SOLDIERS' SOCIETY TO ENTERTAIN.—The Association of the Fathers of Soldiers and Sailors will entertain on Tuesday evening at the Masonic Temple, 388 Yamhill street, for the fathers, mothers and all immediate relatives of soldiers and sailors in the service of the United States or the allies. Part of the evening's entertainment will be furnished by the Clifford Entertainment Bureau, to be followed by dancing and cards. Refreshments of ice cream and wafers will be served. Owing to food conservation the mothers will not be asked to bake cakes but will bring wafers instead. This will not only be a pleasant evening's entertainment, but will be an excellent opportunity for all war workers to become acquainted, so it is hoped that many interested relatives will be present.

TRACY CASE RELEASED.—By agreement between the City Attorney and counsel for the defendant, Circuit Judge Kavanaugh yesterday dismissed the habeas corpus proceeding brought by Charles Tracey to effect his release from the City Jail where, he alleged, he was unlawfully detained under the municipal isolation ordinance. This disposition of the case was made in consideration of the filing of a bond for \$1000 by Tracey, the condition being that he will take medical treatment prescribed by the City Health Officer and regularly report to the authorities. Counsel for Tracey, in support of their application for habeas corpus, had threatened to attack the validity of the ordinance under which Tracey was being held in jail.

MOUNT TABOR CONGREGATION PAINTS CHURCH.—The mense of the Mount Tabor Presbyterian Church, needed painting; labor was scarce and so were funds, and so during the past week the men of the congregation held a painting bee and under the leadership of a master painter put on the first coat. They donned overalls and worked with a will and the women of the church served the men with refreshments. The minister, Dr. Ward W. MacHenry, was one of the energetic painters. This morning Dr. MacHenry will preach a timely sermon on "Culture Without God Is Dangerous." The evening lecture-sermon will be on "Mesopotamia in the Present War."

EXAMINATIONS FOR LIBRARY SET.—Entrance examinations for the training class for librarians, conducted yearly by the Library Association of Portland, will be held on June 17 at the Central Library. The examinations will cover history and current events and literature and general information. Applicants must be at least 18 years of age, have high school education and should preferably be between the ages of 20 and 35. MA, PA AND KIDDIES READY TO GREET SELLS-FLOTO FAMILY

Great American Circus, Carrying 600 People and 400 Horses, Reaches Portland for Four Performances.



HAS little Tommy or little Mary been a model of childish rectitude the past week? Of course. You have probably joked about it with your wife and with the boys at the office. Remember when the slapping of long paste brushes against billboards and the spreading of the wonders of the circus started you to padding your bare feet down boyhood's straight and narrow?

If so, perhaps you will be one of the fathers we shall see this morning watching the arrival of the show trains. And, perhaps, we won't be so interested in the unloading of the big, gaudy wagons, the horses, the elephants and the glittering cages that we cannot take time to explain to little Tommy and little Mary why the ant eater eats ants and why the ostrich sticks his head into the sand and why the hippopotamus swims with its young astraddle of its neck and why the elephant has a trunk, and so on and so on. Perhaps not.

Perhaps as the huge tents are raised on the circus grounds at Twenty-fifth and Raleigh streets this morning for Monday's and Tuesday's performances, we shall be there to watch a canvas of the circus being rolled into its day of rest, a day, however, that will seem mighty busy to us. There

will be the cooking of the Sunday dinner for the Sells-Floto family of some 600 persons. There will be the feeding and grooming of 400 horses, besides ponies and burros. There will be the weekly bath for the jungle, desert and mountain beasts, and the weekly housecleaning in their cages and tank-dens. It will be a day of color and eventfulness, although to the people of the circus it is a day of rest, just as it is with us.

Then, perhaps, as the massive first band wagon with its 24 dappled horses swings out from the "lot" at 11 o'clock Monday morning and heads the parade toward the heart of the city over the usual route, we shall be standing on the curb seeing to it that little Tommy and little Mary view every bit of the glittering, beplumed and pom-pomed "march past"—from mounted bands to the lumbering files of elephants, from the snorting hippopotamus to the self-satisfied gnu, from the calliope to the

So, having gone so far, it is likely that we shall be on hand with the little folks at either the afternoon performance at 2:15 or the night show at 8:15. We will have read of the wonders of the performances, which open with "The Birth of the Rainbow," a spectacular extravaganza of colorful pageantry, employing 600 people and 400 horses.

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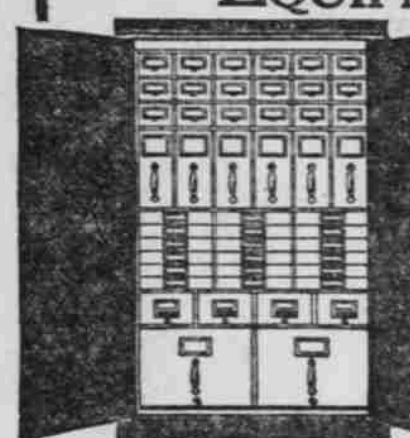
