German in Fine Fettle: The special event will find Joe Gorman, the Oakland Keg of Nails, who has had the honor of holding the featherweight championship of the Northwest for some time, fighting the semi-final with Frank Pete, the Seattle 125-pounder.

In another special bout Billy Williams, just returned from a successful trip East, will meet Stanley Willis, lightweight champion of Pennsylvania. Willis is popular with the Portland athletic followers, and in every bout here so far has always put up a good fight.

Sammy Gordon, Abe's clever young brother, with the lightning left hand will meet Joe McCarty, the tough Alameda featherweight, in the main preliminary. Sammy is expected to be the equal of his brother, Abe, and has been forging ahead with rapid stride in Northwest boxing circles.
