Oscar W. Horne Files for City Commissioner, While F. C. Howell Announces for Senator to Succeed Mr. Olson.

Political activity was pronounced yes-terday, with the following result: James U. Campbell, Circuit Judge, of Oregon City, came to Portland and an-nounced to friends that he is a candi-date for the vacancy on the Supreme Court bench.

Oscar W. Horne filed his nominating petition as a randidate for City Com-

petition as a candidate for City Com-

missioner.

City Commissioner Bigelow announced that he will be a candidate to succeed himself and will file his petition within a few days.

F. C. Howell announced himself as a candidate for State Senator to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of C. P. Olson, appointed to the Supreme Court.

Such were the actual and positive stands taken. Then, in the 'way of gossip, it was rumored that J. Francis Drake will run for the vacancy in the State Senate, and that it is considered reasonably certain that either Phil Metschan, Jr., or John H. Burgard will be a candidate. Also Senator I. N. Day was mentioned, and James B. Kerr and Ray Barkhurst, 'the latter saying he will decide Monday.

So much for the State Senatorship. Attention is being directed to the vacancy in the Supreme Court bench and It promises to develop one of the warm-

cancy in the Supreme Court bench and it promises to develop one of the warmly contested spots in the campaign. Justice Conrad P. Oisen will ask that his name be written on the ballot. Judge John S. Coke is also a contender, and now comes Judge Campbell. Street rumor has it that Fred L. Olson also contemplates making a try for the Supreme Court.

Democrats have made no public move regarding the bench, but there are whisperings that possibly Judge John H. Stevenson might be induced to run and then again there are rumors, from Democratic sources, that the Democratic candidates for state office do not want a Democrat running for Justice

want a Democrat running for Justice on the theory that a Democratic candi-date for the bench would only stir up more opposition from the Republicans. Mr. Horne says that he is preparing to inaugurate an active campaign. He has the indorsement of labor bodies and will virtually be the labor nominee, judging from present indications. 


