

TEACHERS GIVE UP VACATIONS FOR U.S.

Portland Instructors Agree to Buck Logs or Cook for Lumbermen.

MA'AMS AND MASTERS VIE

Many Will Pack Up Army Tents and Go Into Berry Fields—Lumber Camps Appeal to Men Teachers.

Ready for rough outdoor toil, if it will serve to release fighting men for the ranks, are the members of the Portland Grade Teacher's Association and numbers of them have backed their readiness by actual enrollment for various kinds of work during the vacation period.

For work in the country, the teachers have enrolled as follows: Picking berries, 49; fruit packing, 60; cook's helper in logging camps, 15; waitresses in logging camps, 16; teamsters, three; housework on farms, four; cook on farms, nine. Twenty have enrolled for service in the lumber mills, at such tasks as grading small timbers and time-keeping.

Many to Work in City.
Thirty-eight teachers seek employment at various occupations in the city—stenography, bookkeeping, clerical work and operating elevators.

It all began at a recent meeting of the Grade Teachers' Association, when the patriotic project was broached to the accompaniment of much enthusiasm. Miss Marie Bruce, Miss Irene Rippey and Miss Julia Spooner were appointed a committee to carry out the plan.

Questionnaires were prepared, covering the field of possible employment and sent to all members of the association and a registration day was appointed. The result was that many teachers appeared at the Courthouse where the registration booth was opened and quite cheerfully pledged themselves to give up their vacations.

Teachers Await Call.

The teachers are ready for work and will answer to the employment calls for which they have enlisted. Employers seeking their services for country work should apply to J. W. Brewer, 809 Corbett building.

For general information and for the listing of applications in the city, employers should communicate with Miss Marie Bruce, chairman of the committee, at 148 East Sixteenth street South, telephone East 3280.

Mr. Brewer, in charge of farm employment, has arranged that the teachers who go to work in the berry patches shall be employed in groups and will provide them with Army tents and campaign equipment. Members of these groups will be chosen as cooks and the entire adventure will be communal.

Efforts Given Gladly.

"We are in earnest about this," said Miss Bruce, "and our efforts are made in the spirit of patriotism. Many of us will be giving up long-planned vacations—but will give them up gladly. Employers who wish our services will place us in their debt, if they communicate with Mr. Brewer or myself."

"This is but the first year. Though we are pleased with the response from our members, we feel that if the present season is a success the enlistments next year, if our services are still needed, will be far more general."

SHRINERS TO MAKE BID

PORTLAND TEMPLE WILL TRY TO BRING CONVENTION HERE.

Columbia River Salmon and Luscious Strawberries to Be Taken East to Advertise Oregon.

Five hundred pounds of fresh Columbia River Chinook salmon and a large shipment of strawberries will be transported to Philadelphia by Al Kader Temple of the Shrine, to be served as an advertisement of Oregon and Portland in the fight to be waged by Portland Shriners for the next annual session of the Imperial Council of the Shrine.

Arrangements for the fish and berries are being made by city officials, including Mayor Baker, who is one of the delegates who will lead in the fight for the naming of Portland as the next convention city.

The Oregon produce will be served at a monster banquet to be held under the auspices of Lulu Temple in Philadelphia on June 1. Shriners are to meet in Philadelphia, and after a celebration in that city will proceed to Atlantic City where the meeting of the Imperial Council will be held.

Should Portland be successful in its effort to secure the conclave, it will mean the greatest fraternal gathering congregated in Portland during its history, with the possible exception of the Elks' convention in July, 1912.

PERSIAN ART ON EXHIBITION

Museum Shows Work of Famous Middle-Ages Artists.

The new exhibition at the Museum of Arts consists mainly of examples of Persian art of the middle ages.

A beautiful set of reproductions of Persian miniatures, lent by Mrs. C. H. Wortman, with one of the original paintings lent by Mrs. Solomon Hirsch, forms the nucleus around which are grouped textiles, including three rare specimens lent by Atiyeh Bros., Persian pottery, including several from Mrs. Helen Ladd Corbett's collection, color plates of pottery lent by Mrs. W. B. Aver, an illuminated manuscript of the Koran, besides a group of Japanese water-color paintings from the William M. Ladd collection, with color plates of Japanese textiles lent by Albert E. Doyle.

There will be a gallery talk on this exhibition next Thursday. The regular hours of the Museum are, weekdays, 9 to 5 o'clock; Sundays, 2 to 5. Free on afternoons of Sunday, Tuesday, Thursday, Friday and Saturday.

GASOLINE NOT RESTRICTED

Oil Administrator Says Supply Yet Sufficient for Everybody.

