"Our next work must be the check ing-up of all subscriptions, to ascertain the identity of the slackers and shirk-ers. It is our duty to the Nation and the community. I regret to have to re-sort to such an expedient, but the action has been invited by the failure of thousands to express in substantial manner their loyalty to the Nation and

their home city."

General Guy W. Talbot, while assured that ultimate failure is not to be thought of, insisted that Portland must rally in rapid manner if it is to aid Oregon in attaining another record for ontanelty in the liberty loan.

"Unless every man and woman in e city constitutes an individual com-tree to bring delinquents in to Liberty Temple, or places such people directly in touch with official solici-tors, I shall deem the city fortunate if we obtain our quota before Wednessaid General Talbot.
