Red Cross Announces Plans for Handling Parcels.

QUARTERS SOON TO OPEN

Portland Expected to Send Thousands of Presents to Boys Fighting for World Democracy.

Plans and organization for handling Christmas parcels to be mailed to sol-diers and sailors in foreign service were completed yesterday by the Port-land chapter, American Red Cross. A stock of cartons sufficient to care for every Oregon soldier in France is in storage at Red Cross headquarters. As soon as the labels arrive from soldiers, and the first of these are due in Portland tomorrow, next-of-kin may apply at the offices of the Portland chapter for the cartons.

Mrs Jesse Stearns was appointed chairman of the Christmas parcel committee by the executive committee of the Red Cross. Mrs. H. B. Van Duzer is chairman of th Multnomah County committee and Mrs. Victor Johnson is chairman of the Portland committee. Quarters Soon to Open.

Headquarters will be opened this week in the former North Bank ticket office, Fifth street at Stark, and continue open until a late hour each day until November 15, the last day on which parcels may be mailed to France. Sub-depots will be maintained by the branches of the Portland chapter in Forest Grove, McMinnville, Oregon City, Tillamook, Newberg and Hillsboro.

The Portland chapter will maintain sub-depots at Gresham. Sandy, Trout-

dale and Estacada, under Mrs. Van Duzer. Mrs. Elmer Connell, of Deer Island, will open depots for Columbia County at Rainier and St. Helens. Size of Articles Restricted.

Only such articles as will go in the standard carton, 3xix9 inches in giae, will be accepted. The cartons will be supplied by the Red Cross without charge to holders of the Christmas package labels. The boxes, unwrapped but packed, must not weigh more than two pounds, 15 ounces.

two pounds, 15 ounces. When packed, the box should be taken, unsealed and unwrapped to the Red Cross depot, where it will be inspected. Shippers must then attach domestic parcel rates to Hoboken, N. J. 12 cents a pound, and the Red Cross will retain possession of the parcels, tag and deliver them to the postoffice tag and deliver them to the postoffice. tag and deliver them to the postoffice

WARNING ISSUED AGAINST AL LEGED REMEDIES.

U. S. Health Service Says Use of Vaccines Not Yet Advanced Beyoud Experimental Stage.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 26.-Use of vaccines in combating or treating Span-ish influenza has not gone beyond the experimental stage so far as the United tates public health service has been ble to learo. In a statement tonight the public

health service warned the public against any of the "sure cures" being advocated for the malady, which ac-cording to reports today is rapidly sub-siding in all Army camps and is show-ing a lessening incidence in many states among civilians.

the health service arges the punte to remember that there is no specific cure for influenza and that many of the alleged cures and remedies being recommended by neighbors, nostrum venders and others do more harm than good. The chief reliance must be on medical attention, good nursing, fresh air, nutritious food, pienty of water and cheerful surroundings."
