

MR. SINNOTT LARGES LAND FOR SOLDIERS

Congress Is Informed as to What Oregon Is Doing for Irrigation.

THREE PROJECTS FINANCED

Oregon Pays \$11,000,000 Into Reclamation Fund, From Which It Has Received \$3,400,000. Letter Tells Story.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, June 22.—Representative Sinnott, of Oregon, is taking advantage of every opportunity to impress upon Congress the timely importance of speeding up the construction of irrigation projects primarily in order that suitable land may be available for soldiers who desire to follow an outdoor life after they return from Europe.

Taking advantage of the fact that the sundry civil bill carries appropriations for Government irrigation projects, Mr. Sinnott told the House what Oregon is doing on its own responsibility to further irrigation development. He emphasized the importance of some National movement which will carry this work along on a new and larger scale. He also read to the House a letter from Jay H. Upton, president of the Oregon Irrigation Congress, urging liberal expenditures for irrigation in behalf of returning soldiers.

Three Projects Financed.
Mr. Sinnott insisted that the time for investigations has passed and the time for work has arrived. Telling first that the people of Oregon are doing, he said: "The people in my state, in my district, are doing the best they can with limited means, but on account of war conditions they are unable to finance but few of these projects. They have actually gone out this year in Malheur County and sold irrigation bonds and in the same way that the Government has gone out and sold its liberty bonds, by appealing to the patriotism of the community to increase food production. On the Warm Springs project, in Malheur County, in that manner they expect to sell this summer some \$500,000 worth of bonds and have under irrigation next year over 20,000 acres of land that will produce from 30 to 50 bushels of wheat to the acre or its equivalent in other food products."

Oregon Contributes \$11,000,000.
"In the Jordan Valley, in Malheur County, we have inaugurated a project this year that will require an expenditure of \$2,000,000 and which will irrigate 40,000 acres. Last year on the Ochoco project near Prineville, in Crook County, they raised \$100,000 by a bond issue. They will have under irrigation this fall on the Ochoco project over 20,000 acres of land, which will produce from 30 to 50 bushels of wheat to the acre or its equivalent in other food products."

We are thus financing these three projects to the extent of \$3,400,000 within \$100,000 of the total received by Oregon from the reclamation fund at the end of the last fiscal year, June 30, 1917, while up to the same time Oregon has paid into the reclamation fund nearly \$11,000,000."

Dwelling on the importance of action by Congress, Representative Sinnott further remarked:

Soldiers to Take Lands.
"Secretary Lane has sent this week to the members of Congress a very appealing and eloquent letter, advocating the reduction of the arid lands in the West and the reclamation and drainage of the swamp lands in the South, for the purpose of giving them to the returning soldiers. He tells how the returning soldiers after the Civil War were easily and readily absorbed back into the civil life of the country, largely because the public lands of the West were open to homestead entry, due to the fact that the homestead law was passed in the early '50s."

"By the reclaiming of the arid lands in the West and the draining of the swamp lands in the South the same ready absorption of the soldiers can be had when they return from 'over there' and it does seem to me that this Administration ought to pay heed to the advice of Secretary Lane in his letter recently sent to the various members of Congress."

"Yearly since I have been in Congress Secretary Lane, with his broad vision and knowledge of the West and his knowledge of what can be done by the reclamation of the arid lands, has given similar advice to Congress and to his chief; but it seems that as often as he gives this advice it is ignored. His letters are pigeonholed and no action follows. The Administration does nothing to enlarge the activities of the Reclamation Service or to increase the reclamation fund."

Much Money Is Expended.
"There is carried in this bill \$100,000 for investigation in public land states and an item of \$100,000 for investigations outside the public land states."

"I think that is only a drop in the bucket. It may provide for some superficial investigations and reports, such as those from Oregon have been. We have spent \$100,000 in investigation in my own state and in my own district—\$50,000 by the General Government and \$50,000 by the state—and there has been no new reclamation work in the state since those investigations have been made. We want something more than investigations. I would like to see Congress and I would like to see the President give some attention to the repeated letters and recommendations from Secretary Lane. The Secretary is conversant with the matter, but his is the voice of one crying in the wilderness. His advice comes in here and is repeatedly ignored and pigeonholed."

Wheels of Congress Slow.
"Someone has said that some people think they pay a debt to virtue by merely praising it, and it appears that as far as this Administration is concerned it comes within that principle when reclamation is considered. They feel that they have paid all their obligations to the arid lands of the West and to the demand for reclamation when some letter is sent in like this one by Secretary Lane, letters which are pigeonholed after they come in. They praise reclamation, but that is all it ever amounts to."

"Nothing is done in a legislative way to increase, as they should increase, the activities of the Reclamation Service, either by enlarging the reclamation fund or by passing the Smith-Chamberlain bill, which is designed to enable the Government to get behind the bond issues of the various states."

enlarged the bridgehead and captured 150 prisoners and a large quantity of arms and material."

PARIS, July 22.—Fresh struggles on the Italian northeast front are foreshadowed by the bringing up of fresh reinforcements by the Austro-Hungarians, telegraphs the Milan correspondent of the Temps. German reinforcements also are said to be on the point of arriving at this front.

Renewal of Drive Seems Sure.
"It is the opinion of Italian military officials that if the lull lasts some days it is bound to recommence soon with these fresh elements."

VIENNA, via London, June 22.—Italian attacks on Montello were repulsed, according to the official report from Austrian headquarters today and which gives the number of prisoners taken by the Austrians in the present offensive as 40,000.

