

IDAHO PICKS BORAH AS NEXT PRESIDENT

Attack on Nation League Puts Senator in Limelight.

PARTY LEADERS HOPEFUL

Friends Assert Legislator Logical Successor to Work Done by Late Colonel Roosevelt.

BOISE, Idaho, March 22.—(Special.)—The republican party in Idaho again is being given prominence. Its leader, United States Senator W. E. Borah, is mentioned as a presidential possibility. He has come into the limelight because of his stand against the league of nations covenant in its present form. His friends declare he is the logical candidate of the party for the presidency. They are not only saying that here, but from Washington come the same reports.

It is claimed in Idaho political circles that a progressive republican will lead the party two years hence and that the senior senator from this state is picked as the man. The oration of Senator Borah in the senate when he attacked the league constitution advanced him as a peer among debaters in the halls of congress, say his friends. At the present time he is touring the country carrying his opposition directly to the people and it is anticipated he will, in due course of time, reach his home state to confer with party leaders and personal friends.

Roosevelt Political Friend.
Senator Borah was a close personal and political friend of the late Theodore Roosevelt. They had common views on the big issues before the country and their party. It was never a secret among his friends here that he was called into many private conferences at Oyster Bay by Colonel Roosevelt to discuss party matters. They assert Borah naturally falls into the leadership vacancy left through the untimely death of Roosevelt.

It is recognized as a somewhat peculiar coincidence that while Senator Borah is leading in the attack against the league of nations, Idaho's junior member of the United States senate, Senator John F. Nugent, democrat, is taking directly the opposite stand. With the adjournment of congress he has returned to his home here, preparatory to making a tour of Idaho to speak in behalf of the league. Senator Nugent is filling the recess term, having been appointed by Governor Alexander to succeed the late James H. Brady. He was elected last fall for the remainder of the unexpired term, when he defeated Frank R. Gooding, republican. In the election of 1920 he will again be a candidate to succeed himself for the six-year term. Gooding will also be his opponent.

Nugent to Speak for League.
Since he took his seat in congress Senator Nugent has been hard at work, but has taken little active part on the senate floor. He is one of the new members and is not overriding precedent. Senator Nugent, however, is well known as a debater. His friends declare that he will be heard from in no uncertain terms on the floor of the senate before his present term expires. They expect to see him champion the league of nations in stirring style when he tours the state. It is within the range of possibilities that Senator Borah will be in Idaho speaking against the league at the same time Nugent is speaking for it. This would make a keenly interesting situation.

"I am heartily in favor of the league of nations," said Senator Nugent. "I will probably have more to say about the matter before I leave Idaho. I have already received from both the northern and southern parts of the state invitations to deliver addresses and I intend to accept in as many instances as is practicable."

"I am sure it is generally recognized that the sixty-fifth congress, which expired March 4 after having been practically in session since April, 1917, will be recorded as one of the most momentous in the nation's history. It is practically certain that a special session of congress will be called because of the urgent necessity for appropriations in many departments of the government before July 1, which marks the beginning of the fiscal year."

Political leaders in the state have been watching the growing differences between Nonpartisan league members, which reached a climax at a meeting held at Nampa, league headquarters, during the week when directors of the co-operative publishing company, which directs publication of the league paper, attempted to oust W. G. Scholtz, manager and one of the recognized heads of the league. The directors were not successful. Scholtz retained the support of a majority of the directors. Two of the directors, W. W. Deal and C. M. Bumgarner, demanded an accounting of funds handled by Scholtz.

League to Establish Daily.
Clarence Van Deusen, former state auditor, who expected to be elected to re-nominate the league support for re-nomination, was employed to audit the books. It was reported to the directors that instead of a shortage in the funds there was a surplus unaccounted for.

Ever since the league entered Idaho's political arena claims have been made that a daily state paper would be launched. That dream is to be realized now. It is announced that on or about April 1 the paper will make its appearance at Nampa, where the league weekly is being published. The fight on Scholtz was to prevent him from taking charge of the paper. The league has been running a weekly. It was this publication that attacked three members of the state senate during the last session of the legislature, instigating graft, and then backed down on the charges, claiming they were only meant to be satirical.

