

AMERICAN ARMY IS READY TO ADVANCE

Force of 225,000 Endowed With Wartime Vigor.

"LOOK OUT, GERMANY," CRY

Preparations to Return Home Suddenly Galvanized Into Activities Preceding Thunder of War.

COBLENZ, June 21.—(By the Associated Press.)—Divisions of the 2d army, after being away from battlefields and war scenes for seven months, have again plunged into the stirring activities which generally precede the actual thunder of war.

COBLENZ, June 21.—(By the Associated Press.)—The 2d division was the first to move, getting under way early today. Along the Rhine near Neuwied, which has been the division headquarters, the 2d, with its infantry, machine guns, artillery and all the paraphernalia of war, pushed forward.

"Look Out, Germany," is the cry. The concentration of the first division is practically completed. As the men worked and marched today, they sang as men only can. Officers said the doughboys wanted Germany to sign the treaty and after that to go home, but "if the Germans did not sign—look out, Germany."

WASHINGTON, June 21.—Army officers here said today the American army now preparing to advance into Germany could operate as an entity separate from its home base for a year or more if circumstances should require. They declared the force of 225,000 men probably was the best equipped that ever had been assembled.

Personnel Carefully Selected. The personnel was described as practically "hand picked" with equipment of the most modern type. Great depots situated in the rear behind the Coblenz bridgehead were filled with the best of the reserve supply. In the event of an advance, it is the opinion here that the active elements of the divisions will be the active elements with the third and fourth as the immediate reserve and the fifth holding the third line.

COBLENZ, June 21.—(By the Associated Press.)—A state of siege has been declared in the district of Munster, in Westphalia, northeast of Cologne, because of Spartacan disturbances, according to information reaching American headquarters here.

WEIMAR, June 21.—(By the Associated Press.)—General Greener, successor to Field Marshal Von Hindenburg as chief of the German general staff, arrived from eastern Germany yesterday and conferred with the members of the cabinet about the Polish situation and the entire German situation. He reported that West Prussia, East Prussia and Silesia have determined to form an independent state if any portions of those states are allowed to go to Poland. He said the inhabitants of the three states are bitter at Germany, claiming that she had "deserted them and swapped and bartered away portions of those states for the sake of others."

Fighting With Poles Held Sure. Fighting with the Poles is said to be certain, forces of the Independent Noske guards or the German imperial troops, being the participants.

PARIS, June 20.—(By the Associated Press.)—The text of the ultimatum sent by the peace conference to Bela Kun, foreign minister of the Hungarian soviet government. It expresses the determination of the allies to put an end to "useless bloodshed," and demands that the Hungarian army fighting on Czechoslovakian territory cease immediately behind the Hungarian frontiers. The Hungarians were given four days from June 14 to obey, the ultimatum saying the allies "will consider themselves free to take any proper measures to assure justice, if the ultimatum is not complied with."

Bela Kun, replying under date of June 16, says, according to the dispatches that the Hungarian government has suspended hostilities as requested, but that in view of the present situation on the Czechoslovakian front it is impossible to recall detachments of Hungarian troops and evacuate the territory in the time fixed.

EDUCATOR TO HUNT SEALS. Lane Professor, 82, Secures Combination License.

EUGENE, Or., June 21.—(Special.)—Professor B. J. Hawthorne, aged 82, for many years a member of the faculty of the University of Oregon, now a practicing attorney in Eugene, yesterday obtained a combination hunting and fishing license in Eugene and will hunt and fish near his summer cottage at Seal Rocks on the coast south of Newport.

Winnipeg Under War Law. Soldiers were ordered into the heart of the city and soon the cowed demonstrators sought shelter. Armored cars, with machine guns swinging from one side of the street to the other, came down town.

Soldiers' Aid Welcomed. Mayor Gray and General Ketchen conferred after the soldiers got into action. The mayor said he hoped the prompt and effective measures taken by the troops had sufficiently restored order, so that the period of martial law might be considered at an end tonight, if possible. The city officials preferred to have the military continue to aid civil authorities, but not remain in complete control.

