Women physicians and surgeons, not being acceptable to the United States army for military service, conceived the idea at the outbreak of the war of establishing hospitals for the civilian population in France. Up to that time there had been sent 35 physicians, one dentist, ten lay workers and several anaesthetists and bacteriologists who are working in France and Serbia.

Because Serbia has borne the brunt of the struggle from the beginning, the need there just now seems to be greater than anywhere else and for that reason a drive is being put on in America for \$250,000 to erect another hospital in Serbia. Oregon's apportionment is \$2500. Dr. Alice Cardwell is chairman for Portland to raise this fund and it is for the purpose of raising money for this worthy cause that Miss Reingold and Miss Hall are giving their services. The entire proceeds will go to this work. Tickets will be \$1 each. The time and place of the next sale will be announced within a few days.
