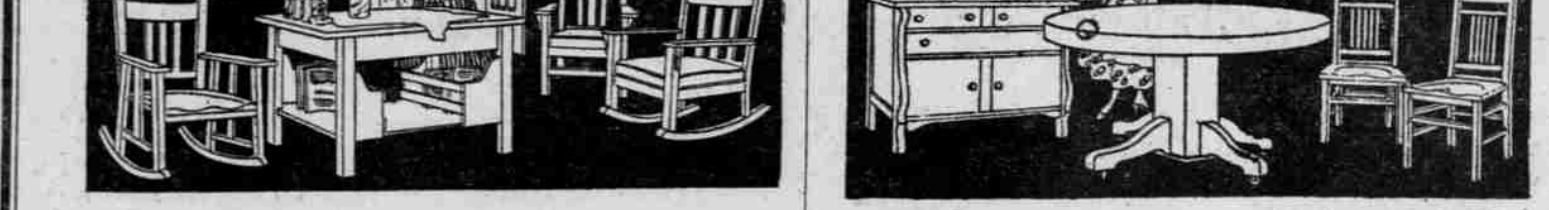

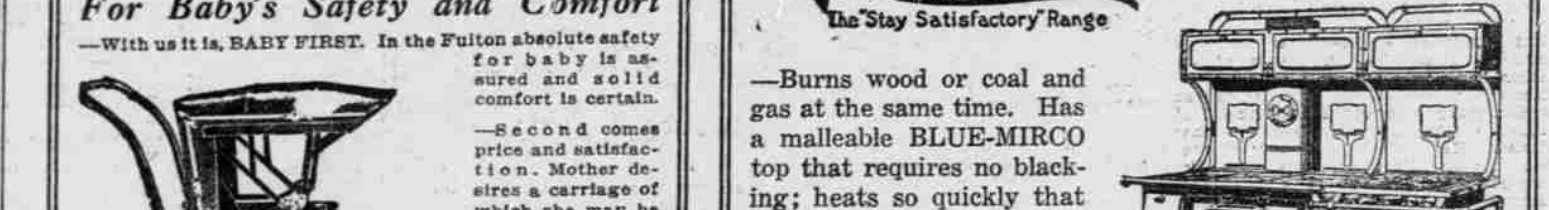

CAMP KEARNEY, San Diego, Cal., April 27.—The Browning light machine gun, with which American troops are to be equipped, today was given its first test on the range here.

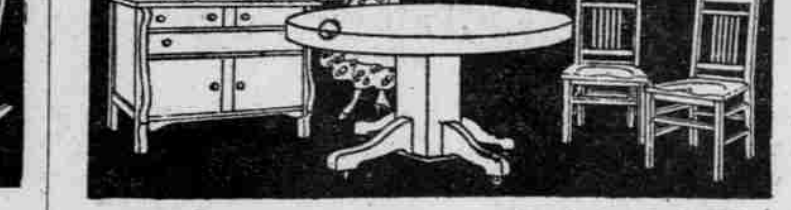
