## BUCKAROOS SMASH OUT 6-1 TRIUMPH

### Standifer Nine From Vancouver, Wash., Loses With Davis Essaying to Pitch.

### SOUTHPAW ALLOWS 8 HITS

Two of Portland's Drives Prove to Be of Three-Base Variety and, Aided by 3 'Boots' by Vancouver, 6 Runs Are Collected.

Portland stepped one notch nearer the top of the percentage column yesterday when the Buckaroos charged the Standifer nine from Vancouver, Wash. When the dust from the stampede had subsided the score read: Portland 6, Vancouver 1.

"Kewpie" Clow was delegated to make his 1918 farewell appearance on the mound for the Buckaroos and the opposition climbed on to his bencher and straightened 10 of them out for base hits. "Indian" Davis, the foxy quiller from across the Columbia, again tried to southpaw the Buckaroos, but McCredie's hirings slammed out eight hits, two of them of the three-base variety and these, together with three "boots" by Vancouver, gave Portland six runs.

Although Vancouver out-swatted the Buckaroos superb fielding by Daubert and Ritter around the second sack shut off many aspiring base runners. Daubert handled 14 chances with one kick and Ritter here and there with 10 chances, all of which he fielded faultlessly. You seldom see 24 chances handled by the guardians of second base in one nine-inning game, but these two Buckaroos were the busy boys yesterday. Daubert participated in two double plays and Ritter had a hand in three of them. Six double plays featured yesterday's mashay, the Buckaroos being credited with four of them.

As in most of their clashes this week the Buckaroos stepped out in the first inning and gathered in two runs. Davis issued transportation to Haney, who was sacrificed to second by Daniels. Lutzke dropped Daubert's fly and Lee was socked in the ribs, filling the bags with one out. Davis again lost his control and slammed Sullivan on the wrist, forcing Haney over with the basist run. Fisher walked, for Clow, Daubert across with the second score. With the bases jammed Ritter, hit into a double play, retiring the side.

The Buckaroos did their tallying in braces yesterday, scoring their six runs in three innings, hanging up two scores in each. In the seventh they resumed their offensive against Vancouver, when Peterson beat out a hit to third and stole second. Clow popped to Moore. Haney singled over second. Peterson pulling up at third. Pete and Haney pulled off the double steal. Peterson scoring, and Haney was safe at third when Coleman dropped Marshall's throw. Daniels fouled out to Walters. Daubert's grass-cutter took a bad hop as it sized into left evading Hartman and went to the fence for a three-base hit, Haney scoring. Lee grounded out short to first, retiring the side.

As a war time measure the locals chased two more scores across in the eighth. Sullivan walked and Fisher singled to right. Singles by Ritter and Peterson scored Sullivan and Fisher and the fireworks were over. Daubert's error of Gherrity's grounder and singles by Moore and Marshall gave Vancouver its lone lead.

The final game of the season in the Pacific Coast International will take place this afternoon, when the Buckaroos meet the winner of the Cornfoot-Supple-Ballin contest, which starts at 1:30 o'clock.
