

NEW TRIAL IS DENIED 3 CONVICTED I. W. W.

Reds Who Made Defense to
U. S. Charges Lose Appeal.

SENTENCE DUE WEDNESDAY

Theodora Pollak, Basil Saffores and
Albert Fox Must Pay
Law's Penalty.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 14.—Motion for a new trial for Miss Theodora Pollak, Basil Saffores and Albert Fox, convicted with Industrial Workers of the World in Sacramento last January for acts of terrorism and sabotage, was denied by United States District Judge Frank H. Rudkin of Spokane here today. They will be sentenced Wednesday, June 18.

Theodora Pollak, Basil Saffores, and Albert Fox, three radicals convicted under the Espionage Act at Sacramento, were the only ones of the original 48 defendants to offer a legal defense. Four of this number died in the Sacramento jail, and the rest are serving sentences in Fort Leavenworth penitentiary. Miss Pollak, a former student at the University of California, was the only woman among the defendants.

Dynamite Explosion Recalled.
The case grew out of the investigation of the dynamite explosion which wrecked a portion of the home of Governor William D. Stephens in Sacramento on the night of December 17, 1917. No person was injured. The governor, who had just returned from a tour of the state on which he had made a number of addresses urging cooperation with the national government in the prosecution of the war, was in the executive mansion at the time. The responsibility for the blast never was fixed.

Subsequently, the Sacramento police received information of an alleged plot to blow up the plant of the Pacific Gas & Electric company in Sacramento. Headquarters of the I. W. W. were raided and arrests followed. Much of the evidence seized in the raid was submitted to the grand jury.

Many Overt Acts Charged.
Forty-five alleged overt acts were contained in the indictment, which charged the defendants as members of the I. W. W. with a conspiracy to violate the constitution of the United States, the espionage act, the draft act, and the enemy alien regulations.

Other overt acts included quotations from letters exchanged between the men in custody in Sacramento and those who were brought to trial in Chicago on charges of a similar nature. The indictment charged that the men conspired with William D. Haywood, secretary of the organization, Frank H. Little, who was lynched at Butte, Mont., Vincent St. John and a dozen others, among them a number of defendants in the Chicago trial. Much of the evidence introduced in the Chicago case was brought to Sacramento for use in connection with the trial there.

Seizure of Trophies Advised.

SPOKANE, June 14.—That the city park board take possession of a trainload of European war trophies left on a railroad siding here since the close of the victory loan campaign is the advice received here today from James Ford, secretary of the local chamber of commerce, who is in Washington, D. C. The matter of the sidetracked relics recently was taken up by the chamber with Secretary Baker of the war department and he replied that the trophies were the property of the government and the war department lacked authority to dispose of them.

Army Calls Dr. Suzallo.

SEATTLE, June 14.—Dr. Henry Suzallo, president of the University of Washington, has been asked by Colonel F. M. Morrow, head of the reserve officers' training camp at the Presidio, Cal., to take charge of a special conference at the Presidio during the week beginning June 22, it was announced today. The conference is to consider how to adjust the military work of colleges and universities to their customs, traditions, curricula and administration.

McCredie Sells Interest in Resort.

EUGENE, Or., June 14.—(Special.)—H. I. McCredie, owner of the Hot Springs resort on Salt Creek, 12 miles

above Oakridge, and 60 miles southeast of Eugene, has been sold by Judge W. W. McCredie, well-known baseball magnate, to John R. Cartwright, who will be associated in ownership and management with J. O. Hardin, who has been part owner and manager for the past two years. The deal includes the transfer of an excellent mountain hotel, a 40-acre tract of timber, cottages, bathhouse and pool.

NORTH DAKOTA BONDS O. K.

Supreme Court Orders Secretary of State to Sign Issue.

BISMARCK, N. D., June 14.—The North Dakota supreme court this evening, in a four-to-one decision, issued, on application of Attorney General Langer, a writ of mandamus requiring Secretary of State Hall to sign the \$2,000,000 Bank of North Dakota bonds. Chief Justice A. M. Christensen dissented.

Hall, whose signature must be had to make the bonds legal, refused to sign until the supreme court had passed on the question raised under the new league amendment removing the limit of bonded indebtedness, but which provides that all bonds issued in excess of \$2,000,000 must be secured by first mortgages.

Hall, who will return tomorrow from the northern part of the state, will begin signing the bonds on Monday, it is expected, and a day or so later, upon delivery of the \$2,000,000, the Bank of North Dakota will be ready to begin business.

Grants Pass Awaits Planes.

GRANTS PASS, Or., June 14.—(Special.)—Army airplanes en route from Portland to Mather field, Sacramento, are expected to arrive in Grants Pass about 11 o'clock Sunday morning. The landing field is in perfect condition, the dust having been laid by the recent slight showers. The field was scraped carefully and is suitable for a speed-away, autos having made 60 miles an hour over it.
