

MANY OREGON BOYS WILL TAKE COURSE

State to Be Well Represented
at Coming Naval School
at Seattle.

FOUR-YEAR TERM PROVIDED

Work at Washington State University
Will Be Patterned After That
at Annapolis—Many Have
Already Registered.

SEATTLE, Wash., Aug. 17.—(Special.)—Oregon will be represented liberally in the new four-year naval science course, Rear-Admiral Chauncey Thomas, U. S. N., retired, commanding, to open at the University of Washington on September 27, if the number of applications and inquiries coming from various parts of the Beaver State count for anything.

Patterned after the famous Annapolis school, the naval science course at the State University here is expected to attract hundreds of students from Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Montana, Wyoming and Alaska.

Many young men already have registered for the course, but actual enlistments are temporarily withheld because of the ban recently imposed by the War Department pending the final action of the new military man-power bill.

Special Provision Expected.
University authorities and naval officers are confident, however, that specific provision will be made in the bill or by the War Department for young men to continue in college to properly educate themselves and also to become commissioned officers in the United States Naval Reserve. As soon as enlistments can be accepted again, the department of naval science at the university will begin enlisting students in the Naval Reserve.

After the opening of the regular university term on September 27, enlisted students in the naval science course will be placed in active service for probably four weeks, after which they will go on inactive service and start on the four-year course. All students enlisted in this course must take the regularly prescribed subjects and no others. Students, however, may enter the university and take other subjects and still be members of the naval science school, but they will not be enlisted in the Naval Reserve or entitled to the various privileges such standing would give them.

Uniform Allowance Given.
An allowance of \$100 for uniform will be given to every enlisted man as soon as he begins the course. The student is also paid for the four weeks of active service which will precede the actual opening of the camp. The tentative programme outlined calls for cruises each summer from six weeks to two months. These cruises will be on the Pacific waters. Students will receive the full pay of the enlisted men of the Navy while on these cruises.

Unless the Navy has urgent need for their services, students in the Naval Science course will probably continue in the school until the full four years are completed and they have received commissions. In the case of the Navy Department students entering the course at the university will be doing just as patriotic a duty as they would if they joined any other branch of the service. To remain in the school, all students, of course, must make good in their studies.

Requirements for admittance to the course include a high school education with sufficient units of the necessary variety required by the university, and the usual physical test of the United States Naval Reserve force.

All young men interested in the course are urged to send their applications immediately to the Department of Naval Science, University of Washington Armory.

LOSSES WORRY ENEMY

CAPTURED DOCUMENT DISCLOSES
GERMAN ANXIETY.

Order Signed "Ludendorff" Refers to
Great Number of Prisoners
Taken by Allies.

WITH THE FRENCH ARMY IN FRANCE, Aug. 17.—(By the Associated Press.)—An order signed "Ludendorff" recently captured on the battlefield discloses the anxiety of the Germans over the heavy losses they sustained in the latter part of June and early in July. The order, dated July 6, refers to "repeated attacks by the enemy during recent days," and says:

"Unfortunately a great number of prisoners were lost in these affairs, which shows that our occupation of the first lines is still too dense in defense and the depth of the advanced zone is insufficient."

The document makes a significant reference to the relations between the depth of the advanced zone and the weakness of artillery.

"The weaker the artillery is," says the document, "and the worse the organization of a position, the deeper should be the advanced zone."

Another paragraph refers to the lack of men for certain operations as follows:

"The fear that the entente might make us retire several kilometers is absolutely unjustified, because they have as few men as we have for such attacks."

EDITORS DUE HERE SOON

ITALIANS WILL BE ENTERTAINED
BY DEFENSE COUNCIL.

Visitors Are Making Tour of United States Studying Commercial and Shipbuilding Activities.

The State Council of Defense at a meeting held Saturday took preliminary steps for the entertainment of the party of Italian editors who are now touring the United States making a study of commercial and shipbuilding activities. The date of their arrival in Portland is not yet definitely known.

Mayor Baker will have charge of the arrangements, assisted by John K. Kollock, executive secretary of the Council of Defense. Preliminary plans for the visitors' entertainment include a trip over the Columbia Highway, a luncheon and an afternoon reception at the Auditorium. The Italian colony and other representative Italians will be invited to participate.

Steps are being taken to enlarge the membership of the Council of Defense and make it more of a state-wide body.

The organization is anxious that citizens throughout the state make use of the services of the body, and suggestions for increased usefulness will be welcomed.

The council is at work on general plans for the Americanization of aliens in the state, and as soon as the rush attendant upon participating in the G. A. R. festivities is over, special attention will be given this matter.

Secretary Kollock has just returned from an educational trip over the state, accompanied by Captain Russell, U. S. A. The men gave a series of addresses to registered men, instructing them in personal hygiene and the duties and obligations of men in the service.

TEN YANKEES ARE HONORED

French Confer War Cross on Members of Sanitary Unit.

PARIS, Aug. 17.—Sanitary service unit 544, commanded by Lieutenant Russell K. Dougherty, distinguished itself in the recent heavy fighting and ten of its members have received the War Cross from the French divisional commanders. This makes 22 decorations to date among the Americans in the unit and two for the French members. The ten who received the war cross are: Harold J. McGowan, Charles A. David, Hubert L. King, David T. McDavitt, Henry J. Knowles, Earl W. Maloney, John N. Shaw, John O. Curry, Karl B. Nichols and William B. O'Brien. This is the second mention for Nichols and O'Brien.

