ABERDEEN, Wash., Dec. 21.—(Special.)—Grays Harbor County has been placed in the fourth class, automatically increasing the salaries of the County Commissioners from \$800 to \$1800 a year. The County Treasurer is raised from \$1900 to \$2000; County

Clerk, from \$1800 to \$1900, and County Coroner, from \$800 to \$1000. The Superintendent of Schools under the law will receive \$200 less, being reduced from \$2000 to \$1800.

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
