

IDAHOIS WORRIED BY NON-PARTISANS

Whether Openly to Oppose or Tolerate League Puzzles Politicians.

SHOWDOWN SOON ASSURED

Belief Is That Time Has Come for Two Old Parties to Make Clear to People Their Attitude Toward Organization.

BOISE, Idaho, June 22.—(Special).—There will be a showdown in Idaho politics on Tuesday of next week. It will come at the platform conventions of the Republican and Democratic parties and will be over the Non-Partisan League and its activities within the state. The two old parties will definitely determine whether to come into the open against the league or remain in passive support of it. The Non-Partisan League having decided to hold its convention July 3 and 4, in Boise, to endorse and ratify candidates, many Democrats and Republicans believe the time has come to make clear to the voters their attitude toward the league.

BOISE SCHEDULED TO HEAR NON-PARTISAN HEAD.

State Defense Council Investigates President's Record From Patriotic Standpoint.

BOISE, Idaho, June 22.—(Special).—Complaint having been made to the executive committee of the State Council of Defense regarding the prospective appearance and speaking in Boise on July 3 and 4 of A. C. Townley, president of the Non-Partisan League's National organization, it was decided yesterday to investigate the record of the league head so that the executive committee can be advised at a future date with regard to the same and be placed in a position to take any action necessary. Chairman Bryan was authorized to appoint the committee.

It also was made plain that the Non-Partisan League, as an organization and Townley, as an individual, are separate and distinct and could be considered in that light. The issue of the Non-Partisan League as an organization did not enter into the matter at all, so far as the executive committee is concerned, it was learned. It took up the matter of Townley personally. The special committee is to make its report later when it will be given consideration by the executive committee. The investigation is for the purpose of determining if Townley's past utterances have been of such a disloyal nature as to bar him, and if his appearance would create unrest in Idaho.

ST. HELENS IN TURMOIL

BITTER FIGHT IN CITY SCHOOL. POLITICS IS NOW ON.

Superintendent L. L. Baker Object of Attack—Annual Election Results in Anti-Baker Majority.

ST. HELENS, Or., June 22.—(Special).—School affairs in the St. Helens district are in a turmoil and a bitter fight is on Monday night at the annual school election, director and chairman of the school board C. C. Cassatt was ousted and J. W. Aiken selected in his place. The election of Aiken means an attempt to oust L. L. Baker, superintendent of city schools. Cassatt was a Baker man as is LeBarre, another director. Mellinger, the third director, is opposed to Baker and with the election of Aiken, the anti-Bakerites have the majority and will endeavor to put the skids under Baker.

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FOUR BROTHERS IN ARMY

Major-General August Kobbe, Retired, Visits Son at Camp Lewis.

TACOMA, Wash., June 22.—(Special).—Major-General William August Kobbe, U. S. A., retired, and Mrs. Kobbe are in Tacoma from Pasadena to be near their son, Captain Eric Kobbe, 31st Ammunition Train, Camp Lewis.

One son, Major Herman Kobbe, is stationed at Camp Fremont, Cal., and two other sons are in service in France. Major-General Kobbe was retired in 1904, after 42 years of active service. He first enlisted as a private during the Civil War and obtained a commission, advancing from Major to Brigadier-General within two years during the insurrection in the islands.

COOS COUNTY GOES OVER

Loyal Thousands Respond to Call for Armenian Relief.

MARSHFIELD, Or., June 22.—(Special).—The Armenian relief fund allotted to Coos County has been subscribed, although some of the community were slow in answering the appeal. The state committee sent Dr. Papasian and State Committeeman J. J. Handsaker here and with addresses at Powers, Allegany and other places, including North Bend, the campaign came to a close with a satisfactory showing.

Dr. Papasian, who spent 15 years in church work in Armenia, was received everywhere with enthusiasm, owing to his excellent presentation of the sufferings of his countrymen.

TAX DODGERS MUST PAY

Internal Revenue Bureau Plans Extensive Roundup.

WASHINGTON, June 22.—An extensive campaign to round up tax dodgers is to be started by the Internal Revenue Bureau. The movement will be directed against all who fail to pay their taxes by next Tuesday, the last day on which payments may be made without imposition of penalties, and against those who falsified their reports.

About \$1,800,000,000 in income and excess profits taxes has been paid into the treasury and nearly a billion more is expected within a week.

NEW TICKET STATION TO BE OPENED ABOUT AUGUST 1.

Task of Selecting Staff Now Faces Traffic Committee; Chief Clerks to Hold Conference Today.

Approval has been received from the Railroad Administration for the consolidated ticket office at Third and Washington streets as recommended by the passenger traffic committee. Chairman A. D. Charlton, of the committee, yesterday made announcement that as soon as the necessary changes can be made the new office will be opened, and it is expected that it will be effective not later than August 1. The new joint office will occupy the space in the ground floor of the Fall building now occupied by the Union Pacific system, telephone company and the room formerly occupied as the agency of the Santa Fe.

CLODBURST IS FATAL

LOREN COMBS BURIED BENEATH TONS OF DEBRIS.

Robert Potter Is Hurling Against Rock and Probably Will Die—Gordie Rambo Bruised About Body.

FOSSIL, Or., June 22.—(Special).—Loren Combs is dead and Robert Potter and Gordie Rambo are suffering from serious injuries as the result of being caught in a cloudburst in Little Buckhorn Creek, about 45 miles west of this city.

Mr. Combs' body was buried beneath tons of debris and has not been recovered.

Mr. Potter was caught in the main torrent, the force of the water throwing him against a rock and severing the main artery in his leg. He bled profusely and was in a weakened condition when help arrived.

Mr. Rambo sustained a number of flesh wounds and is suffering from internal injuries. He is not expected to recover.

Mr. Combs was about 45 years of age, unmarried, and was reared in the Willamette Valley. He had lived in Wheeler County for about 25 years.

Mr. Potter and Mr. Rambo were employed by the O. K. Cattle Company, of this vicinity.

Murder Case With Jury.

BAKER, Or., June 22.—(Special).—The case of Charles Spearman, on trial for murder for killing his father-in-law, William Roseberry, at Haines, went to the jury early this evening. Spearman took the stand today in his own defense. He said he feared Roseberry, who had repeatedly threatened him, and that he fired at him only after his father-in-law had struck him and he feared further violence at his hands.