BOLSHEVIKI SOON TO FLEE

Russian Government Reported About to Quit Moscow for Petrograd.

STOCKHOLM, Aug. 17.—The Social Democratic publication, a report sent from Petrograd, August 8 by a Swedish Socialist saying that the Czechoslovak "advance on Moscow" is expected to result in the Russian government officials returning to Petrograd. The latest soviet mobilization has been a total failure and the Bolsheviks openly admit that the end of their power may come within a few weeks or even days. The newspaper's informant says that former Russian officers are being shot by the whole-sale and that thus far more than 1700 have been killed.

CAPPER'S LEAD IS 70,062

Governor's Majority in Kansas Primary for Senator 31,746.

TOPEKA, Kan., Aug. 17.—In his race for the Republican nomination for United States Senator in the recent Kansas primary, Governor Arthur Capper received a plurality of 70,062 votes and a majority over all Republican candidates for that office of 31,746 votes, according to unofficial but complete records compiled in the office of the Secretary of State and announced today.

REGISTRATION DAY CHOSEN

New Draftees to Be Listed on a Saturday, It Is Decided.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 17.—Provost Marshal-General Crowder has decided to hold the National registration under the pending new manpower bill to extend the draft ages on a Saturday. It was announced today that, while the date could not be fixed until Congress acted, a Saturday would be designated because of the half holiday which obtains in many localities.

\$1,000,000 TO FIGHT FIRES

Forest Service Gets Loan From Special Defense Fund.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 17.—A loan of \$1,000,000 has been made to the Forest Service from the President's special defense fund to combat fires in the National forests of the Northwestern and Pacific Coast states.

Three Killed in Iowa Storm.

DUBUQUE, Iowa, Aug. 17.—A storm which broke here shortly after midnight Saturday morning and continued about two and one-half hours resulted in the death of three men and caused considerable damage to crops. The deaths occurred when an Illinois Central freight train ran into a washout near here.

Famous Men to Take Outing.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 17.—Thomas A. Edison, Henry Ford, John Burroughs, the naturalist, and Edward N. Hurley, chairman of the shipping board, will compose a party leaving Pittsburgh, Pa., tomorrow morning for a few days' motor trip in the mountains.

"Skip-Stop" System Ordered.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 17.—Street railway companies of the United States were instructed in letters sent out today by the Fuel Administration to put into effect the "skip-stop" system on all lines by the end of September.

PAPERS NOT FOUND

Report in Case of Governor of Vermont Made.

EXECUTIVE RETAINS OFFICE

Statement in Reply to Charges of Irregularities in Handling Funds While in Office of Auditor Delayed.

MONTPELIER, Vt., Aug. 17.—Governor Horace F. Graham, who was asked yesterday in resolutions adopted by the Republican State Committee to resign immediately because of the discovery of alleged irregularities in the handling of his accounts while Auditor, announced through his private secretary today that he would make no statement until he had obtained a full report of the committee's action.

In his report to be presented to the Legislature, and made public today, Bank Commissioner Williams said he was compelled to disagree with the recently published statement of Governor Graham as to the facts shown by the Auditor's books.

"On March 20, 1918," said Mr. Williams, in his report, "I began the regular examination of the Auditor's office and found that ex-Auditor Graham had drawn orders for himself since my last examination, which was made after the close of the fiscal year of 1916, to the amount of \$2181, for which there were no receipts or vouchers showing expenditure, and there appeared on the books at that time a balance which was not vouchered, including the above, of \$8575."

"I called the attention of the Governor to it and he said it would be adjusted immediately. Examination disclosed that there were orders drawn by ex-Auditor Graham to himself during his term of office amounting to \$17,000 and there were two orders amounting to \$3000, the avails of which he had charged in two different highway accounts for which no credit vouchers can be found."

"Orders were drawn by him to himself during the term of office of my immediate predecessor to the amount of \$6800 for which there are not now vouchers or receipts or orders drawn to his order for which there are no vouchers."

BIG STOCK RANCH SOLD

J. N. WILLIAMSON SELLS 22,000 ACRES NEAR PRINEVILLE.

Ex-Representative Will Devote Time Hereafter to Operating 6000-Acre Farm on Ochoco Project.

PRINEVILLE, Or., Aug. 17.—(Special.)—One of the largest transfers ever made in Crook County took place yesterday when J. N. Williamson sold most

of his land and livestock to E. L. Ashby, William Ledford and T. H. LaFollette.

The deal included the Riverside property of about 22,000 acres, stocked with sheep, cattle and horses, and all the range lands tributary. This part of the property goes to William Ledford and E. L. Ashby and the latter also gets the Horse Heaven interests, consisting of several thousand acres.

T. H. LaFollette purchased about 600 acres near Lookout Mountain.

Mr. Williamson came to Crook County in 1876 and except for his sojourn at Washington, D. C., as representative in Congress, he has been in the sheep business continually.

Upon his arrival here he accepted a position with B. F. Allen as shepherd at \$25 per month and held that position

for several years. He was afterward a partner of B. F. Allen.

Instead of retiring Mr. Williamson will continue to operate his "small" ranch of 6000 acres under the Ochoco project, near Prineville.

Daylight Robber Gets \$35,000.

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 17.—Unset jewels valued at \$35,000 and a small amount of money were taken today in a daylight robbery of the Donovan-Seamans jewelry store on Broadway, near Seventh, the busiest corner in the city. While an employee was arranging a window display shortly after opening the store, the police said, a recently-employed negro porter disappeared. Soon afterwards the disappearance of jewels from the open safe was noticed.
