OFFICERS ARE NAMED

CAPTAIN, COMPANY A. O. N. G., ANNOUNCES LIEUTENANTS.
 Elmer R. Lundberg and W. B. Warren Selected as First and Second, Respectively, by W. B. Wolcott.

The officer personnel of Company A, Oregon National Guard, which was mustered into the state and National service the past week with 124 members, was announced yesterday by Captain W. B. Wolcott. Elmer R. Lundberg, attorney, with offices in the Yeon building, is First Lieutenant. W. B. Warren, until recently with the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph Company, becomes Second Lieutenant. All of these officers have been active service.

Captain Wolcott enlisted in Company B, 14th United States Infantry, in April, 1898, and saw service in Manila until he returned to this country on sick leave in November of the same year. He went back to the Philippines in 1900 with Company A, First United States Infantry, and served on the islands of Morandque and Samar. At the present time the Captain is a member and officer of Scout Young Camp, No. 2, Spanish War Veterans, and serves as a special Deputy Sheriff under Sheriff Burdick.

PORTLAND MAN RISES

AMOS A. PRIES PROMOTED TO BE BRIGADIER-GENERAL.
 Man Who Received Preparatory Instruction at Medford Wins Recognition on Battlefield.

Another well-known Portland man has achieved promotion on the battlefield in France. Amos A. Pries, formerly a resident of Medford, and brother of A. Fries, 1511 Kerby street, has been made a Brigadier-General, according to an official announcement of Friday.

General Pries received his preparatory schooling in Medford. In 1894 he was appointed to West Point from which institution he graduated in 1898, just in time to serve in the Spanish-American War. Following two years in the Philippines he returned a First Lieutenant, and earned a Captaincy shortly after. He spent a year in the Custom-House in Portland, then to Los Angeles for four years. This was followed by four years in Washington, D. C., and an equal period in the Yellowstone Park. He went to France as a Lieutenant-Colonel, but soon became a full Colonel. His advancement to Brigadier-General is one of the five permanent promotions announced today.

CAR FARES GOING UP

EASTERN CONDITIONS TOLD BY W. P. STRANDBERG.

Two Hundred Cities Authorized to Raise: Wages and Commodity Prices Advancing.

Approximately 200 street railway companies have been authorized to increase fares from one to three and in some instances five cents to meet the increased cost of operation due to present abnormal conditions, reports W. P. Strandberg, who returned last week from a six weeks' tour of the Eastern states. Besides, the applications of more than 150 other public utility corporations for similar advance in fares are pending.

"In the first place, tens of thousands of experienced railroad men have been drafted, and additional thousands have been diverted into other essential war industries," said Mr. Strandberg, detailing some of the problems in operation with which railway corporations are confronted today. "Competitive standards of wages have been established which street railways cannot meet under their existing revenues. The price of fuel has vastly increased and this applies with equal force to the production of water power used more generally for electric railways in the West."

"The price of every electric railway commodity, labor, material, supplies and equipment of every kind has increased enormously from 40 to 400 per cent or more. Material essential to the construction and maintenance of street railways has been absorbed or withheld altogether. The supply of money has been commandeered; interest rates have increased, and millions of dollars new taxes have been imposed. The price of fuel has vastly increased and this applies with equal force to the production of water power used more generally for electric railways in the West."

MULTNOMAH SHOW TO BE LARGER THAN EVER BEFORE.

Annual Event Will Open on September 17 and Close the Following Saturday—Schools to Compete.

From all indications this will be the best county fair ever staged in the county. Space has been so much in demand that a number of large tents have been leased to accommodate the exhibitors.

Worth, Portland; and Charles and James Henderson, Jr. Interment was made at Mount Scott Park Cemetery.

EUGENE MERCHANT DEAD

ARA W. McLAUGHLIN PROMINENT IN FRATERNAL CIRCLES.

Veteran Graduates From Portland University and Later Served During Spanish-American War.

Ara W. McLaughlin, formerly of Milwaukee, Or., and later of Eugene, died at the family residence near Milwaukee August 22 at the age of 44 years. Mr. McLaughlin was the eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. R. S. McLaughlin and was born in Missouri in 1873, coming to Oregon when a small boy. He graduated from the Portland University and was a teacher for a number of years. In 1898 he enlisted in Company I of the Second Oregon U. S. Volunteers and served through the Spanish-American war.

Upon his return from the Philippines he again engaged in the teaching profession, later entering the employ of the Ira F. Powers Furniture Company. Later he went to Eugene, where he engaged in the furniture business for himself. Mr. McLaughlin was a member of the Spanish Veterans' camp at Eugene, the Spencer Butte camp, I. O. O. F., and was a prominent Y. M. C. A. and church worker.

He is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. R. S. McLaughlin, of Milwaukee; a sister, Ada C. McLaughlin, of Milwaukee; and two brothers, Earl McLaughlin, of Walla Walla, Wash., and Chester C. McLaughlin, of Milwaukee.

Funeral services were held Friday afternoon from the chapel of J. P. Finnerly & Son, with Rev. H. R. Gell officiating.

Hospital Gets 1000 First Day.
 YAKIMA, Wash., Aug. 24.—(Special.)

HOOD RIVER, OR., Aug. 24.—(Special.)—Residents of Hood River today milk more cows than were owned by the entire population of the Apple Valley, excluding dairy ranchers, on the same date in 1910, according to figures made public here.

In 1910 many orchardists, who supplied their tables with imported vegetables, and devoted some time to developing fruit tracts, and numerous families had disposed of their cows. Governor Withycombe, at that time director of the Oregon experiment station, was instrumental in getting orchardists to buy cows. Following a campaign sponsored by the Governor, scores of dairy cows were purchased and orchardists organized a co-operative creamery.

City residents have purchased cows in a small dairy, wartime economy and to insure their families against possible milk famine. Today contented Jerseys may be seen on many vacant lots and the waste of garbage from Hood River households is negligible.
