

UNCLE SAM'S ARMY AND NAVY MEET EVERY REQUIREMENT OF RED-BLOODED YANKEES

Boys Working to Crush Prussian Ogre Find Worthy Service Leads to Promotion, Both Here and Abroad.

Carl Pearson, the son of Mr. and Mrs. C. O. Pearson, who are pioneer residents of Trout Lake Valley, recently received a commission as First Lieutenant in the Infantry. Lieutenant Pearson, who is a graduate of the '16 class of Washington State College, entered the officers' training camp at Camp Lewis, after having spent some time in camp, being ranked as sergeant until the time of this recent promotion. A younger brother, Oren, is also at Camp Lewis, having enrolled in the fourth officers' training school. Lieutenant Pearson is stationed at Camp Gordon, Atlanta, Ga., at present.

Ensign Allen P. Holmes enlisted last November. In the examinations, which were held at Bremerton last month, he was selected as one of the six Ensigns to be sent to the Naval Academy at Annapolis, Md., for further training. Ensign Holmes is the son of A. K. Holmes, of 636 Wilson street, and is a former student of Lincoln High School. He is 26 years of age. After enlisting in November, he was sent to Bremerton, where he later successfully passed an examination for first-class boatswain's mate. In a letter written recently to his father he states that he expects to be through with his training in three months, and will probably be assigned to one of the warships.

Herbert C. Knight, the only son of Mr. and Mrs. L. D. Knight, of this city, enlisted in the United States Navy recently, later going to the Puget Sound Navy-yard. He is the only grandson of the late Cyrus Dixon, the first white child born in Corvallis, Benton County. At the time of his enlistment he was employed by the Foundation Ship Company. For some time he was a student at Link's Business College, graduating from the Buckman School in 1915.

Kenneth de Brauwere, formerly in the employ of the O.-W. R. & N. Company, is now in the service of the Government in the position of Second Quartermaster on the U. S. S. Harrisburg. He enlisted in the Navy last October. Young Brauwere is 19 years of age, and previous to his enlistment resided with his parents at 426 Jarrett street.

Eighteen-year-old Paul Richardson enlisted in the Coast Artillery June 8, 1918. During the past winter he was employed in the laying-out department of the Northwest Steel Company. Young Richardson is the son of Mr. and Mrs. E. C. Richardson, of 1734 Division street. Previous to his enlistment he had tried to enlist twice, but was rejected on account of defective hearing.

Two sons of Mr. and Mrs. Philip Blampied, of 506 Pike avenue, S. E., have enlisted in the service and are now in active service overseas. John H. is a sergeant in the 163d Infantry, now in France. He is a musician in the regiment band.

Edward M. Blampied is in airplane construction with the 378th Aero Squadron, now in England.

Outranking men many years his senior who were graduates in civil engineering from Harvard and Yale, and leading a class in special instruction to qualify them as inspectors of airplane manufacture, Henry W. Fish, an Albany young man, recently, after having been commissioned an Ensign in the Navy and placed in charge of a school for training inspectors in this work. News of his success was received recently by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Leon Fish, of Albany. Last August Henry Fish enlisted in the Navy as a second-class musician, later attempting to transfer into various branches of naval aviation service, but being rejected on account of lack of weight.

Later he was chosen to enter a class of men who were to take special training which would qualify them for inspectors in the manufacture of airplanes. He was the only boy selected from the North Pacific coast. Later this class was sent to the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, at Boston, where they were all disqualified with the exception of Fish, who received his commission.

Most enthusiastic over his life in the United States Navy is Fred Sanky, who enlisted April 26, 1917. First he was assigned to the U. S. S. Yorktown, later being transferred to the U. S. S. West Indian. In a letter to his mother he says: "This is by far the best ship I ever expected to be on. The officers cannot be beat. They surely are fine."

Private Clarence W. Thomas, of Battery B, 147th Field Artillery, A. E. F., sent a poem to his mother which he composed on Mothers' day. Two of the verses are quoted here:

This day is the same all over the U. S. A., And in France and England as well. Because the 12th of May is the day For all the boys to tell. Their pals to remember Mothers' day.

Oh, mother, dear mother mine, What a dandy mother you are. And even if this is only a line From your only son at war I can never forget you on Mothers' day.

Roland McBride enlisted in the Medical Corps and is stationed at Vancouver Barracks. He was graduated from the scientific course at Lincoln High School. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs.

James McBride, pioneers of this city. Mr. McBride recently received the news that his second son, Sergeant Malcolm McBride, had arrived safely in France.

In France with the camouflage section of the 49th Engineers is Raymond Hayden, who at one time was employed as special carrier in the complaint department of The Oregonian. He is the son of Mrs. E. B. Hayden and is a former student in the Y. M. C. A.

Ben Grossenbacher, for four years foreman of the bindery department of the Oregon City Enterprise, has entered the service and at present is stationed at the Benson Polytechnic School.

Grossenbacher, who is but 25 years of age, was born in Salem, Or., and has resided in Oregon City for the past 16 years. He attended the Oregon City High School, later taking a course at the Behrke-Walker Business College in this city, where he took special work in the evening, after being employed during the day learning the trade of bookbinding. He has been an active member of the Artisan Lodge of Oregon City, and was master Artisan for six months. He is at present president of the Bookbinders' Union of Portland and Oregon. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. B. J. Grossenbacher, reside in Oregon City.

Jack Cecil Kelsey, who was a seaman on the ship Rockefeller, which was torpedoed in May, was home Saturday on a furlough. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. S. R. Kelsey, of Carlton, Or.
