FIVE THOUSAND ELKS AND THEIR FAMILIES
WILL MEET ON KLAMATH LAKE IN AUGUST

Barbecue to Be Big Feature for Entertainment of "Bills" at Second Annual Convention of Oregon Association

Elks Temple At Klamath Falls.

ON UPPER Klamath lake, 5000 Elks and their families will gather in August to participate in an Elk barbecue, one of the features arranged for the entertainment of the Bills who will attend the second annual convention of the Oregon State Elks' association.

Klamath Falls will be thrown open during the three days of the convention, every citizen having assured the convention committee that real hospitality will await the lodgers who journey to the southern city to attend the annual convocation.

Portland Elks will travel to Klamath Falls in a special train. A transportation committee, appointed by President William S. Kennedy, of the state Elks' association composed of William McGinn, chairman, William McMurray and Charles Stinger, has arranged for special rates on the certificate plan. Under this arrangement the round trip fare to the convention from Portland, including sleeping accommodations on the trip and at Klamath Falls will be \$24.27. This rate includes the war tax.

Many of the delegates from Portland, as well as other points in the state, plan to make the trip by automobile. A special automobile parking area will be arranged where those who desire to camp during their stay in Klamath Falls may have every known convenience.

E. B. Hall, chairman of the Klamath Falls convention committee, is devoting all his time to making the arrangements for the entertainment of the Elks. The definite programme has not been completed, but it is known that side trips to scenic wonders in the Klamath country, fishing trips, the barbecue on upper Klamath lake, a visit to the Modoc lava beds, a continuous carnival in Klamath Falls and special

stunts each evening of the convention are already assured.

The Oregon State Elks' association includes in its membership every Elk within the confines of the state. In addition to the Oregon Elks, members of the Washington and California State Elks' association will attend the Klamath convention. A ritualistic contest between Portland and Ashland lodges will be conducted at the convention, the winner to be pitted against the best ritualistic team the Washington State Elks' association can produce at the convention in Washington, which will be held in the week following the Oregon convention.

One of the features in connection with the barbecue on upper Klamath lake will be a vaudeville performance, the acts to be produced by members of every lodge in the state. George O. Brandenburg, chairman of the Oregon State Elks' association "pep" committee, is in charge of this feature.

CAMP DIX VOCATIONAL WORK
MAKES NEW MEN OF SOLDIERS

Wounded and Disabled Men Taught Trades Which Banish Fear of Being Useless for Rest of Life.

THE terrible, haunting fear filling the mind of many a returning hero, wounded and crippled, that his disability would unfit him for earning a livelihood after the war has been banished for more than 2000 of these fine young Americans who sacrificed a leg, an arm, an eye or the use of some bullet-cleaved or shell-torn muscle or nerve "over there," by their experience in the vocational schools of the Camp Dix convalescent center.

This school, recently pronounced by inspectors of the surgeon-general's department the best of any of its type in the demobilization camps in the United States, has turned hundreds of permanently disabled tanks from threatened melancholia toward a bright outlook on the future and has sent not a few of them home to positions paying better wages than any of them earned before they placed their lives in the human bulwark to save civilization from the Hun.

The value of the vocational work has not been confined, however, to training men for new occupations or for advanced positions in their old trades. Medical officers quickly recognized its importance in occupational therapy, and the course was made compulsory for every convalescent passing through the center, except those men who, when released from the hospitals, were found to have reached maximum physical development and to be ready for immediate discharge. Their minds and hands occupied, their worries forgotten, their hope renewed and ambition kindled, the physical improvement of

Jersey actually danced away with glee when he "graduated" from the center. He said the war had given him the only chance of his life to realize his ambitions. Part of one hip was shot away; there was a terrible scar on his chest and another on his back, where a Hun bullet had passed entirely through his body, and he had lost the sight of one eye. But he had always wanted an American school education, and, lying for months on a hospital cot, there had come to him through his own tortures the ambition to become a physician so that he could relieve suffering.

A "Y" teacher had started him through the common school course here and the federal vocational board had just informed him that he was to prepare himself to take a complete course in one of the country's most noted medical colleges at the expense of a grateful Uncle Sam, for whom he had all but laid down his life.

WOODLAND TO CELEBRATE

Committee Promises Big Time at July 4 Programme.

WOODLAND, Wash., June 21.—(Special.)—The committee appointed by the Progressive club to arrange for the big victory Fourth of July celebration here this year has made great progress towards the affair, and it promises to be the biggest event of the kind ever held here. A band, singing school children trained by Frank Fields, parade, water and athletic sports backed by fine prizes put up by local people, a speech by a silver-tongued orator who cannot yet be announced and a big parade will be the order of the day. The committee promises that there will not be the usual delays that often feature these occasions.

The fairgrounds will be used for the games and athletic stunts and the large hall will be used for the speaking and other entertainments that require seating room.
