

IRRIGATION CONGRESS RE-ELECTS OFFICERS

Jay H. Upton, of Prineville, to Continue as President.

ANNUAL SESSION CLOSED

Reconstruction and Legislation Are Chief Topics of Discussion at Convention.

Jay Upton, of Prineville, was re-elected president of the Oregon Irrigation Congress at its final session yesterday forenoon, at the Imperial Hotel, and Fred N. Wallace was re-elected secretary.

Delegates and officers of the congress were agreed that it was one of the most successful sessions of the organization that has brought irrigation farmers of the state together for a long while.

Reports are heard that the committee was submitted to the congress at the opening of the last session. Following is a digest of the resolutions adopted:

Indorsement of the Simont bill appropriating \$1,000,000,000 for reclamation and drainage.

Favoring Federal aid for the development of the Deschutes project.

Urging State Legislature to complete Tumalo project, or to co-operate with United States or private interests for its completion.

Ask Legislature to increase fund available for stream measurements to provide for reconstruction programme of irrigation development.

Call upon state officials to investigate and file suits to recover school, school indemnity and swamp lands secured from state through fraud.

Rules amended so that each organization holding membership in Oregon Irrigation Congress pay annual dues of \$5, payable in advance.

Recommendation to the Legislature that a full appropriation for the maintenance of the Oregon Bureau of Mines and Geology be granted.

Recommend change in law so that permits for use of water granted by State Engineer may be made definite as to the right of holder to change place of proposed use.

Recommendation for proper increase in compensation of water masters.

Recommend amendment of irrigation code so that special improvement districts may be formed within irrigation districts such as pumping or drainage that requires special expenditure; and amend other amendments to more clearly define meaning of the law.

Legislation is Favored.

The legislative committee was instructed by the congress to recommend to the legislature the enactment by the Legislature of the recommendations of President Upton in his annual address, as follows:

"That the canal, dam, reservoir sites and other property of irrigation and drainage districts be exempt from taxation."

"That the procedure for the confirmation of the organization of irrigation districts be reduced to one method of court procedure instead of three; that the statute be so amended as to abolish the fee of the Secretary of State for affixing the seal on certificates of irrigation district bonds; that fees heretofore collected by the Secretary of State be refunded to the respective irrigation districts."

It also was recommended that the present irrigation law be amended so as to permit the secretary of the district to sign warrants, instead of requiring that County Clerks sign such warrants.

Constitutional Amendment Asked.

Sentiment for the reclamation of not only arid lands by irrigation, but of logged-off, cut-over and swamp lands, prominent throughout the sessions in the deliberations of the congress, took form in a strong recommendation to the Legislature for submission of a constitutional amendment. This was approved with loud acclaim by the congress and adopted by unanimous vote, as were the resolutions offered by the committee. The resolution is as follows:

New Therefore, Be it Resolved, That the irrigation congress recommend to the Legislature of the state of Oregon in its 20th biennial session that the question of amending the constitution of the state of Oregon in this regard (that the credit of the state be used to further reclamation), be submitted to the voters of the state at the first special election or the next general election, so as to permit a competent board of state authorities to provide for a guarantee or purchase of the negotiable bonds

U. S. TROOPS ARE LOCATED

WAR DEPARTMENT NAMES STATIONS HELD OVERSEAS.

Combat and Depot Divisions of Army of Occupation Are at Many Places in France.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 11.—The location of all American divisions overseas on December 15 was announced today by the War Department.

Combat divisions of the Army of Occupation on that date were located as follows:

COLONEL PROUD OF SONS

General March Recalls Letter From Mr. Roosevelt.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 11.—During his weekly talk with the newspaper men today General March read a letter he had received from Colonel Roosevelt at the time General March's son was killed in an airplane accident. Colonel Roosevelt was acknowledging receipt of notice of his son Kermit's appointment as a Captain in Artillery. In conclusion he wrote:

"I thank you, sir. You have already drunk of the waters of bitterness; I suppose I shall soon have to drink of them; but, whatever befalls, you and I hold our heads high when we think of our sons."

This was written before Quentin Roosevelt was killed in France.

LANE COUNTY MAN NAMED

Orin C. Davis New Deputy to Internal Revenue Collector.

EUGENE, Or., Jan. 11.—(Special.)—Lane County's representation in the office of Milton A. Miller, internal revenue collector in Portland, has been increased to three with the naming of Orin C. Davis, of this city, as deputy to Mr. Miller, which was announced today.

Until recently Mr. Davis had been tax deputy in the Lane County Sheriff's office for several years. He will take up his new duties Monday.

The other two Lane County men in Mr. Miller's office are Jack Littell and George H. Hewitt.

CREDIT MEN MEET SOON

NORTHWEST CONFERENCE TO BE HELD THURSDAY.

Programme for Day Arranged and Large Attendance From Western Cities Expected.

Dewitt, who in an alleged confession to Sheriff's officials in this city several days ago admitted complicity in the robbery of two mining men near Grants Pass last year.

ASTORIA, Or., Jan. 11.—(Special.)—Edward Storm, an employe of the Engineers' Department in the construction of fortifications at Fort Canby, was instantly killed about 10 o'clock

this morning by falling from a rock near. He was a resident of Hammond, about 50 years of age and is survived by one brother, Werner Storm.

Dewitt has waived extradition, it was announced at the Sheriff's office.

Dewitt and a partner are alleged to have taken \$10,000 in gold bullion from the Oregon miners.

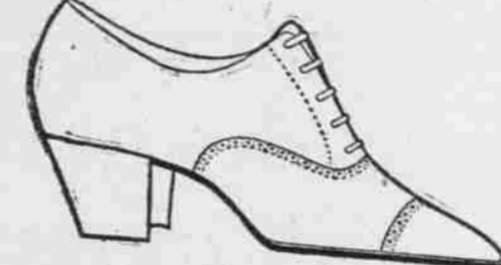

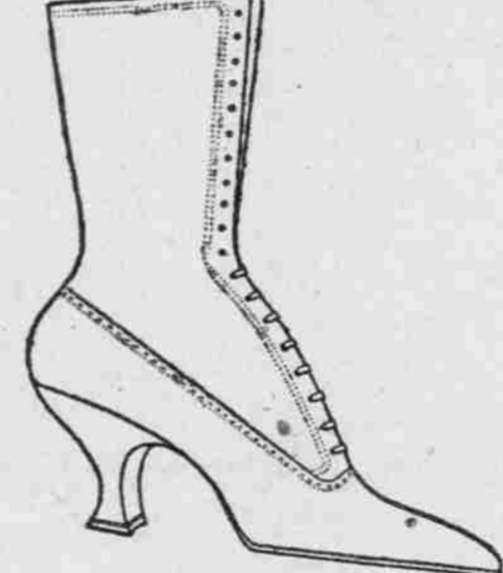
