

BRIEF BUT LIVELY CONTEST PROMISED

Primary Campaign in Idaho Is
On and Voters Will Voice
Preferences Sept. 3.

OFFICIAL BALLOT IS OUT

Leading Parties Have Contests and
Non-Partisan League Is Factor
to Be Considered in Politics
of the State.

BOISE, Idaho, Aug. 17.—(Special.)—The primary campaign is on in Idaho. It will be brief, but it may be spicy. The primary election falls on September 3, when the electors will voice their preference for party nominees for Congress and for state offices. They will also decide legislative nominees and candidates for county office.

The period allotted for filing nominations and recording acceptances has past. The Republicans have contests for short-term Senator, Governor and Lieutenant-Governor. The Democrats have contests for short-term Senator, Second District Congressman and for every state office except treasurer. Their most feared opponents are the candidates nominated by the Non-Partisan League.

Nugent-Hawley Contest On.
The Nugent-Hawley primary contest for the short-term Senatorial nomination is now on. Unusually strong pressure was brought to keep Hawley out of the race. Fred T. Dubois, former State Senator, now with the War Ordnance Department, has openly announced that the Administration at Washington desired the renomination and re-election of Senator Nugent. To this claim, Hawley and his followers took exception. They contend that Washington has no right to interfere in Idaho politics. Nugent has the endorsement of the Non-Partisan League.

The second serious conflict which confronts that party is over the Governorship. Dissatisfied with E. A. VanSicklin, who got into the race early, every effort was made to have him step aside for some candidate on whom all Democrats could agree. VanSicklin, however, insisted on remaining. The dissatisfied faction thereupon brought out Frank Martin, who has the support of many of the Democrats. The state administration is back of him and will make every effort to bring about his nomination. It is claimed. He is uncompromisingly against the Non-Partisan League.

PHOTOGRAPHER IS FREED

No charge was filed against C. S. Currie, 30-year-old photographer, arrested Friday while taking pictures near the Willamette River. J. H. GALLINGER DIES

Veteran Senator Succumbs to
Old-Age Ailment.

DAUGHTER ONLY SURVIVOR

Serious Condition of Health Dates
Back Only to Last July; Successor in Upper House to Be Appointed.

FRANKLIN, N. H., Aug. 17.—United States Senator Jacob H. Gallinger, of New Hampshire, died at a hospital here early today.

When Senator Gallinger returned from Washington to his summer home at Salisbury Heights, near here, in July, he was in poor health. A few days ago, his condition became so much worse that upon advice of his physician he was brought to a hospital here. Death was attributed to arterio sclerosis.

The funeral will be held from the First Baptist Church at Concord, on Wednesday afternoon.

Senator Gallinger is survived by a daughter, Mrs. Harry A. Norton, of Winchester, Mass.

CONCORD, N. H., Aug. 17.—Governor Keyes will appoint a Senator to fill Senator Gallinger's seat until the election this Fall of a successor. The remainder of his term, which expires in March, 1921.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 17.—News of the death of Senator Gallinger was received with sorrow today at the Capitol.

Senator Bankhead, acting president pro tem of the Senate, named a committee which, with the members of the House, will attend the funeral.

The ranking Republican in point of service to Senator Gallinger, is Senator Lodge, of Massachusetts, and it is generally understood that he will succeed to the minority leadership.

VETERANS' AIDE TO QUIT

MISS KATHERINE FLOOD TO LEAVE
G. A. R. WORK.

Secretary to Commander-in-Chief in Oregon
Says They Will Miss Her.

Known affectionately as "Our Kitty" to comrades from Portland, Me., to Portland, Or., Miss Katherine R. A. Flood, of Newton, Mass., who has been secretary to the commanders-in-chief for the past eight years and who has not missed a National encampment in 15 years, will resign her post at the present encampment of the G. A. R. All day yesterday while she attended to the heavy work which precedes the opening of each encampment, the old comrades filed into her office in the Multnomah Hotel to learn from her whether or not it was really true that she would not be with them another year.

"Don't know what we are going to do without you, 'Kitty,'" sighed one of the comrades. "Seems as if you'll just have to stay with us."

"I don't see myself what they are going to do without me or what I am going to do without them," said Miss Flood. "Before I was appointed secretary to Commander Gilman in 1911 the work had always been done under the Adjutant by the headquarters clerk. I am the first woman to hold an office under the commander and the first person to remain on the staff for more than a year."

Year by year as the comrades have

grown older Miss Flood's duties have multiplied. Upon her has devolved the task of preparing the long reports, the roll, and the editing of the Journal, which contains the proceedings of each encampment. As the years roll on the veterans become less able to keep up the arduous routine work which comes to the executive office. She has managed the affairs of the National office for so many years that she has virtually become an institution inherited by each new commander as he steps into office. Business of the State Departments, pensions and other routine come straight into her hands and never leave until finished.

"It would have been hard work if I had not loved it and understood it," said Miss Flood. Her father is a member of the G. A. R.

MISHAP PROVES FATAL

IRON MOLDER IN VANCOUVER SUC-
CUMBS TO INJURIES.

Benjamin F. Burns Planned to Walk of
Building by Auto and Life
Crushed Out.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Aug. 17.—(Special.)—Benjamin F. Burns, aged about 48, an iron molder, of Felida, died at St. Joseph's Hospital, at 2 o'clock today as a result of being struck by an automobile at 10 o'clock.

Emmett Garrison, stage driver for Roy Minkler, operating between Vancouver and Portland, parked his car on Main street above Seventh. The brakes failed to hold and the car, released, started backwards down and across the street, striking Mr. Burns. He was pinned to the wall of a building by the machine and badly crushed. No one was in the car.

Garrison was arrested by the police and released under \$500 bail. The body was removed from the hospital to Limber's undertaking parlors, but funeral arrangements have not yet been made.

Mr. Burns for several years operated a shoe store at Seventh and Washington streets, less than a block from where he was killed. He leaves a wife and daughter, aged seven. He had been working at his trade as iron molder in Portland for the past year.

CAR SERVICE WILL BE CUT

Spokane Trolley Company Announces
Retrenchment Measure.

SPOKANE, Wash., Aug. 17.—(Special.)—As an economical necessity, the Washington Water Power Company will be forced to curtail service on its city car lines this Fall and Winter, and some important service changes may be

expected by the traveling public within the next few days, according to announcement today by President D. L. Huntington, of the Power Company.

"The receipts of the railway lines are decreasing and expenses of operation are increasing," states President Huntington. "The net losses of the company from operation for seven months

this year are more than \$20,000 greater than for the same period last year."

Iowa Association Elects.

SALEM, Or., Aug. 17.—(Special.)—Glenn Adams, of Salem, was elected president of the Iowa Association of Oregon, which held its annual picnic at

the State Fair grounds today. P. Young, of Tangent, was named vice-president and U. S. Dotson, of Salem, secretary-treasurer. It was decided to meet next year in Salem the Wednesday preceding August 17. Heretofore all meetings have been held on Saturday.

SENATOR IS UNDECIDED

Time of Action on New Draft Bill
Not Yet Definitely Fixed.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Wash-
ington, Aug. 17.—Senator Chamberlain said today that he has not decided whether to ask for immediate action

toward consideration of the new draft bill when the Senate meets Monday, or to let the Senate follow the usual procedure of adjourning out of respect to the memory of the late Senator Gallinger, under the unanimous consent agreement, under which recess was taken, three days must elapse after the agreement is revoked before any business can be transacted. It is quite likely that the Senate will be asked to revoke the recess agreement and then adjourn out of respect to the late Senator.
