Nelson Page, Ambassador To Italy

THOMAS NELSON PAGE, American ambassador to Italy, who at present is in almost daily conference with President Wilson regarding the Italian situation, which, it is indicated, is fast clearing, has made known his intention to resign after the conclusion of peace. His resignation has no relation with the recent tension regarding Italy and at the last session of the conference, he, together with Colonel House, Premier Orlando and President Wilson, discussed the situation, the result of which indicated that a speedy understanding will be reached.

When Miss Helen Colley returned to New York after having been attached to the "Over There" theater league, she received an enthusiastic welcome. While overseas she entertained the soldiers of 40 divisions, and wore on her shawl the insignia of many of them.

Opening of the "Peace Congress" as the sixty-sixth congress has been designated, attracted many people to Washington and the organization of both houses was attended by demonstrations of public interest. Return to control of the republicans in both branches was signalled by a record of accomplishment for the first six days that eclipses all previous sessions.

General Haller has just returned to Warsaw and his troops are being transported from France through Germany. These troops are the legionnaires, about 16,000 of whom are American Poles, so that English is frequently heard. General Haller will take charge of the Polish troops against the bolsheviks.

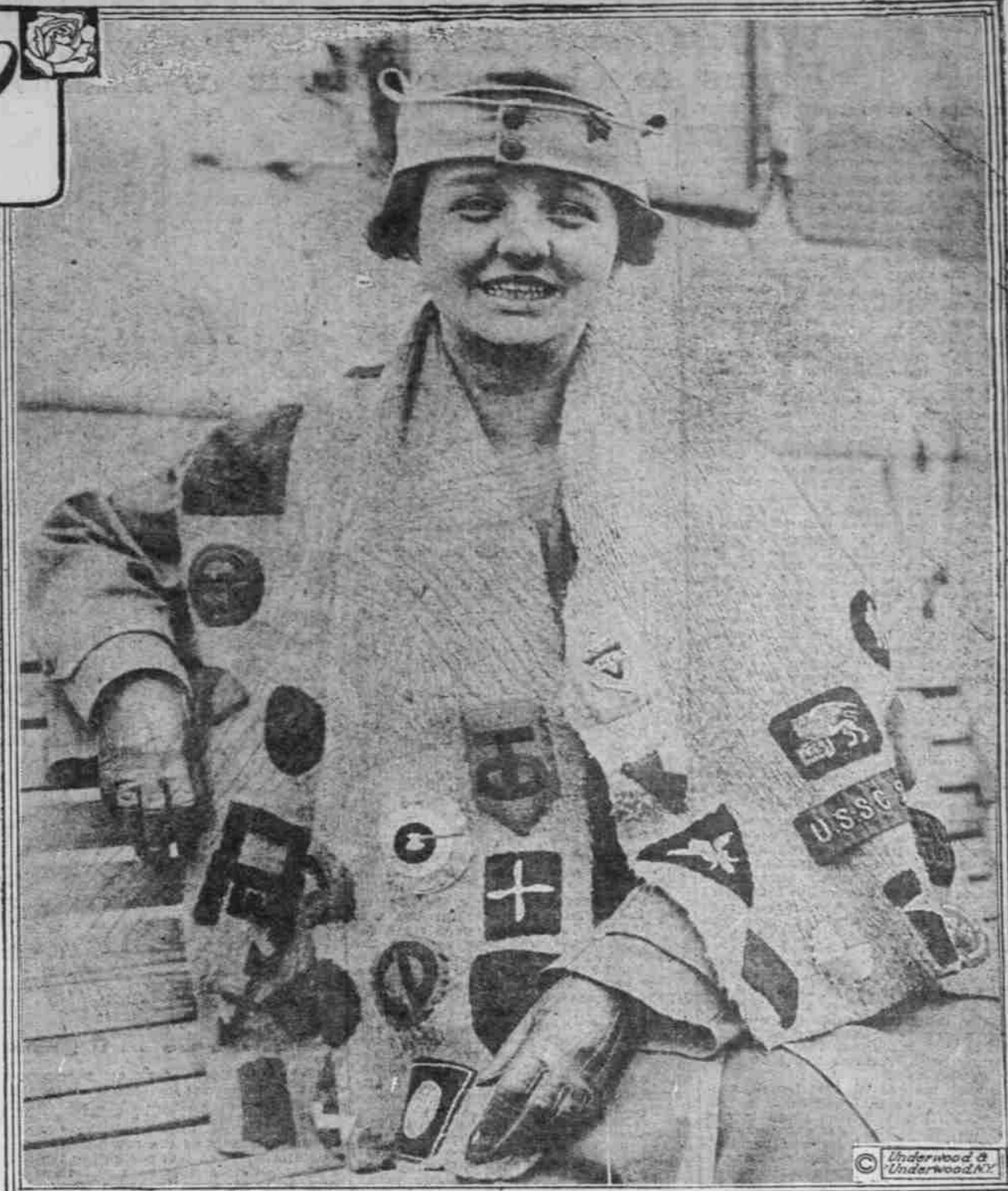
Madame Marguerite Sylva the noted operatic prima donna and her two