ITALIAN HEADQUARTERS IN NORTHERN ITALY, Friday, June 21.
(By the Associated Press.)—Cavalrymen, artillerymen and airmen are giving effective aid to the Italian infantry in driving back the Austrians toward the Piave.

Airmen Battle Food Carriers.
One of the principal activities of allied aviators, who now have been joined by American fliers, is to prevent Austrian airmen from delivering sacks of bread and other dry foods to the Austrian troops on the western side of the Piave, where the Austrians still are fighting tenaciously.

Around Montello and in the region of the Lower Piave, Italian cavalry is being used to help push the enemy back. They are aided by armored cars carrying machine guns.

The rising waters of the Piave and the activity of the Italian artillery are making for difficulty for the Austrians to obtain food. While the water carries some bridges away and damages others, the gunners are sinking boats and floating the damaged bridges and floats.

SENTIMENT FAVORS WINE

SENATORS THINK GRAPES HAVE LITTLE FOOD VALUE.

Tentative Vote Shows Small Majority of Committee Would Modify Prohibition Legislation.

WASHINGTON, June 22.—A tentative vote in the Senate agricultural committee has shown a small majority in favor of eliminating wine from any prohibition legislation which may be determined on in connection with the emergency agricultural appropriation bill.

No formal votes have been taken in the committee, and there will be none until after the hearings to be resumed next Tuesday on the Jones prohibition amendment.

It was learned today that the tentative vote on wine was taken yesterday and that a majority of the committee-men had been impressed by the argument that grapes used in the manufacture of American wines have little or no food value.

Senator Gore, chairman of the committee, said today consideration also would be given to the possible financial effect of prohibiting the withdrawal of distilled spirits in bond, and that bankers from the principal cities would be heard on that subject.

The attitude of the House on National prohibition was sounded today by a resolution of Representative Randall, of California, prohibitionist, calling on President Wilson to inform the House whether any order has been issued by the Fuel Administration curtailing the supply of coal to liquor manufacturers. It was adopted 204 to 47.

C. E. Schuster Now Lieutenant.

ALBANY, Or., June 22.—(Special.)—Rev. C. L. Schuster, pastor of the Evangelical Church, of Albany, received word yesterday that his son, C. E. Schuster, a former student of the Oregon Agricultural College, has been commissioned a Second Lieutenant in the Army.

He has been in the service several months, being first stationed at Camp Lewis, and is now at Camp Lee, Va., and that is where he has won his shoulder bars.

SIX COUPLES MISMATED

DOMINIC TERSI CHARGES WIFE WITH INFIDELITY.

A. H. Borchers Alleges Desertion and Asks for \$50 a Month for Support of Children.

Infidelity is charged against Josephine Terse in a divorce complaint filed yesterday in the Circuit Court by Dominic Terse, who seeks an absolute decree. They were married in Portland in 1913, and have two small daughters. The plaintiff wants custody of the older and is willing that his wife keep the younger child.

Simple desertion is charged by Dana Floyd in her suit against Howell W. Floyd. They were married at Seattle, May 15, 1913, and separated seven months later. Desertion is likewise charged by Maude Hays who wants a divorce from J. M. Hays, to whom she was married at Corvallis in 1912. They have one child whose custody the plaintiff asks.

Desertion is charged by A. H. Borchers in a suit against William C. Borchers. They were married at Vancouver in 1911 and have three minor children. The plaintiff asks \$50 a month for the support of the children while they remain with her. Cruelty is charged in the divorce complaint filed by Hazel Farmer against Henry Farmer. They were married at Tillamook in 1915, and have one child.

Grace La Miller charges cruelty in the complaint against Ernest La Miller. They were married in January, 1917, at Vancouver.

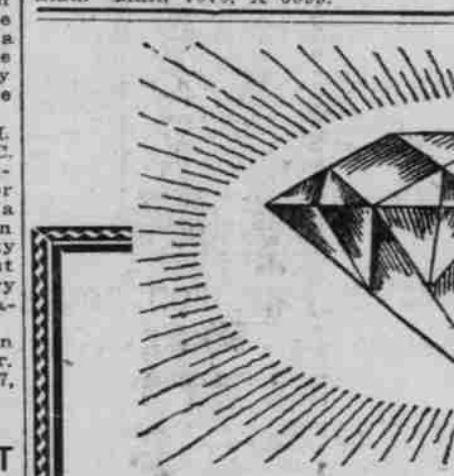

THEIR PLACE, but ethics should never be allowed to block the wheels of progress.

When prejudice gets in the way of progress it is all the worse for prejudice. It is not my purpose nor intent to defend every Dentist who advertises (although some of them sorely need it), nor is it my intent to attack the individual members of the "Ethical" Dental Society, many of whom are my personal friends, but the point I wish to make is that advertising does not make a quack out of an honest and competent Dentist; nor can the incompetent and dishonest Dentists hide the brand of quackery under the cloak of Ethics.

The Dentist who is not satisfied with his income will find the public is not satisfied with his work. Whether he be an advertiser or so ethical he leans backward, the public will measure him at his true value.

A recent article in a leading newspaper said:

"Anything the Doctors do in a mass is ethical—almost anything they do on individual responsibility is unethical. Being ethical among Doctors is about the same as being a Democrat in Texas or a Presbyterian in Scotland."

That applies equally to the Dental Profession, and emphasizes my contention that the Code of Ethics simply makes it possible for the incompetent and ignorant Dentist to charge as much for his services as the most skilled in the Profession.

Advertising places a man on his merit. It doubles the expense of conducting his business, and he must MAKE GOOD with the public or he will soon drop out of sight and be forgotten.