Tonight the soldiers were policing

the downtown section and certain districts were marked off as military territory. The riot act proclamation read by Mayor Gray during the trouble follows: "Our sovereign lord, the king, charges and commands all persons being assembled immediately to disperse and peaceably to depart to their habitations or to their lawful business, upon the pain of being guilty of an offense, on conviction of which they may be sentenced to imprisonment for life. God save the king."

YANCOUVER, B. C., June 21.—Effect of the Winnipeg riot on the strike situation in western Canada could hardly be analyzed by union leaders and others here tonight. This morning's feeling of confidence that the general strike here was about to end, however, tonight had changed to uncertainty.

In Victoria preparations are going ahead for the strike Monday morning of nearly 5000 metal trades workmen, with the possibility that the walkout will extend to other unions.

Union leaders announced tonight that a delegate from the Washington State Federation of Labor, who is to address a labor mass meeting here tomorrow, had brought assurances that the Washington federation would send food "in carload lots" for the families of Vancouver strikers. It was said the food was being contributed by the Washington Farmers' union.

STRIKE LOOMS IN ILLINOIS

Vice-President of District Given Authority to Act.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., June 21.—"Full authority to call a strike of telephone operators and linemen affiliated with the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers and employed in the Pacific coast district has been vested in L. C. Grasser, vice-president of the district, and unless differences are settled soon, I expect a general labor district will be called," said Secretary Charles P. Ford of the Electrical Workers' union in a statement given out here today.

Mr. Ford said he had been advised today that conferences between Vice-President Grasser and officials of the telephone companies were being continued in San Francisco and that "unless the issues involved were settled soon, a strike would be called throughout the district."

CARMEN IN MANILA STRIKE

Constabulary Guards Assist in Maintaining Service.

MANILA, P. I., June 21.—Manila is in the throes of a street car strike and detachments of constabulary are assisting the operating company in maintaining service. Acting Governor Yesiter, who has been asked by labor organizations to remove the guards, has refused to interfere. Labor leaders declare they will be powerless to prevent violence unless the guards are withdrawn.

A threat of a general sympathetic strike to compel recognition of demands made by the striking carmen has not yet materialized. Manila officials declare agitators are advocating the ousting of foreign capital because of alleged oppression of labor.

BRAZILIAN PARTY ARRIVES

President-Elect Is Honored at National Capital.

Vice-President and Mrs. Marshall Entertain Guests at Dinner. Marine Band Plays.

WASHINGTON, June 21.—President-elect Pessoa of Brazil and his party arrived in Washington this afternoon on a special train from New York, where they landed yesterday. The party met at the Union station by Acting-Secretary Polk and Assistant Secretary Phillips of the state department; Admiral Benson, chief of naval operations; General March, chief of the army staff, other government officials and the staff of the Brazilian embassy.

As the party passed through a marine guard of honor at the station the band played the Brazilian national anthem and a presidential salute of 21 guns was fired at the navy yard. Escorted by a troop of cavalry, they proceeded immediately to the home assigned them here.

Later Dr. Pessoa was received by house. At the same time, Madame and Miss Pessoa called on Mrs. Marshall and the calls were returned later.

Tonight the vice-president and Mrs. Marshall entertained the distinguished guests at a dinner at the Pan-American building.

(Continued From First Page.) war, but at this juncture it appears to mean that the Germans intend to sign the peace treaty. It looks like a plan against us in Berlin."

Commander Kenworthy, M. P., told the Dispatch he did not think the sinkings were carried out by order of the German government, but were engineered by a few hotheads sick of existence at Scapa Flow.

"The admiralty or the admiral in charge," he said, "cannot be blamed. Rather, the armistice commission is to be censured for not putting British crews aboard, but we are well rid of the ships, which were obsolete."

Lack of Guard Deplorable. The political correspondent of the Sunday Times, commenting on the news from Scapa Flow, says that the sole topic in London was general amazement that nothing apparently had been done to safeguard the ships against possibility of such destruction.

