

RESERVE CORPS CAMP
OPENS AT PRESIDIO

Forty-Seven Students of Oregon Report for Training.

12 STATES REPRESENTED

600 Men Enroll for Six Weeks' Work; New Mexico Institute Has Largest Delegation.

THE PRESIDIO, of San Francisco, Cal., June 21.—(Special.)—The Reserve Officers' Training Corps camp opened here today with Colonel Pierce A. Murphy commanding. Out of approximately 600 men who have reported 47 are Oregon students, 42 coming from the Oregon Agricultural college and five from the University of Oregon.

Twelve colleges are represented in the advanced course section of the corps by 85 men, who will drill in one company. These advanced men are assigned to company H, with Captain Evan K. Meredith commanding, assisted by Harry K. Kingsbury and Walter T. Scott, first lieutenants, and seven sergeants.

Two battalions are being formed, with Majors J. J. Boniface and D. J. Richard, United States army, commanding. Approximately 50 officers have reported for duty as instructors. Although the camp training will be in infantry, the personnel of the officers includes many other branches, the commanding officer being commissioned in the cavalry.

Forty colleges and high schools are represented in the basic course section of the camp in which 424 men had reported here late this afternoon.

Students from 12 states already have registered and a few more are expected. The camp training will last for six weeks, ending about August 2. All men on reporting are given physical examinations and prophylactic inoculation for prevention of typhoid and paratyphoid, and are also being vaccinated.

New Mexico Military Institute has the largest delegation here, with 127 men, 111 in the basic course and 26 in the advanced course. The University of Washington is second with 57 men, 45 of them in the advanced course and 12 in the basic. The Oregon Agricultural college is third with 42, of whom 19 are advanced and 23 basic. A special Y. M. C. A. has been established for the use of student members.

Near the barracks, which are down on the water front near the Oregon building at the Panama exposition grounds, a post exchange has also been brought to the quarters for the purpose of furnishing supplies, confectionery and other articles to the boys.

The address of the students here now will be company, R. O. T. C., Infantry, Camp Presidio of San Francisco, Cal.

ROAD PAVING UNDER WAY

Highway Soon to Be Hard-Surfaced to Top of Rainier Hill.

RAINIER, Or., June 21.—(Special.)—The Warren Construction company is making good its promise to hard-surface the top of Rainier hill. It is placing about 900 feet of hard-surface each day and will soon reach the top of the Rainier hill.

As soon as connections are made with the old Clatskanie road at the top of the hill, the three-mile hill road will be closed to traffic and all vehicles will be compelled to detour over the county road which passes the Townsend farm. At the present rate of progress, it is probable that the hill road will be closed for about four weeks.

C. While under the influence of drugs it is stated Dr. McGaughey became violent in a local hotel this afternoon, setting fire to his room and then breaking the furniture and windows.

Bend to Hold Wool Sale.

BEND, Or., June 21.—(Special.)—Preparations have been completed for the sale arranged by the Central Oregon Woolgrowers' association to be held here next Tuesday. In anticipation of the sale, 450,000 pounds of wool are already stored in Bend, and more is expected before bids are received. A majority of the fleeces are fine wool. A special meeting of the association will be called following the sale.

HEPPNER, Or., June 21.—The Heppner Hotel association has accepted the plans of John V. Hennessy, architect, for a three-story, \$80,000 structure to be built this summer. The building will be of pressed white brick, 61x112 feet. Each of the 50 rooms will be an outside room and 30 of them will have private baths, with all modern conveniences.

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PIONEERS ENJOY BARBECUE

PICNIC AT BROWNSVILLE ATTENDED BY HUNDREDS.

Corporal Deveron of Eugene, Veteran of Canadian Army, Tells of Experience in Great War.

BROWNSVILLE, Or., June 21.—While the savory barbecue meat was slowly but surely roasting in the deep dug pit, the hundreds of pioneers and sons and daughters assembled at Brownsville on Thursday drank deeply of the carnival and picnic spirit and prepared themselves for Friday's feast.

Some attended the baseball game, which Brownsville won from Albany by the close score of 5 to 3. Others preferred to revel at the dancing pavilion, where the jazz band holds sway. Still others would find outdo themselves at the red lemonade stands, or ride on the various wheels, merry-go-rounds and ferris wheels.

In the great grove of whispering trees the pioneers themselves and their interested relatives and friends packed all of the sitting and standing room and listened to addresses of prominent speakers. Corporal Deveron of the Canadian army spoke on his experience in the fields of France. The corporal, although an American boy, enlisted in Canada with the Canadian expeditionary force, and after being shot at once overseas went at once to the front and took part in many great battles, among them the battle of Vimy Ridge. The lad's home is at Eugene.

Another speaker of the day was Fred Lockley of the Journal who was in France as a Y. M. C. A. man. Mr. Lockley's address dealt largely with his experience in the theater of war. His stories of the bravery of the American doughboys in the world war were very strongly applauded by the pioneers and veterans of other wars.

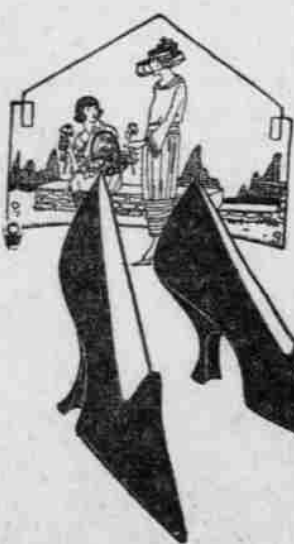

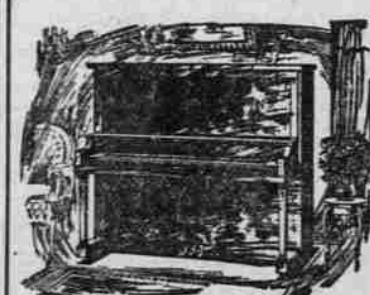
