

SEASIDE SAMARITANS FEED MULTITUDES OF VISITORS

SEASIDE, Or., July 6.—(Special).—The necessity of feeding the multitudes has developed good Samaritans in Seaside. A number of residents of this little city have converted their homes into eating-houses, inns, rooming-houses and cafeterias, some for purely patriotic reasons, others taking advantage of the opportunity of "making hay while the sun shines." So many soldiers and transients are pouring in and out of Seaside, particularly over week-ends, that in spite of the fact that food is served at dozens of restaurants and shops on Broadway from the beach to the railroad station, it is not unusual for the transients to report "sold out," and some appetites must go unquenched.

Saturday the Officers' Club, the personnel of which is made up of officers in the spruce production camps in and around Seaside, were hosts for a charming dance. The affair was given in the ballroom of the Moore Hotel, and it was bedecked with huge flags draped on the walls and over the doorways and a quantity of greenery. The flags were generously lent by Will Lipman, who spent the week-end in Seaside to attend to affairs of his military shop recently opened here.

The officers again entertained their friends with a delightful dance Thursday evening at the completion of the big patriotic demonstration which occupied the entire day. The Fourth of July programme was a varied one, interesting from start to finish, and it proved a banner day for the men in the logging camps, the hundreds of motorists who came to Seaside to participate in the activities, as well as the many summer visitors to the beaches around Seaside.
