

SENATORS LINING UP IN FIGHT ON LEAGUE

Root Outlines Plan for Only Limited Acceptance.

BORAH MAY LEAVE PARTY

Who Senator Cannot Stay With Republicans Unless They Take Stand Against League.

WASHINGTON, June 21.—The league of nations controversy in the senate was enlivened today by a series of developments accepted as foreshadowing the lines into which the final ratification fight may fall.

Elihu Root, secretary of state under President Roosevelt, laid before the foreign relations committee a programme for acceptance of the league with certain reservations.

Senator Borah, republican of Idaho, gave notice in a senate speech that he could not remain in the republican party if it failed to take a more definite stand against the league.

Senator Hitchcock, democrat of Nebraska, replied that no party dared stand against the league proposal and declared the covenant was assured of ratification by republican votes.

Knox Calls for Showdown. Senator Knox of Pennsylvania decided to call for a showdown of senate opinion Monday by bringing in his resolution declaring the treaty cannot be accepted with the league covenant attached.

Of these developments the recommendation of former Secretary Root, presented after two days of conference here with league opponents, attracted widest discussion tonight because it was regarded as embodying a plan on which an appeal is likely to be made for unity of action by all who do not fully approve the Paris covenant.

The reservations Mr. Root suggested should be written into the senate's ratification resolution would be designed to soften the nation's obligations for guaranteeing the integrity of foreign countries and to further safeguard the Monroe doctrine, the right of withdrawal from the league and the determination of purely domestic problems. These reservations could be made, the former secretary declared, in perfect harmony with the traditions of diplomacy and without endangering other league provisions.

Opposition is Determined. The decision to bring up the Knox resolution was reached after a conference of leaders had agreed that some vote revealing the exact state of senate opinion would clarify the air and strengthen the position of league opponents. There were rumors tonight that this decision might be reversed, however, and a substitute for the Knox measure brought in later in the week. But it seemed certain that the opposition was determined to show its strength in some concrete manner before the treaty is submitted for ratification.

Senator Borah threatened withdrawal from his party during a sharp debate, started when the Idaho senator read into the record a petition signed by 38 prominent New York republicans asking that the peace treaty be ratified without delay. Among the signers were George W. Wickersham, former attorney-general, and Oscar S. Straus, former ambassador to Turkey, who were bitterly assailed by Mr. Borah.

Mr. Straus was talking to several senators just outside the senate chamber when the speech was made. The speaker also quoted an appeal of former President Taft against the Knox resolution in which Mr. Taft urged that politics should stop at the water's edge. "I agree with that perfectly," continued Mr. Borah. "Does politics stop at the water's edge regarding the Monroe doctrine? Yes, but on this side of the water. And so with a multitude of other things in this covenant. It is inconceivable that this can be kept out of politics, for the people have no way to express themselves except through political parties."

"Was that the view of those who signed the round robin?" interrupted Senator Pomeroy, democrat of Ohio. "I can only assume to speak for myself," replied Mr. Borah. "There never was an instant when I would not have denounced my party as cowardly if it had taken a stand for this league. Mr. Hayes (the republican national chairman) says this is an American question. It is, but it has two sides. On which side does he stand?"

"I have been a republican all my life. I should like to remain a republican. But I would not like to see a form that indorsed this treacherous scheme and I would spit upon any platform that was silent on the subject. The international bankers may monopolize everything else in the United States, but they can't monopolize the right to organize a new political party."

Mr. Hayes cannot commit the republican party to neutrality. Certain republicans do not want the party to take a definite position because they know the democratic party is thoroughly organized and that in every precinct in the United States it is fighting for the league of nations.

Party. "So far as I'm concerned it doesn't make any difference what the republican party does. I know there'll be a party that will stand for American rights."

In his reply Senator Hitchcock declared it was plain why the republicans dared not take a party stand against the league because "every test of public sentiment made heretofore has shown an overwhelming sentiment, republicans as well as democrats, for the league."

The Nebraska senator gave the results of a number of newspaper and magazine polls, all showing majorities for the league and read a long list of republican papers which he said were supporting it.

If the republicans defeat this treaty," Mr. Hitchcock continued, "they will find out what the sentiment of the country is."

Asked by Senator Borah if he would join in preparing a measure for a popular vote on the question, the Nebraska senator replied there was no need for the treaty would have enough republican votes to secure ratification.

