BIRDS MUST LEARN THINGS. JUST THE SAME AS CHILDREN.

Young Are Taught How to Find Their Food, How to Fly, and Even How to Sing, by the Father and Mother Birds.

Prepared for the department of the Interior, bureau of education, by the National Kindergarten association.

THE young bird has to learn to do things just as small boys and girls do, although not in exactly the same way.

One of the first lessons he learns is how to fly. He really knows how to do this, but needs practice until his wings grow strong enough to carry him through the air. Many young birds begin this practice before they leave the nest. I have often seen a nestling beating and beating his wings without stirring an inch from his tiny home.

You have heard perhaps that the father and mother birds push their babies out of the nest. Do not believe it. I have seen many young birds leave the nest of their own accord, but never one pushed out. Sometimes the mother may coax her children, but often they fly out while the parents are away finding food.

After the young bird leaves the nest his father and mother follow and feed him for he does not yet know how to feed himself. This is the next lesson
