Americans Observe Memorial Day In Alsace

MEMORIAL Day was observed throughout the allied lands this year, especially wherever American troops were stationed. This was the 50th anniversary of the first Memorial Day in this country, when General John A. Logan, as commander-in-chief of the G. A. R., issued the order for its first observance. In the recaptured portion of Alsace-Lorraine the French people joined in a celebration on that day. In Masevaux, provisional capital of the recaptured territory, American troops paraded through the streets headed by their band.

Red Cross attendants are everywhere in the thickest of the danger in the war zone to perform their work of mercy for the wounded. The best of talent for first aid dressings is available whenever it is at all possible to reach the wounded.

Use of canals for moving troops to the front on barges has been found one method of conserving transportation in France. While not as fast as motor lorries or light railways, the use of barges was found an excellent idea in some places where the location of the canal proved advantageous. The men are taken as near as possible to the point desired and march the rest of the way.

There are great stores of munitions and supplies at Vladivostok that the allied powers do not propose shall either be destroyed or fall into enemy possession. The United States cruiser Brooklyn and the British cruiser Suffolk are both stationed in the harbor of Vladivostok. Japanese and British

marines patrol the streets of the city to guard against danger.

The Y. M. C. A. follows the flag right up to the trenches. One hut in France is marked with a letter Y on the door made from the fragment of a shell that exploded near. Supplies are brought up to the hut along with other supplies for the men engaged in the fighting.

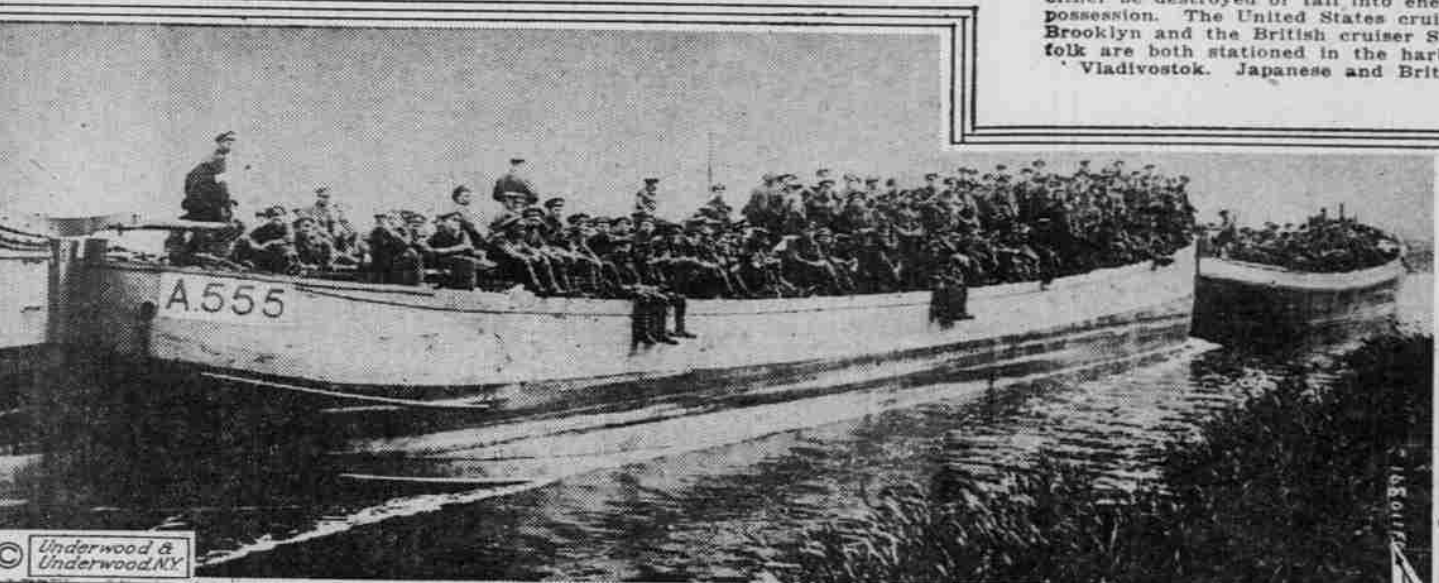
Among drills designed to make men agile and their muscles flexible so they will respond quickly, boxing has been found one of the best means in training soldiers in the army camps. Shadow boxing gives practice in the art that may enable the soldier to knock out or upstart a boche in No Man's land, or in the trenches.

