Several Oregon Boys Arrive in New York En Route to Camp Lewis for Early Discharge.

NEW YORK, March 29.—(Special.)—Two days of rain and a near-blizzard have dampened the joy of the arriving troops. It is hard to be hilarious, even over coming home, when the weather is bitter. Usual doughboy pluck prevails, however, and weary though the camps and docks are, they are welcome after a rough sea voyage.

Miss Elizabeth Johnson, a 1912 graduate of the good Samaritan hospital, and Miss Leah Gambol, Portland, were two Oregon casual nurses who arrived with these hospital men, aboard the Great Northern.

Both have been abroad for nine months and were stationed at Naples on the Tiber river. Miss Johnson was transferred and served with a small unit near Naples. Miss Agatha Holloway, whose sister lives at 1609 East Yamhill street, Portland, was a volunteer on board.

"Walking Cases Aboard."

SHEEP-DIP DEFEATS FLU

Southern California Town Finds Treatment Effective.

BRAWLEY, Cal.—"The Sheep-Dipped Town." Such is the title by which this small Imperial valley city of southern California has recently come to be referred to by its neighbors. And even taken literally, the title virtually states a truth. Moreover, its citizens are quite proud of it, for, because it is sheep-dipped, it is claimed it is practically the only city its size, or larger, in the country that has no cases of influenza.

A wonderful discovery? Brawley citizens "Yes," even though she figuratively holds her nose in doing so. Whether the germs are sensitive to olfactory equipment and steer a course accordingly, or, odoriferously unwarned, they venture in and are victims of the same fate that overcomes the cooties on sheep, no one seems to know, but, be that as it may, ask a Brawleyite why Brawley has flu-free streets, and you'll get the answer: "Sheep-dip did it."

Here is the story: Brawley several months ago had its cases of influenza just like other places, and probably worse than some. The city council promptly ordered the closing of churches, schools, theaters and other gatherings of a public nature. This was given about a month's trial but it seemed to do no good. In fact, the number of cases steadily increased.

Then followed an order that the people wear masks, which they did for a few days, but the wearers, disliking the idea of appearing in public, especially at social functions, like musical fidos, they assembled en masse at the city hall, where they discussed the matter with the mayor and council from the various viewpoints, with the result that the masks, with whatever germs they may have trapped, were discarded and burned.

Then finally the city engineer stepped forth, a little hesitantly at first, and assumed the part of the hero. He had observed what sheep-dip does to sheep cooties, and, while he surmised that the city was a little too big to immerse intact in a sheep-dip vat, he believed that his sheep-dip idea might be experimented with in some other way.

His first act was to wash the streets thoroughly, and his second was to sprinkle them with sheep-dip. Using the city fire engine, with a water pump-rubbed and washed and flushed until sure of 70 pounds, the streets were everywhere in the nature of dirt had been swallowed up by the sewer system; and then, with the regular street sprinkler, was applied the sheep-dip, not to the entire street width, but to a seven-foot strip next the curbing on either side.

are merely in terminology, while others assert that the amendments are of substantial nature.

Covenant All-Satisfying.
The new constitution is becoming all things to all men and in it, according to the fathers of the undertaking, is to be found everything that republicans desire and nothing to offend democrats, everything that Great Britain wishes, and clauses that appeal to the French in short, it is being handled on a basis of satisfaction so far as preliminary assurances go.

There has appeared above the surface one of the reasons that animated portions of French, British and American public opinion in antagonistic to the league. It takes the form of a plan whereby all embracing covenants are to be ignored in favor of an alliance among the three nations named. That such a thought is being seriously held admits of no doubt, but that such a plan is executable is another matter.

Those who favor this policy do so in the belief that it is the most feasible manner of preventing Germany from returning to power, but to any student of public opinion in America it is a hope baseless in possibility.

In the matter of reparation, the part of Lloyd George and the French government has been irreverently but more or less truthfully described as being like that of the man who thought he was a pious host and kept looking for a piece of toast to lie on.

The British and French have made exaggerated promises to their people as to the amounts to be squeezed from Germany, and as the probable totals become increasingly small, due to the economic and territorial measures to be imposed, the governments of these two nations are seeking cushions to break their falls.

The British government has begun a systematic campaign of education on the subject, which is being harassed and hindered by embarrassing questions in the house of commons, and France is undergoing the same experience.

Reparation was talked again yesterday, but nothing definite was reached. It was talked again today, when highly rigid economic terms also were considered. None of the peace delegates is happy, each wearing a haunted look; for all are feeling the reaction of the critical attitude throughout the world, which is showing itself unmistakably and with greater force each day. The mediocrity that characterizes the large part of the peace delegation is hourly making itself felt in the lack of organization, lack of decision and lack of ability to ignore trifling details in which small minds find such delight.