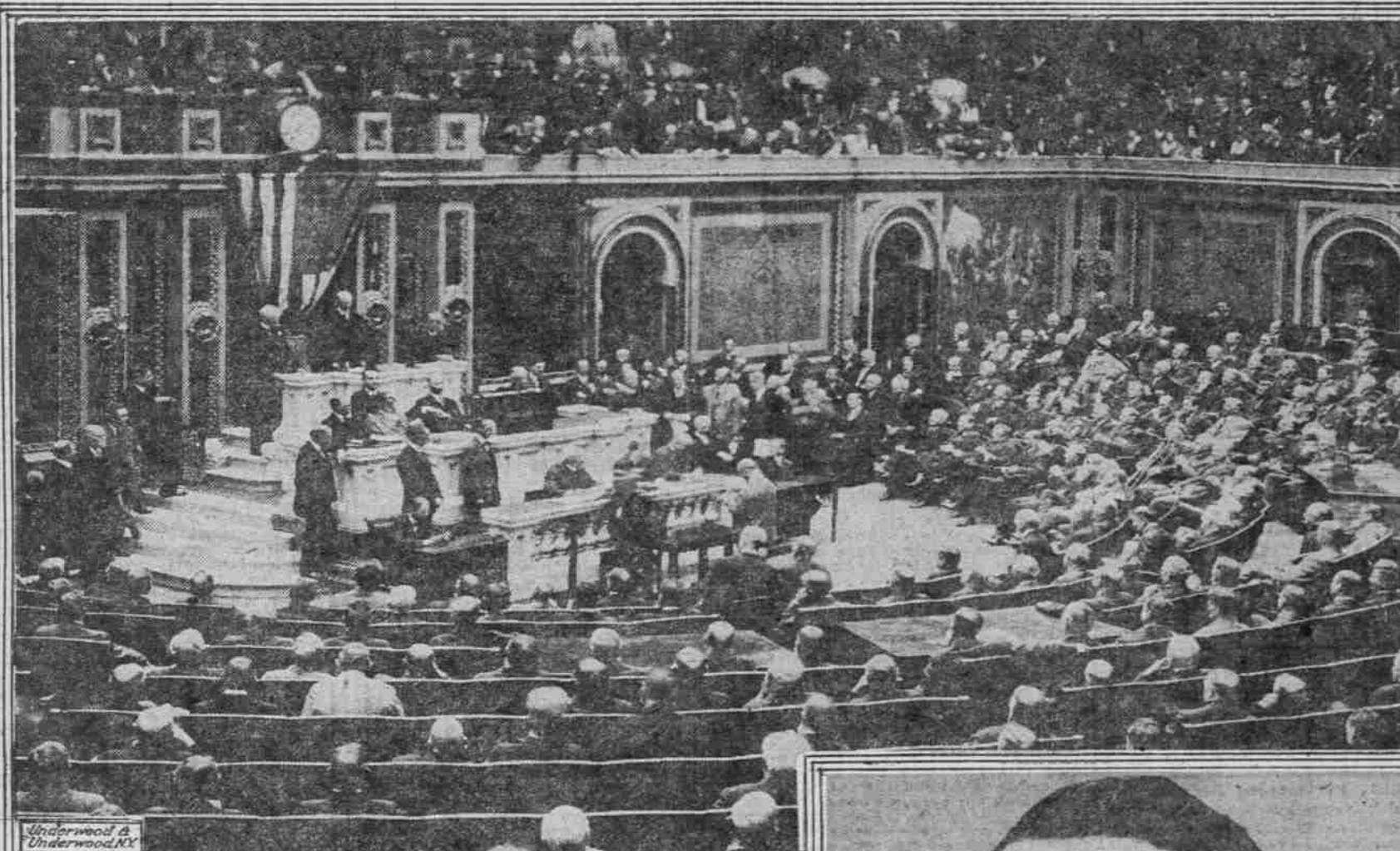
Raymond B. Fosdick who was chairman of the commission on training camp activities will be one of the permanent officials in the league of nations when the league is organized. The exact position which he will hold has not been made known. He is 26 years of age and his home before coming to New York was in Buffalo where his father is an educator. He was connected with Mayor Gaynor's administration as assistant corporation counsel. At present Mr. Fosdick is in Colorado on a vacation but will return shortly to Washington. He has notified President Wilson of his acceptance.