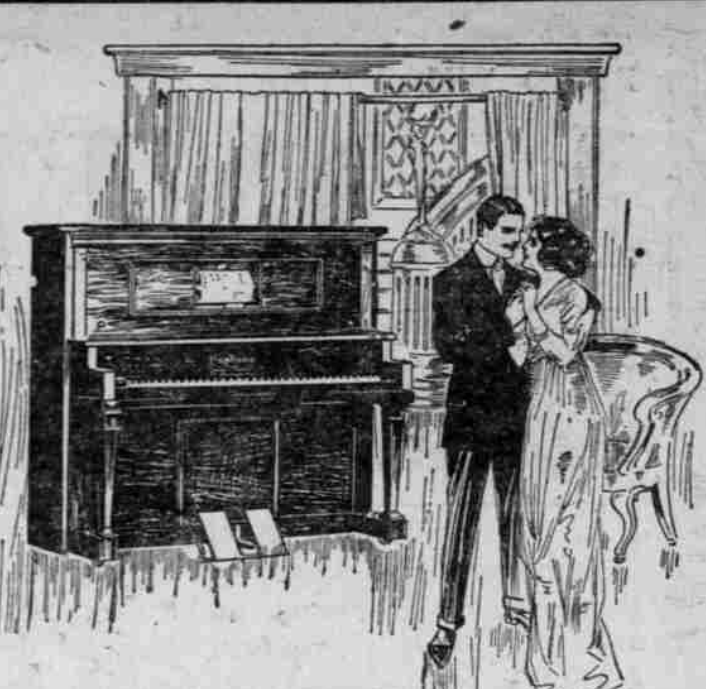
HEAVY FINES METED OUT

SOLDIER-SWINDLER TRIED

FRENCH PROMOTER REARRESTED ON CIVIL CHARGE.

Banker Out on Bail Disappears Before War and Is Now Found in Army.

PARIS, June 21.—Henri Rochette, banker and promoter, who was convicted of swindling before the war broke out and who disappeared while the case was on appeal only to return to France and serve under an assumed name in an automobile section, was brought before the criminal court again today on the charge of abuse of confidence in connection with the issue of \$500,000 francs in bonds of the Central Mexican railroad in 1910.

M. Rochette throws the responsibility on his associate, M. Carbonneau, now dead, who he claims sent part of the funds realized from the sale of the bonds to a Mexican named Madero, who used them for revolutionary propaganda in that country.

Henri Rochette was arrested in 1908 charged with wholesale swindling in connection with the operation of bucket shops. It being alleged that \$20,000,000 was involved. Released on bail he remained at liberty until 1915, when he disappeared. He was located in Mexico City later and occupied a position close to Francisco Madero, then president of Mexico. The French government demanded his extradition, but he again disappeared and took refuge in Switzerland.

In October, 1916, Rochette was found in an automobile section of the French army and placed under arrest.

MRS. A. B. GORHAM DEAD

Widow of Canby, Or., Business Man Dies After Long Illness.

OREGON CITY, Or., June 21.—Mrs. Anna M. Gorham, a prominent resident of Canby and widow of the late L. B. Gorham, a former realty dealer of that place, died at her home Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock after a lingering illness.

Mrs. Gorham was 65 years of age and had resided in Canby for a number of years.

Funeral services will be held Sunday morning at 11 o'clock, Rev. Joselyn of Canby officiating.

Mrs. Gorham is survived by her son, Lieutenant George Gorham, who is in France.

STUDENTS IN CONFERENCE

FRIENDLY INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS AIM OF GATHERING.

Seven Thousand Young Men and Women from 50 Different Nations Now Studying in U. S.

NEW YORK, June 21.—Cementing of friendly international relations will be a principal objective of the student conferences to be held this month under Young Men's Christian Association auspices in various sections of the United States.

Seven thousand students from 50 different nations are in colleges and universities in the United States, many of them studying in New York. These men have been invited by Charles D. Hurrey of this city, general secretary of the committee on friendly relations among foreign students, to attend these student summer conferences.

Conferences have been arranged for Northfield, Mass., June 20-30; Lake Geneva, Wis., June 13-25; Blue Ridge, N. C., June 13-25; Seneca Falls, N. Y., June 13-25; Estes Park, Colo., June 17-26, and Hollister, Miss., June 6-15.

Interchange of ideas between Chinese, Latin-Americans, Japanese and other foreigners studying in this country will be one of the main purposes of the conference, inasmuch as it is felt that these young men studying in our universities may promote or hinder international friendship and trade according to the impression they receive of American business men and methods.

A special programme is being arranged for Latin-American students at Lake Geneva and Northfield, but delegates will be welcomed at all of the other conferences.

