IDAHO UNIVERSITY GROWS

Increased Enrollment in State Institution Recorded Over All Years.

MOSCOW, Idaho, Oct. 12.—(Special.)—Every department in the University of Idaho shows increased enrollment over last year and all previous years. This is especially true of the agricultural college and the school of mines. But while these departments lead, there is a marked increase in enrollment in every other department of the school, including that of domestic science and music.

The enrollment in the agricultural college, of which Dean E. J. Iddings is head, is more than three times as large as last year, and a number more students are expected. This, of course, does not include the short course, which opens next Monday for a term of five months. This short course is expected to bring the school the largest number ever enrolled there, as letters of inquiry are pouring in from every part of the state.