Italy is using a new type of gun mounted on submarines that has proved of wonderful efficiency. It is superior to anything the German U-boats have developed up to this time and is regarded as of great importance in activities of the Italian navy.

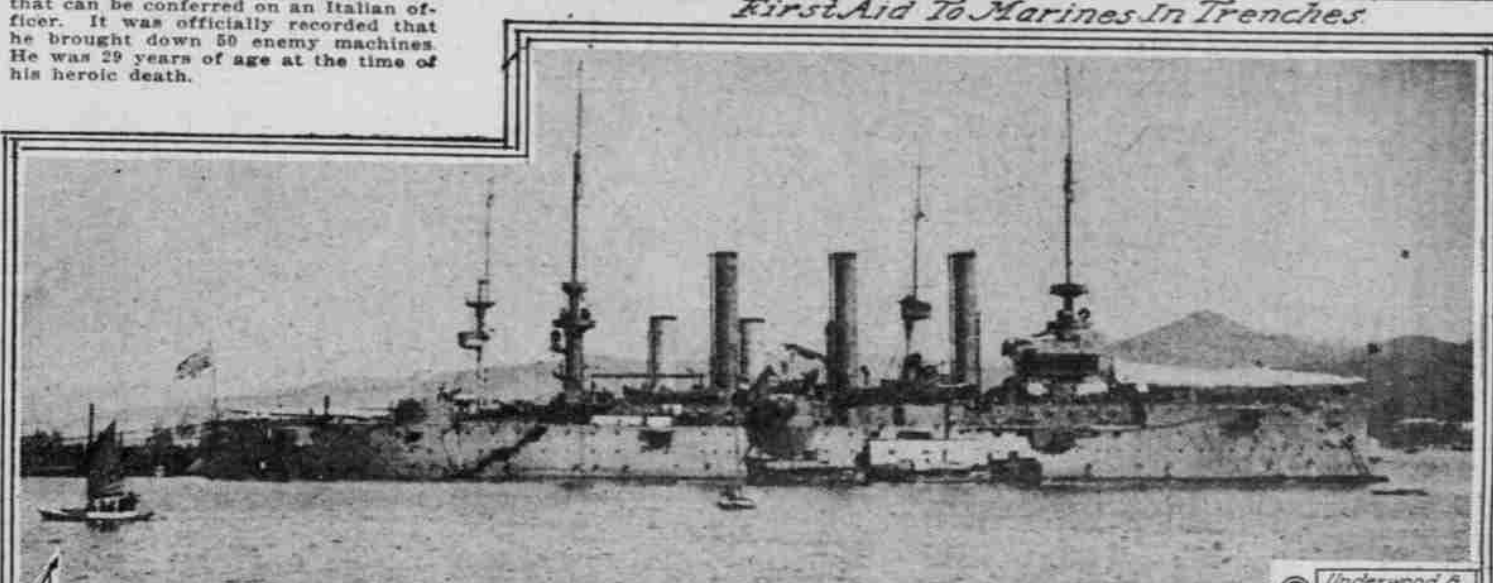
Major Baracca, Italian ace, was killed recently during a flight on the Montebelle, while in pursuit of an enemy machine. Major Baracca was already a distinguished officer of cavalry when he mustered in the flying corps of his country and was awarded various medals for bravery, including the English and French medals and the gold medal of his king, which is the highest honor that can be conferred on an Italian officer. It was officially recorded that he brought down 50 enemy machines. He was 29 years of age at the time of his heroic death.