WASHINGTON, May 18.—Restrictions on the consumption of gasoline by the general public are not yet considered necessary by the fuel administration. M. L. Requa, oil administrator, said today that, until the Government requirements of gasoline for aviation and military transport expand materially, no regulations will be enforced to obstruct ordinary use. He does not believe that the situation will be changed during the next few months.

New Zinc Prices Fixed.

WASHINGTON, May 18.—New zinc prices, effective for three months, were fixed today by the War Industries Board and submitted to President Wilson for approval, following a three-day conference with zinc producers. New prices on aluminum, copper and nickel will be taken up next week.

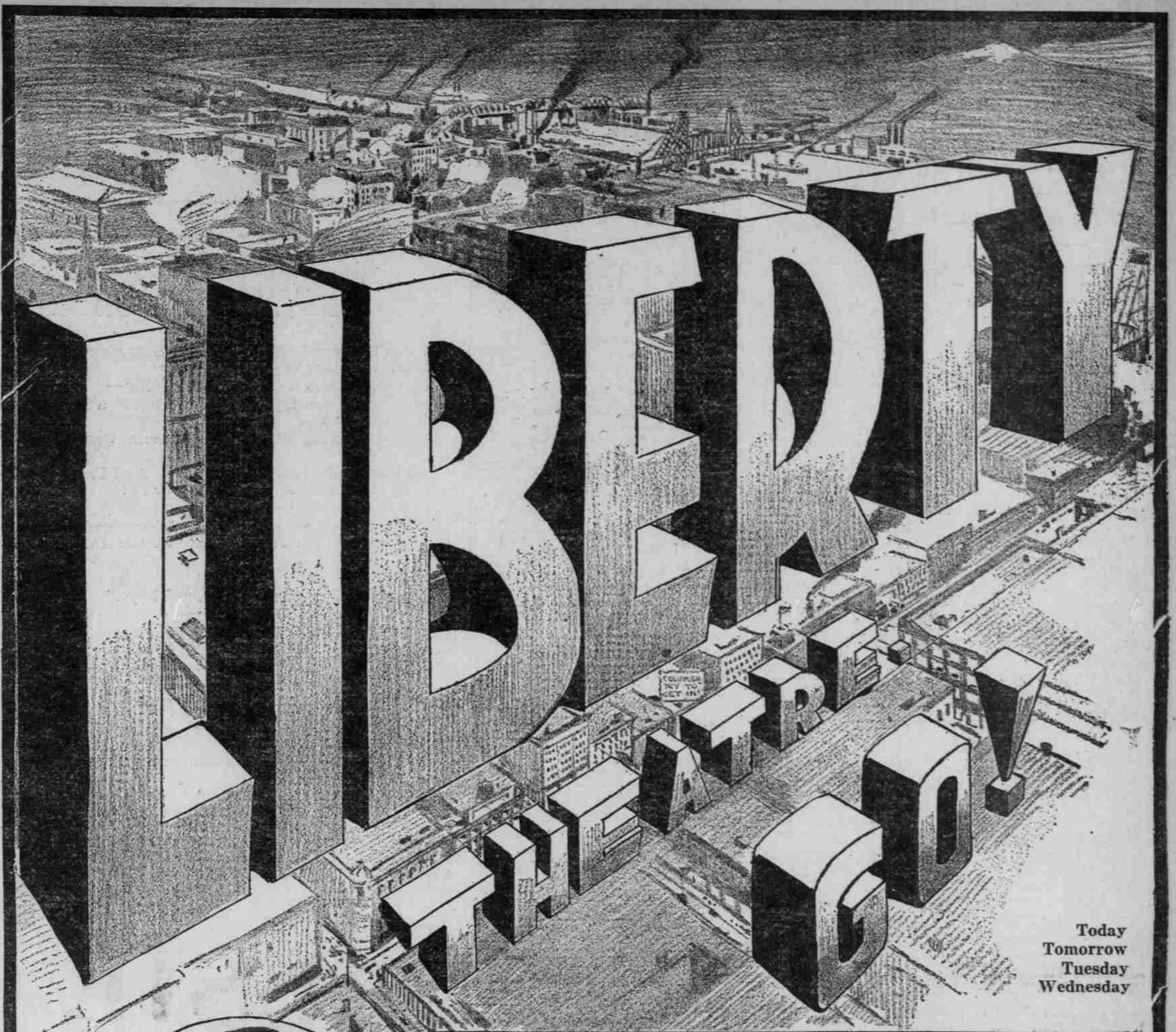