"The fact that the presence of British guards was absolutely precluded by the armistice should surely have necessitated more vigilant outside observation," he adds. "The public will want to know how the German commanders were allowed the free intercourse necessary for concerted action."

Jail Rented for Home. PENDLETON, Or., June 21.—(Special.)—In Pilot Rock, the railroad terminal of the southern part of Umatilla county, the housing problem has become so serious that its jail, vacant for months, has been rented by the city as a dwelling house.

BERLIN REPORTS NEW IRON CABINET FORMED

Herr Bauer Becomes Premier, Dr. Mueller Foreign Minister.

OUTLOOK SEEMS BRIGHT

American Summary Shows Sentiment Throughout Germany Favors Acceptance of Terms.

BERLIN, June 21.—(By the Associated Press.)—A new German cabinet has been formed under the premiership of Herr Bauer, formerly minister of labor, with Dr. Herman Mueller, the majority socialist leader, as minister of foreign affairs.

The other members of the cabinet are: Minister of the interior, Dr. Eduard David, Minister of finance and vice-premier, Matthias Erbsberger, Minister of economics, Herr Wiesel, Minister of labor, Herr Schloke, Minister of the treasury, Herr Meyer, Minister of posts and telegraphs, Herr Giesberts, Chief of the colonial office, Dr. Bell, Minister of national defense, Gustav Noske, Minister of food, Dr. Schmidt. No appointment has been made to the ministry of justice. Herr Meyer, the new head of the treasury department, is a native of Kaufbeuren, Bavaria.

Herr Bauer, the new premier, is a socialist and held the post of minister of labor. In the course of his official duties he has had much to do with the striking workmen and recently brought about a settlement of the general strike in Berlin.

Mueller New Leader. Dr. Mueller has become one of the leaders of the majority socialists since the revolution. He was party whip in the national assembly. In a recent speech Dr. Mueller declared that the former German emperor was not wanted in "Germany and that he 'belongs in a pathological ward.'"

The name of Eduard David has been linked with that of Philipp Scheidemann as one of the leaders of the German socialist party in the reichstag since before the war, from 1915 to the time of the revolution last November. Dr. David, in his speeches in the reichstag, opposed a war of conquest by Germany.

Dr. David was a member of the original German delegation to the peace conference, but incurred the criticism of Herr Landsberg on account of ill health. Mathias Erbsberger was head of the German armistice commission and is a leader of the central, or clerical, party. The famous reichstag peace resolution adopted in July, 1917, and declaring for "peace without annexation or indemnity" was the work of Erbsberger.

Noske Rose With Ebert. Gustav Noske became a leading figure in German politics under the republican government set up in Germany with Friedrich Ebert as president. Herr Noske was a storm center early in the year because of his drastic measures as minister of defense in putting down the spartacan uprisings.

He policed the country effectively, but incurred the criticism of those who objected to his firm tactics in dealing with all opposition. Many summary executions followed an order issued by him that all persons found fighting the government forces should be shot immediately. He was mentioned as probable dictator, if it should become necessary to appoint one through the predicted fall of the government some months ago.

PARIS, June 21.—The German provincial press is strongly urging the speedy signing of the treaty. Berlin advices to the American delegation summarizing the situation show the sentiment throughout Germany to be in favor of accepting the peace terms. The advices cover Leipzig, Dresden, Chemnitz and other representative regions.

Geographically analyzed, the advices indicate that all the southern German states are favorable to the acceptance of the treaty, while the Prussian regions are maintaining some opposition.

The advices say that in many regions sentiment is favorable to immediate signing and that delay would be suicidal. It is believed the majority socialists and the centrists in the national assembly will vote in the affirmative, but the centrists may attach conditions and ask that "humiliating" clauses and terms, like the trial of the former emperor, blame for the war and loss of colonies, be modified.

Conference circles are cheerful over the outlook. Information received by the American delegation apparently is confirmed by advices to the other delegations.