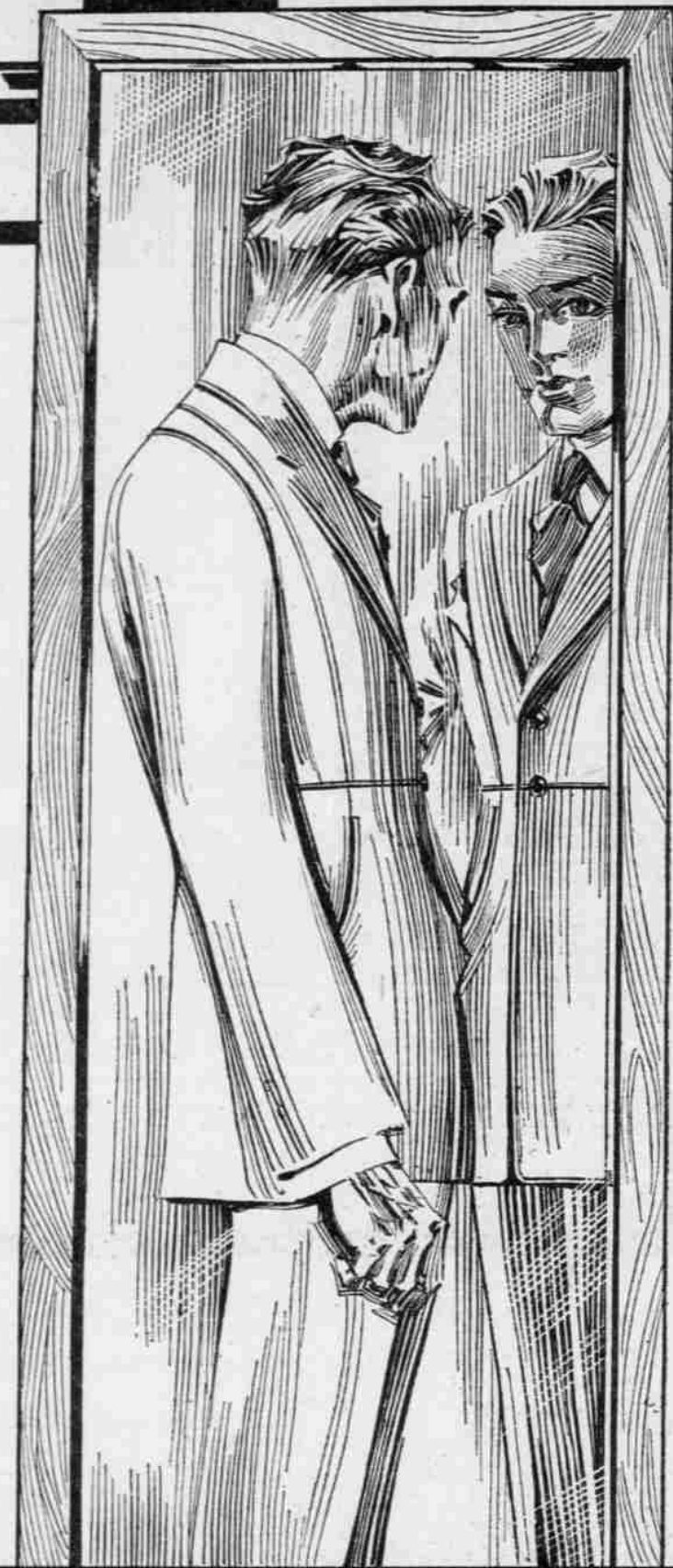

OREGON BOY IS HONORED

DALLAS SOLDIER 'HOBNOBBING' WITH FRENCH NOBILITY.

Lieutenant George M. Vause Writes of His Experiences as Guest of Some First Families.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, March 22.—"Hobnobbing" with the French nobility and some of the finest families in France is what the fortune of war has brought to Lieutenant George M. Vause, an Oregon boy. Lieutenant Vause is a native of the Dallas, Or., and in writing to his friend, Edward D. Baldwin, of that city, tells of experiences as guest of some of the first families of France. In a letter written January 4 he says:

"You wouldn't believe it, but I am experiencing the pleasure of being the guest of counts and countesses. Had New Year's dinner at the Marquis and Marquise de Tinguy's. There's nothing like being able to speak French over here. It gives you the right of way, all right."

Lieutenant Vause is an accomplished linguist. When he was first called to the colors and sent to Camp Hunt, Va., while still a private, he taught a class of officers the French language. Later he went to the artillery school at Fort Monroe, where he won his commission.
