SPRUCE WORKERS BUSY

PENINSULA NEAR TOLEDO SCENE

OF ACTIVITY.

Big Government Sawmill Soon to Be Installed—Large Forces at Work on Millsite.

TOLEDO, Or., July 27.—(Special).—The peninsula west of Depot Slough is a scene of activity. On its western side is to be erected the big Government spruce sawmill. Four pile-drivers are busy on this 60-acre tract and double shifts are driving piles for the spur from the main trunk of the Southern Pacific line so that cars can be unloaded on the mill site.

Many men are engaged in blasting and removing partially submerged logs and a large force of Warren Spruce Company men is building a camp for 500 soldiers near the site of the mill. Other workers are clearing water pipe ditches and erecting telephone poles and still others are busy with teams leveling the land.

It is understood that the Government will thoroughly dig the 60-acre tract and the dredge Oregon is expected to arrive soon to begin this work. More railway track is a necessity and every foot of the Southern Pacific right of way probably will be used for tracks. It is said that no more big logs are to be shipped by rail, but will be dumped in the slough for the 800 mill, which is running day and night shifts on spruce.

Hood River Doctor Does "Bit."

HOOD RIVER, Or., July 27.—(Special).—Although he is confined to bed and wheel chair at his home, Dr. J. H. McVay, physician, is doing his part in helping the Red Cross chapter conduct classes in first aid work. Dr. McVay, who sustained a broken back in a Columbia River highway accident in September, 1915, and was dangerously ill for many months at a Portland hospital, will correct all examination papers of the first aid classes which will be conducted by fellow-physicians.

Eugene Pastor Is Chosen.

EUGENE, Or., July 26.—(Special).—Father Lane, of Albany, has been chosen pastor of St. Mary's Catholic Church in Eugene, according to an announcement made today. Father Lane was a cousin of the late Senator Harry Lane and a grandson of General Joseph Lane, prominent figure in early Oregon history. Father John A. Moran, who recently resigned as pastor of St. Mary's church, is accepted as a position as a chaplain in the Knights of Columbus war service, is now in France.
