It has been said that "war has revived the art of correspondence" as well as changing the entire mode of living all over the world, and now, with the latest restrictions placed upon the peoples of the United States owing to the spread of Spanish influenza, it is the opinion of the majority that "influenza will revive the art of correspondence." However, there is not even the hope that a chance will grow out of the "influenza restrictions," but the time-old proverb, "All's fair in love and war," can be applied to the present emergency, and Portland women may "learn to love their neighbors."

So far, the weddings planned will be carried on as per schedule, but dances, parties, teas, and all the other festivities in which society has found diversion and relaxation from the arduous duties of war service, will have to be postponed for the time being.

A number of women have already planned to take a trip to the beaches with their children, rather than have them scurrying about the city in search of amusement.
