The bill will be sent to Salem soon and presented for It is pointed out that the measure, if it becomes a law, will be one of the greatest factors in extermination of these pests, which annually do great damage to farm crops. The bill provides that "every person, firm, copartnership company and corporation owning, leasing, occupying, possessing or having share of or domain over any land, place, building, structure, wharf, pier or dock which is infested with ground squirrels or other noxious rodemts or predatory animals" to proceed at once to exterminate them by poisoning and trapping.
