

GERMAN ARMY MAY SEIZE RUSSIA

Country Faces Prospect of
Becoming Colony of
War Lord.

TROOPS START TO UKRAINE

Large Detachments of Bavarian
Cavalry Dispatched From Flan-
ders—German Centrists
May Split.

LONDON, May 11.—Russia has been suddenly changed the political outlook, the Petrograd correspondent of the Daily Express telegraphs. Germany, he says, has apparently found that economic domination over Russian territory is insufficient and is now seeking military occupation.

An extra session of the Bolshevik government council has been held in Petrograd to discuss the situation created by the ultimatum recently delivered by the German Ambassador, Count von Mirbach, which embodied demands of a character apparently calculated to turn Russia virtually into a German colony.

Premier Lenin's speech at this meeting was extremely pessimistic, the correspondent reports.

According to the newspaper Podnia, the question of transferring the capital to Nijni-Novgorod was broached, as was the subject of immediate military measures for the defense of Moscow against possible aerial attacks.

Ukraine Situation Grave.

The situation in Ukraine has become so disturbing that the Germans have dispatched large detachments of Bavarian cavalry from Flanders on the way to Ukraine, the correspondent of Amsterdam of the Exchange Telegraph Company reports.

Word that fighting is to be renewed in Ukraine has been received from Liege, Belgium, according to the dispatch. The Bavarian cavalry detachments are said to have arrived at that city.

The likelihood of a split in the (Bolshevik) party is being discussed in the Reichstag, of which Chancellor von Hertling is a member, is discussed in Berlin newspapers, an Amsterdam dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company reports. Discussion has arisen over the chancellor's Eastern policy. The newspapers say the anti-Hertling faction, headed by Matthias Erzberger, may be able to cause the chancellor's fall.

M. von Engel is quoted by the correspondent as reporting the situation in Petrograd still precarious owing to the scarcity and dearth of food. The Lenin government, however, is gaining in stability and power, he says, subduing the unruly elements and making an effort to reorganize the army.

The number of unemployed is great and industry is completely at a standstill.

The peasantry, who are the principal supporters of the Bolshevik government, the minister adds, are still clinging to that government for a free distribution of land, most of which in the meantime has been left uncultivated.

M. Bouichier, a French economist, who has arrived here, confirms the statements of the Minister regarding the labor situation, the correspondent adds. Bouichier claims the French traveler declares, has destroyed industrialism and disintegrated labor throughout Russia. Labor, he reports, is now gradually ranging itself against the Bolsheviks, the better elements among it becoming reactionary.

MOSCOW, Wednesday, May 9.—(By the Associated Press.)—The Germans are continuing to make arrests in Ukraine. A rigid censorship has been established by them at Kiev, but it has been learned that they have searched the residence of Professor Grouchevsky, president of the Kiev Central Rada. He escaped from the city.

They attempted to arrest Commissar Salikovsky who also escaped. A member of the Rada named Petourea was arrested but subsequently was released after protests by several local organizations.

COPENHAGEN, May 11.—General Hennenkampff, a Russian commander in the Japanese and present war, has been murdered by the Bolsheviks at Taganrog, Southern Russia, according to the Vienna correspondent of the Lokal Anzeiger of Berlin.

LOAN STILL GROWING

OREGON'S LIBERTY FUND TOTAL
JUMPS UP \$187,000.

State's Aggregate of Subscriptions to
Nation's Third Call Now Stands
at \$27,388,350.

Oregon's Liberty loan total persistently refuses to stay placed. It was necessary yesterday for the officials to mune up previous calculations by adding on the sizeable sum of \$187,000.

No one was heard to complain of the work this change involved.

Last night Oregon's aggregate of subscriptions to the third Liberty loan stood at \$27,388,350. Friday's total had been \$27,241,350.

Portland kept up right along in

\$15,000,000 in its loan achievement, stopping just \$18,150 short of that amount. It is hardly to be hoped that the little gap will be bridged, since Portland reports are supposedly complete, the workers stated. As divided between city and state, the totals of yesterday were: Portland, \$14,986,850; state, \$12,411,500.

Scattering additions to the outside-of-Portland total will still be received. It is foreseen. One bank of the state has made no report. Late subscriptions from other communities will contribute to a new total, say the tabulators.

The number of individual subscribers was increased by 474 yesterday, the total now aggregating 134,320.

IRISH WILL MAKE CONSCIENCE PLEA

Resistance to Draft Will Be
Based on Advice of Cath-
olic Bishops.

KNOTTY PROBLEM RAISED

England Has Already Recognized
Status of Objectors and None
Has Ever Been Sent to
Battlefields.

DUBLIN, May 9.—(Special.)—The first step in the resistance of the anti-conscriptors, according to reliable information, will be the claim that they are conscientious objectors.

The formal announcement for the hierarchy made by Archbishop Hartly, of Cashel, in Thurles Cathedral, was that the bishops stood ready to advise all Catholics in Ireland that it is a matter of conscience and they are not bound by conscience to obey the law.

This, it is admitted by government officials, raises a knotty problem. England has recognized the qualified legal status of conscientious objectors at home. While some had been sent to prison and many had been employed in noncombative organizations at home, none had been sent to the battlefields.

Penalty May Be Light.

Unless the government decided to ignore the contention of the bishops and thereby deny the right of bishops to instruct their congregations in these matters, the most severe penalty which can be inflicted will be a jail sentence. That will not secure men for the army.

A fine point is raised, it is understood, as to whether those in charge of the conscription machinery will accept the plea of the conscientious objector if his objection is based solely on the advice of priests.

There may be an attempt to draw a distinction between those whose conscience will not permit them to fight in any circumstances and objectors whose conscience is based on the advice of priests, and the latter may not be allowed.

Priests' Authority at Stake.

In that event the government and the hierarchy will come to a clash over a custom that has acknowledged the priests' supremacy in all matters of conscience as a privileged right.

Just how the government will meet this obstacle is not known, but in the event of allowing the objection, the necessity will be to construct new jails in Ireland, for present facilities will be inadequate. To inflict the death penalty on objectors will make it necessary for the government to amend the regulations.

DUBLIN, May 11.—Field Marshal Viscount French was sworn in today as Lord Lieutenant and Governor-General of Ireland at a meeting of the Irish Privy Council. Lieutenant-General Bryan T. Mahon handed over the sword of office, which he had held temporarily.

Edward Shortt was sworn in as chief secretary for Ireland.

Horse and man are full of ginger and nerve, alive, keen and ready. The composition is, of course, realistic and modernistic in its movement of line and in its conception, rather than monumental in accepted sense; but it is thoroughly typical and American. It is supposed to depict the figure of Captain O'Neill, of the Rough Riders regiment, commanded by Colonel Roosevelt in the war of 1898.