British Official Photo Moving British Troops To Front On Canal Barges.



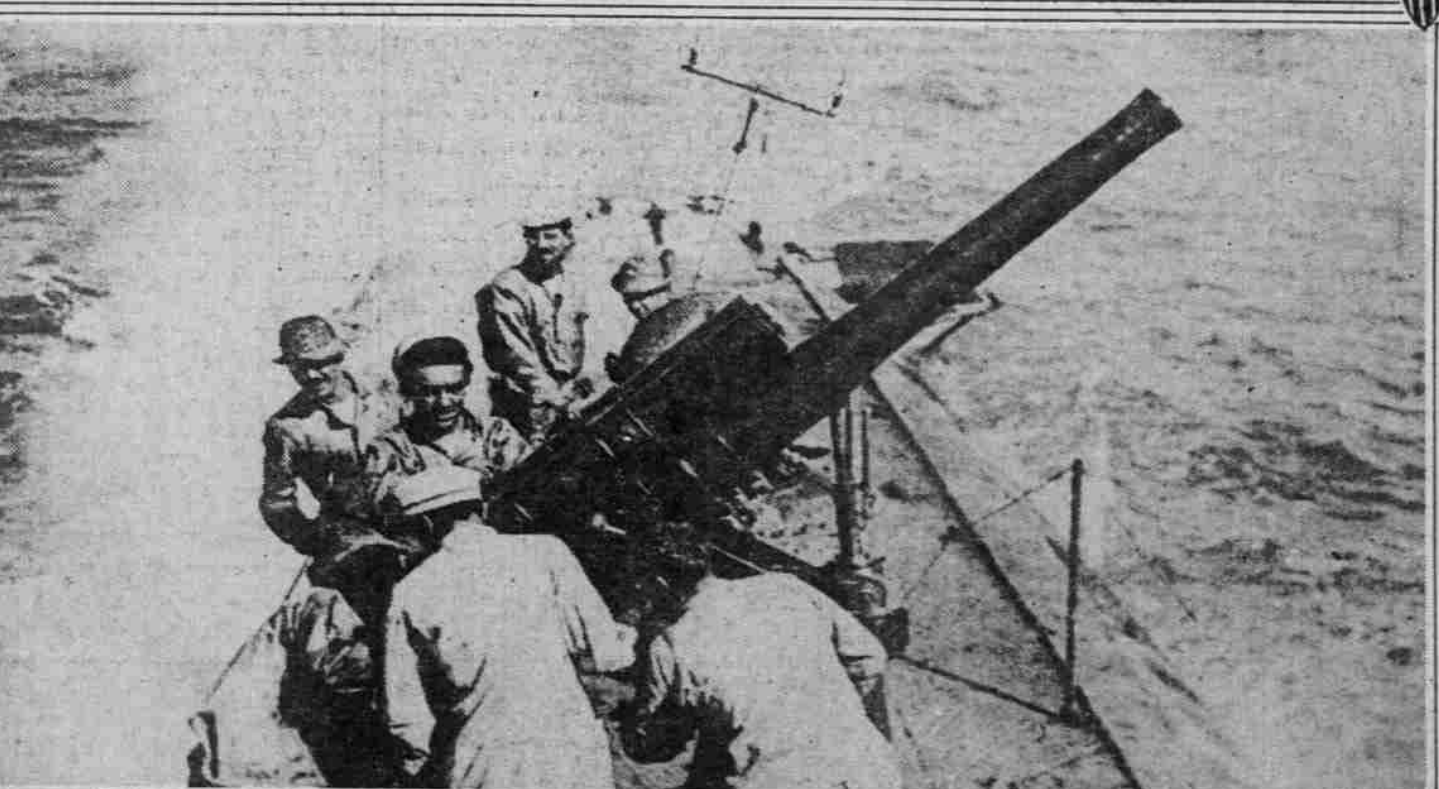
