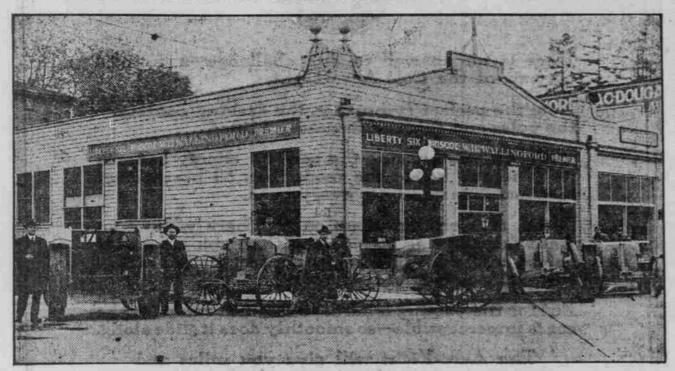

The anti-glaring headlight law of Oregon, and the even stricter Portland headlight ordinance, were not passed for the benefit of any make or makes of automobile headlight lens. They

of automobile headlight lens. They were passed to curb the growing danger from glaring headlights, and they conform to similar laws in virtually every state in the country.

To be legal in Oregon, an automobile lens advertised as eliminating glare must be able to pass an official test to prove that the claims made for it are true. Several standard makes of lens that give a good driving light without glare have passed this test.

They have the great advantage over They have the great advantage over dimmers that dimming contrivances rarely give sufficient light for safe driving and are as bad in one extreme as glaring headlights in the other. In the state of Washington the anti-

glaring headlight law is being enforced much more rigidly than in Oregon and night driving is proportionately pleas-anter and safer for the other fellow.

A. L. DENNEY DISCUSSES IMPOR-TANT ECONOMY FACTS.

Transmission Figures Prominently Cost Sheet, a Problem Solved by Sterling Manufacturers.

In discussing the economical mainte nance of a motor truck from the time of its purchase until the time of its discard, A. L. Denney, manager of the Koehring Machine Company, distributors of Sterling trucks, says: "The transmission of a motor truck is not only one of its most important parts, but figures quite prominently in the cost sheet of the truck's upkeep.

The transmission is in reality the 'speed regulator' between the power plant and tractive resistance as represented by the wheels on the ground. "In order that there may be ample

strength to resist the strain within the housing of the transmission, the driving shafts should be short and of extra
large diameter. The gears should be
stub tooth, with wide face, and the dog
clutches should be large and beveled.
"When this form of construction is
followed out, there is no grinding or
crashing noises heard so often when
the gears of a truck are shifted on the
level or on grades, and it is impossible
for the gears to strip because the gears housing of the transmission, the drivfor the gears to strip because the gears and pinions are always in mesh and the engagement made through the dog

clutch.
"In this construction, the engagement of gears is gradual and smooth. There are no jerks and no strains. 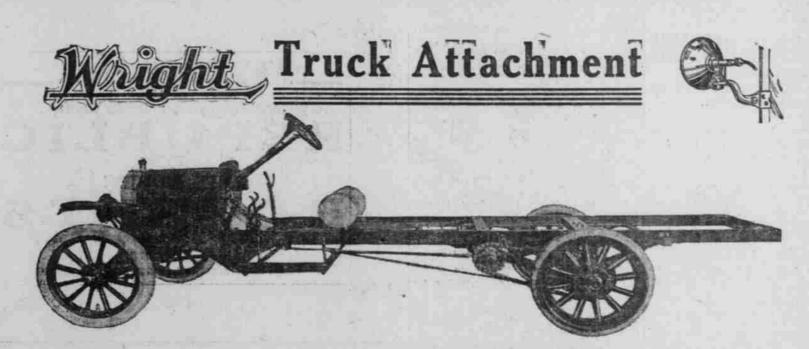
