OREGON LICENSE TAG SYSTEM IS POPULAR

Only Minor Amendments to Statute Expected.

SOLUNS CHANGE OPINIONS

Vehicle Registration Systems in Other Coast States Found to Be Too Expensive,

STATE CAPITOL, Salem, Jan. 25. (Special.)—Although there seemed some inclination early in the present session of the Legislature to attempt revolutionary changes in the system of handling automobile license tags in Oregon, this sentiment seems to have

dwindled practically to nothing. It seems extremely probable now from expressions of members of the Legislature, that only the most minor amendments will be offered to the plan for the administration of the motor vehicle laws. This does not include the probable doubling of the automobile license tax, which, in itself, is not considered a wholly administrative proposition.

The automobile registration department of Secretary Olcott's office has se-cured a large amount of data showing the manner of administration of license the manner of administration of license laws in other states, and, according to word which has been received in that office, the system in vogue here apparently has the stamp of approval of officials in charge of registration departments in other states and efforts now are being made to copy the Oregon plan.

California to Change System. California, it is said, is attempting to put through the plan for the annual license tag, such as is used in Oregon, the Motor Vehicle Owners' Association of that state having pronounced the permanent registration system a fail-ure. A bill to abolish the system, now in the House of the California Legislature, states the permanent registration system is unsatisfactory and unwork-able. Police officers of that state are also protesting against the permanent registration system, stating that it makes it practically impossible to

check up on stolen cars, Some of the members of the Oregon Legislature, who are advocates of the Washington plan, have now expressed themselves as opposed to it, since a practical demonstration has shown it to be more expensive than the Oregon plan. A proposal was adopted for experimentation in Washington by placing little markers on tags to obviate the necessity of purchasing new H-

Markers on Tags Costly. A statement of Secretary of State Howell, of Washington, says that it is now plain that this plan of service has

Secretary Olcott also has letters from representatives of the leading underwriters' associations who have examined the automobile registry systems in all the western states. They universally pronounce the Oregon plan the best in vogue. Indications are that the Oregon system of motor vehicle registration will be virtually copied in a majority of the guates during the next few years.






