WASHINGTON, Jan. 11.—Casualty lists today contain 157 names; 59 were killed, 102 died of wounds, 101 of disease, 14 of accident (3 aviators), 75 are wounded severely and 6 missing. The summary to date follows:

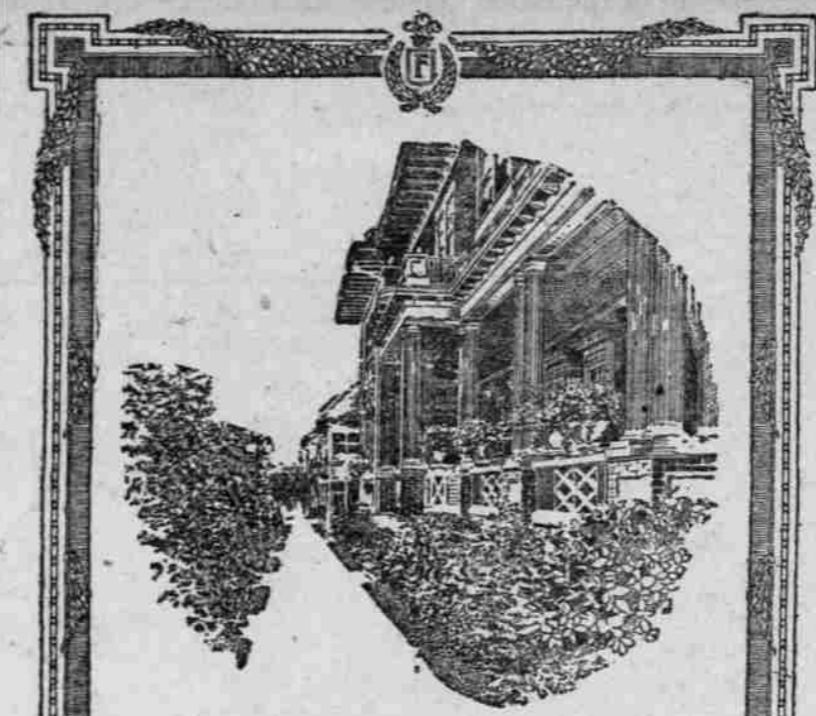
