

AMERICANS CARRY OUT SILENT RAID

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Losses in Killed and Take
German Prisoner.

RICKENBACKER AGAIN WINS

Famous Automobile Racer Brings
Down Another Boche Airman After
Thrilling Fight at Height
of More Than 20,000 Feet.

WITH THE AMERICAN ARMY IN FRANCE, May 25.—By the Associated Press.—American troops carried out a silent raid in the Picardy sector on Friday, inflicting a number of losses on the enemy in killed and brought back prisoners, according to an official statement issued by the American headquarters tonight.

WITH THE AMERICAN ARMY IN FRANCE, May 25.—By the Associated Press.—Lieutenant Edward Rickenbacker, the former automobile racer, has added another aerial victory to his record. Announcement was made today that he had been confirmed that the lieutenant shot down a German biplane in the neighborhood of Thiaucourt on May 25.

The fight took place 5500 meters in the air. With another pilot, Rickenbacker engaged in a long fight with two enemy machines. He finally got on the tail of one machine and fired at short range. The enemy machine went into a spin and crashed. Today's positive confirmation that the machine crashed to the ground was obtained.

Buford Wins Hun Plane.
Lieutenant Edward Buford, Jr., of Nashville, Tenn., today was officially credited with shooting down a German airplane over St. Mihiel on May 25.

Buford, while patrolling, encountered two German pursuit planes. He attacked one of the German planes, which tried to lead him into the fire from the other. Suddenly Buford looked overhead and saw two more Germans coming down for him. He took a dive, all of the Germans diving at the same time, and when he came straight he had one of the enemy planes in front of him. Buford began firing with his machine gun and caused his adversary to disappear in a nose dive. Although he was sure he had hit the German, it was not until today that the victory was confirmed.

In Lorraine, on May 21, a hostile airplane flying over American lines was disabled and forced to land in its own territory. There it was destroyed by American artillery fire adjusted with balloon observation.

Hun Flyers Captured.
The first victories in which the American squadron brought down two German machines were gained the day after they took up flying on the Toul sector. The occupants of the German machines were made prisoners.

Other machines aside from those in this squadron, it is permitted to mention, also are flying on the Toul front. The fact that an American squadron was there could not be mentioned previously because it was not desired that the Germans should know the fact. The Bavarian troops which have just arrived opposite the American sector northwest of Toul suffer from lack of 50 per cent of their effectiveness while engaged in the recent offensive in Northern France, according to reliable information received today. Virtually all these losses were in killed and wounded, as the Bavarians, it is declared, lost only one man taken prisoner.

Four American Army officers, heretofore reported missing, are now known to be prisoners in Germany the War Department announced today.

The officers are: Lieutenant Aviator J. J. Meredith, address not known, and Lieutenants James P. Crawford, of Warrenton, N. Y.; Louis M. Edens, Cabool, Mo., and Maurice S. Redmond, Pittsburgh, Pa. All are interned at Camp Karlsruhe.

Other enlisted men are prisoners at Camp Darmstadt. They are Corporal Patrick F. Meehan, Springfield, Mass., and Private A. Bergeron, Turners Falls, Mass.

Other enlisted men are prisoners at camps not named. They are Privates Homer Akers, Norwood, Mo.; Edward Bennett, Williamsburg, Ky.; Frank Bretschneider, Chicago, Ill.; P. Daniels, Lynn, Mass.

One private, Fred C. Hickman, of Loogootee, Ind., is interned at Camp Limberg.

The death of Second Lieutenant Kenneth Pickens Culbert, of Cranford, N. J., in an airplane accident in France, was announced by the Marine Corps today.

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., May 25.—Cadet Moultrie C. Trowbridge, 23 years old, of New York, was instantly killed by a fall of 300 feet in an airplane at Kelly Field this morning. Cadet Trowbridge, in attempting a figure eight, banked his machine in such manner as to throw it into a tail spin from which he was unable to recover. He was almost instantly killed, falling about 300 feet.

PARIS, May 25.—Two American aviators, Paul Kurtzson, of Philadelphia, and Roger Babian, who came from the Herald reports today, both had been in the American ambulance service and transferred to the American flying corps on May 25.

Kurtzson Thursday flew over the German lines and shortly afterward his machine came down in flames. Babian, who was killed Tuesday, was the wearer of a French military cross awarded for bravery while acting as an ambulance driver.

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NEW TAXES IN SIGHT

Further Revenue Legislation
at Once Seems Assured.

LEADERS READY TO ACT

Republicans on Record as Being
Ready to Co-operate Whenever
Majority Opinion Calls
for Action.

WASHINGTON, May 25.—Prospects for a postponement of revenue legislation and an early adjournment of Congress again appeared to have vanished tonight when Democratic and Republican leaders in Congress failed to agree on a program presented by President Wilson for a special session after the November elections.

The Republicans, according to Administration spokesmen, blocked the proposal by refusing to give assurances that a bill along lines proposed by the President would be passed within a definite time.

Tonight Democratic leaders prepared to go ahead with the framing of a bill. The unexpected differences between the political sections of Congress, it was explained, made it impossible for Administration leaders to give to President Wilson the assurances he desired before he would agree to postpone the legislation for a special session immediately after the November elections.

Unable to reach an agreement among themselves, Senate leaders tonight said it appeared very certain they would have to proceed immediately with the legislation. Conferees between the administration leaders were held in anticipation of beginning work soon on the bill.

Two meetings of the committee were held today in an effort to agree upon a proposal meeting the President's conditions. After the last meeting the Republicans and Democrats of the committee held separate conferences and Senator Gallinger, Republican leader, said:

"Republican senators recognize that additional revenue will be necessary in the near future and for that reason they are prepared to consider revenue legislation whenever the majority think it wise to do so and they are ready to co-operate to secure the passage of a revenue bill without unnecessary delay."

CHARGE IS PROTESTED

TEACHERS HELD BLAMELESS FOR
RECENT LEGISLATION.

William Parker Says Instructors Had
Nothing to Do With Limiting
Terms of School Heads.

A statement that the same influences that brought about the enactment of the teachers' tenure of office bill by the last Legislature also were responsible for another measure which shortened by one and two years, respectively, the terms of office of Dr. Alan Welch Smith and N. G. Pike, was protested yesterday by William Parker, principal of the Vernon School.

The teachers of Portland were in no way responsible for either the drafting or the passage of the bill limiting the term of office for School Directors," said Mr. Parker, who was chairman of the teachers' committee that presented the tenure of office bill to the Legislature.

"We do not wish to mix up in any kind of politics, and we have interested ourselves only in legislation which affects us professionally. We instigated and worked for the tenure of office act, which provides that after being employed for a two-year probationary period and re-elected in preparation for a public school, no teacher may be dismissed without having specific charges made against him or her. This bill has probably been confused with the bill providing three years' tenure of office for School Directors."