Among the speakers at the various conferences will be Dr. Robert E. Speer, Dr. John R. Mott of New York, general secretary of the Young Men's Christian Association; E. G. Inman, secretary of the committee on co-operation in Latin-America; Tancred P. Pinchot, editor of El Norte Americano; Jose U. Escobar, industrial secretary, El Paso, Tex.; H. H. Hunnicutt, director, agricultural college, Lavras, Brazil; Professor Rafael Soto, University of Illinois; J. M. Hernandez, editor of El Estudiante Latin Americano.

One of the subjects to be discussed at the Latin-American conferences will be methods by which Latin-American students may interpret to the United States the aspirations and achievements of their people.

On a high mountain overlooking this scenic canyon, Mrs. Rooney took up her abode in a lonely cabin.

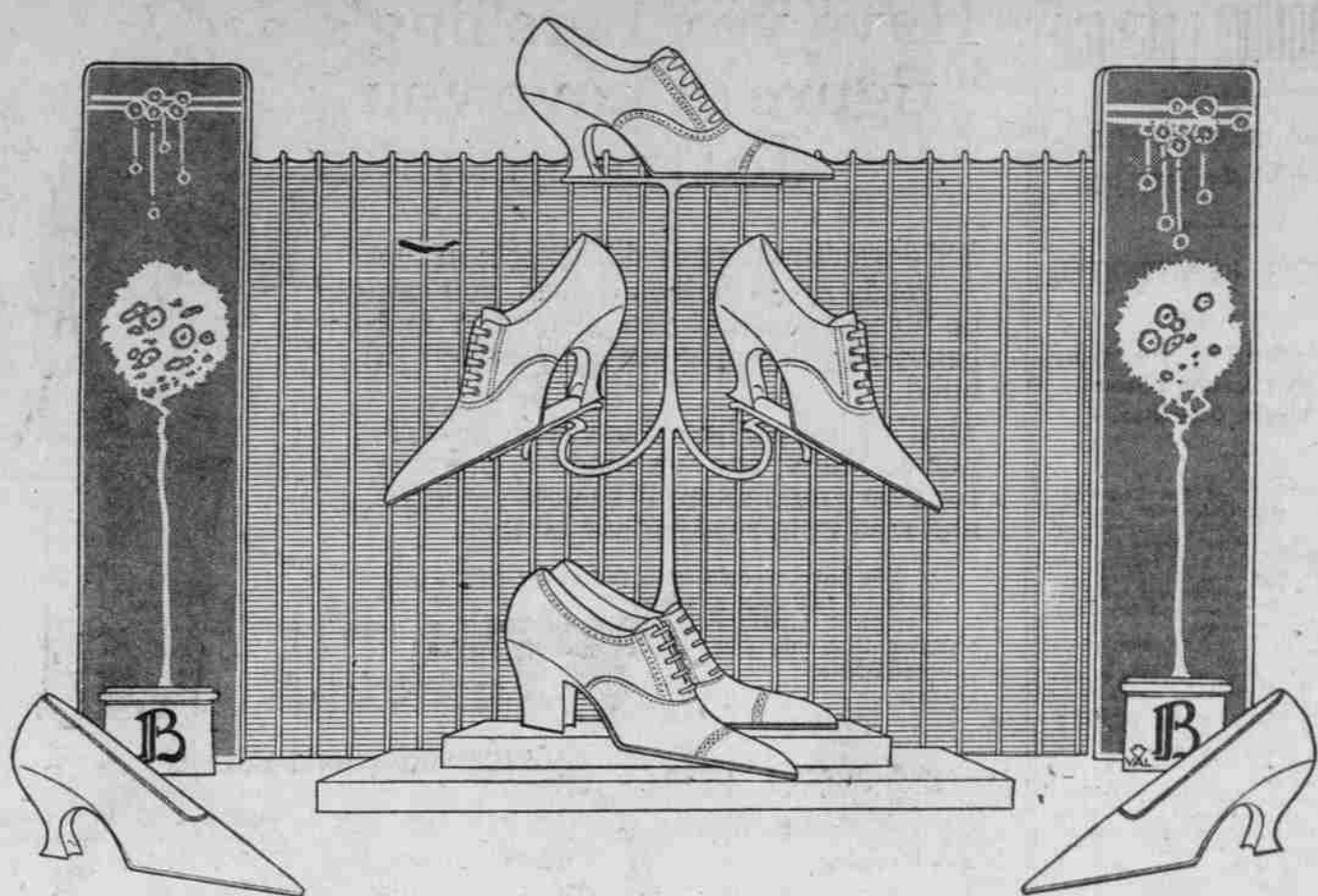