Colonel R. G. Cholmeley-Jones has been appointed by Secretary of the Treasury Carter Glass, director of the war risk insurance bureau, succeeding Colonel Henry D. Lindley, who resigned after a discussion with Secretary Glass.

Vinson L. McLean, 10-year old Washington boy who was fatally injured, and died a few hours later, when hit by an automobile in front of his home May 12, was known as the "hundred million dollar baby" throughout the United States for many years. He was the only heir to the McLean millions, the son of Mrs. Beale McLean, until four years ago, when the younger brother who now survives came to the home.

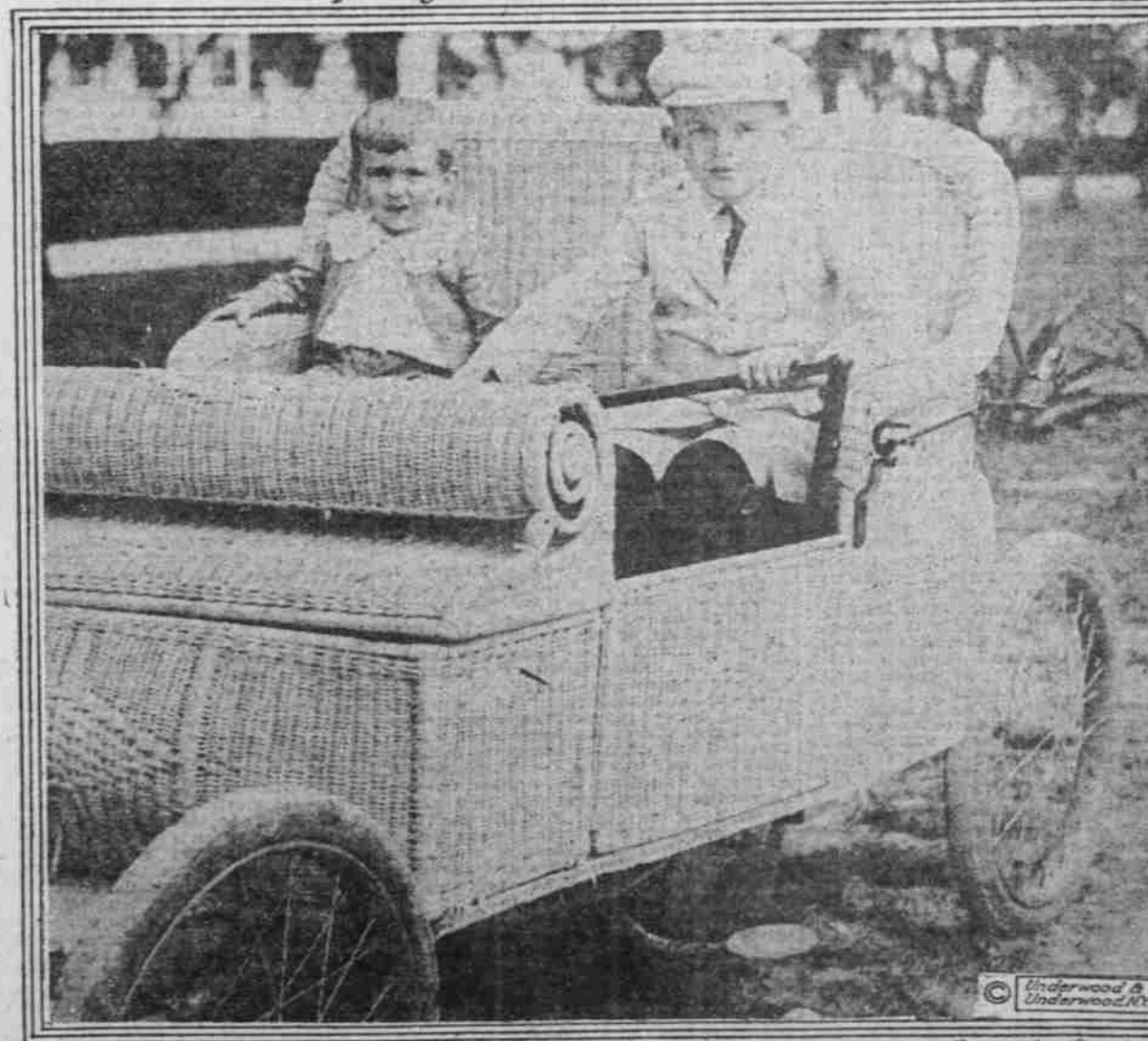
