

FAREWELL DINNER FOR DRAFT QUOTA

Soldier Boys Will Be Guests of Citizens' Committee at Auditorium.

MAYOR BAKER TO PRESIDE

After Bidding Goodbye to Friends and Relatives, Men Will March to Depot and Entrain for Fort McDowell, Cal.

Another quota of 500 men of the selective service will leave Portland tonight for Fort McDowell, California, where they will receive training in the National Army.

Before leaving, the men will be the honor guests at a farewell banquet to be held in the Auditorium under the auspices of the recently formed soldiers' farewell committee, appointed by Mayor Baker. This committee, headed by Mrs. R. D. Inman, is composed of the following members: Mrs. C. B. Simmons, Mrs. Sol. Blumauer, A. G. Clark, H. W. Kent, Charles Berg and Julius Meier.

The dinner will be served in the south assembly-room of the Auditorium, the main body of the building being reserved for friends and relatives of the boys. Professor Goodrich will play a number of pipe organ selections during the course of the dinner. Miss Marie Helen Flynn will be in charge of the musical programme, which will include numbers by Jane Burns Albert, Mrs. Herman Politz and Stuart McGuire.

Mayor Baker will preside at the dinner and Frank Branch Riley will be the principal speaker. The Aloha Division, an organization of girls who provide entertainment at military functions, will present several novel features.

The parade from the Auditorium to the Union Depot will start at 7:30 P. M., led by a band to be furnished by the Musicians' Association. A platoon of police and the police colors will follow. The line of march will be from the Auditorium on Third to Madison, west to Fourth, north to Morrison, west to Sixth, past Liberty Temple, north to Union Depot.

ARMY SERVICE WON AT LAST

Albany Guardsman, Four Times Rejected, Goes to Fort McDowell.

ALBANY, Or., July 6.—(Special).—After trying vainly to enlist in four different branches of the service, Charles Robert Moore, of Albany, working recently in Portland, left here late last night with the Lynn County selective draft contingent for Fort McDowell, Cal.

Moore was a member of the Fifth Company, Coast Artillery Corps, Oregon National Guard, of this city, and went to the company to Fort Stevens when the Oregon Guard was called out. He was rejected in the physical examination here. Later, at intervals, he tried in vain to enlist in the marines and the Engineer Corps.

Under the selective draft physical examinations were more lax.

He is a graduate of the University of Pennsylvania, and is now handling the receiving department of the mustering office branch at Camp Lewis. COMPANY M GOES TO FRONT

Letters Received Say Men Started for Trenches June 13.

CENTRALIA, Wash., July 6.—(Special).—The privates of Company M, 161st Infantry, on June 13 left Sells-Sur-Cher for the front-line trenches, according to letters just received from members of the company. The non-commissioned officers of the company were left behind to train new men. Captain David Livingstone, commanding Company M, is attending a school which all commissioned officers are required to attend before going to the front.

It is reported that all of the companies of the 161st Infantry have been split up, many of the men being transferred to other organizations. Each company in the regiment represents a city in Washington and the transfer, it is believed, was made to lessen the liability to each community from casualties.

ABERDEEN, Wash., July 6.—(Special).—More than 100 tents are housing workmen in this city as a result of the home shortage and despite the large number of residences and apartment-houses here the number of tent homes continues to grow rather than decrease. At the Grays Harbor motorship yard a village of 50 tents has been built by the company, and at the Grant Smith Porter yards about 50 tents are in use. Most of the tents are occupied by two single men. In a few of the privately owned ones families are living. With a new co-operation plant and a big ship engine works both to start here within the next 60 days, the home shortage promises to continue. Accommodations for 70 families will be finished here next month, but these will go only a short way towards meeting the need.

Aberdeen's phenomenal growth has been largely due to her shipyards, which now employ about 2700 men with an average daily payroll of close to \$20,000. House-building activities and the general business boom has brought hundreds of workers, merchants, clerks and others into the city. Despite the growth, labor continues scarce, with the demand for workers of almost all kinds exceeding the supply.

LOAN FUND STARTED

Boys Respond to Appeal for Cherry Pickers.

CLUB WORK IS APPROVED

Capital Prize Winners at O. A. C. Summer School Effect Permanent Organization, With Harold Reynolds at Head.

The industrial club boys of the Oregon Agricultural College Summer school put thrift and conservation theories into practice recently when Mrs. D. S. Reed, who resides about two miles from Corvallis, sent out a call for pickers to harvest her cherry crop. For two weeks the boys had been receiving daily scientific and practical instruction in the various phases of agriculture, and when the call came, were bubbling over with eagerness to put

into practice in any way possible some of the lessons learned.

The call met with a hearty response and the lads enjoyed not only a two-mile hike into the country but also the opportunity to serve Mrs. Reed and save her crop and at the same time earn a little money, for the consideration offered was a cent a pound and all the cherries they could eat. The little band of boys earned \$5 that afternoon, which, by their action later, formed the nucleus of a permanent loan fund that may, in the future, be the means of assisting more than one club boy to take advantage of the splendid opportunities offered young people agriculturally inclined at the Oregon Agricultural College Summer school.

At a meeting of the organization the following morning, it was voted to place the \$5 in the college loan fund. It will be added to from year to year and will be known as the "cherry loan fund."

The capital prize winners at the Summer school session just closed effected a permanent organization by electing Harold Reynolds, of Polk County, president, and Margaret Bonney, of Wasco County, secretary-treasurer. This organization will affiliate with and be a part of the National Club of All-Star-Winners.

A trip to Oregon Agricultural College with all expenses paid for the two weeks at the Summer session is the prize given the winner in the statewide contest in each of the 14 different projects in club work. These trips are made possible by contributions from public-spirited business men.
