

# IDAHO REPUBLICANS IN OFFICE TOMORROW

### Inauguration Ceremony Takes Place at High Noon.

### BUSINESS TERM PROMISED

#### Women of State Will Be Represented by Two Members Elected to Lower House.

BOISE, Idaho, Jan. 4.—(Special.)—The inauguration of the 15th Idaho Legislature and state officials-elect will take place here Monday at high noon with simple but impressive ceremony. It marks the passing of a Democratic Administration of two years and the ushering in of a Republican one. The Bourbons lose control of both branches of the Legislature and the state government, including all governing boards. During the next two years the Republican party will be given an opportunity to demonstrate that it is able to give to the state a government that is satisfactory to the people as a whole.

Following are the state officials-elect who will take the oath of office at the inauguration before a joint assembly of the Legislature Monday: Governor, D. W. Davis, American Falls; Lieutenant-Governor, C. C. Moore, St. Anthony; Secretary of State, H. O. Jones, Kellogg; Auditor, Edward G. Gallet, Pocatello; Treasurer, John W. Engstrom, Boise; Attorney-General, R. L. Mack, Coeur d'Alene; Superintendent of Public Instruction, Miss Ethel B. Redfield, Lewiston; State Mine Inspector, Robert M. Bell, Boise.

#### One Vote in Doubt.

The relative strength of the two parties in the two houses stand as follows: Senate, Republicans 25, Democrats 12; House of Representatives, Republicans 45, Democrats 19. Officially the Republicans are credited with 30 Senators, but this is due to the fact that Senator St. Clair, Oregon, State Senator, while elected on the Republican ticket, is a Democrat and will affiliate with that party.

#### Public Service Commissioner Asks Road to Act.

#### Women Are Represented.

The women of the state are represented in the House of Representatives by two of their sex—Carrie Harp White, of Twin Falls, and Emma F. A. Drake, of New Plymouth. Both were strongly endorsed by women's organizations and will endeavor to have enacted legislation of particular benefit to members of the gentler sex.

The message of Governor-elect D. W. Davis will contain a number of important recommendations. It contains about 10,000 words. Foremost among the recommendations is one seeking to place the Governor in a position of business by creating a purchasing agent in whom the responsibility of purchasing supplies will rest.

P. L. Bellard, field organizer, bureau of organization and markets, will represent Director Center, who is now in Washington, D. C.

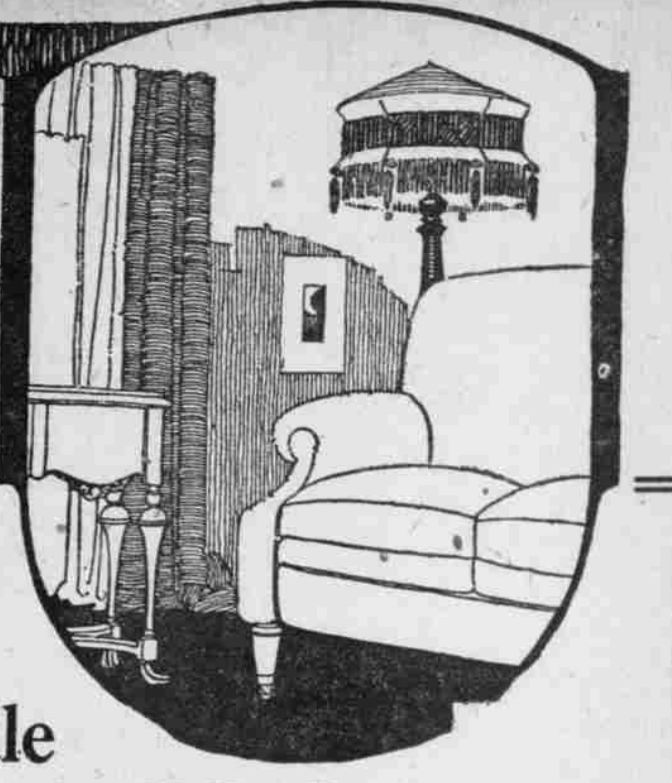
#### Ohio Injunction Case Dismissed.
