

IDAHO SOLDIERS TO FIGHT MONDELL ACT

Long Settlement on Farms to Obtain Title Opposed.

FIRST CONVENTION CALLED

Discharged Service Men Want Financial Aid to Acquire Property in Cities and Towns.

BOISE, Idaho, June 21.—(Special.)—The first soldier and sailor convention in the history of this state will be held in Boise, Wednesday and the mooted issue will be the soldier settlement act now pending before congress, to which there has developed strong opposition from those whom it was expected to give the greatest benefit—the men who entered the service of their country during the recent war. Efforts will be made to place the convention on record against the Mondell bill that is now before congress.

Opposition to the bill from soldiers and sailors came as a surprise. The general impression seemed to be that the soldiers and sailors were unanimously in favor of the measure and would insist on its passage. Another surprise came with the announcement from Washington that the senate was fighting the measure at Washington on the grounds that it discriminated against the farmers in the country and constituted a conspiracy to give them competition.

Delegates to Be Elected.

The principal object of the soldier and sailor convention, however, is to elect eight delegates to the national convention of the World War Veterans' association, which is to be held in Minneapolis next fall. Every effort will be made, the leaders declare, to prevent injection of politics.

The principal objection the service men have raised to the measure is that it discriminates against the soldier who has been discharged and returned to work in the cities or towns. They say they are not in a position to sever their sources of income and go out on farms to live a long term of years in order to obtain title; that to do so would mean that they would be financially unable to prepare the land for the raising of crops and to meet the heavy water charges that would be levied against the property.

The objection service men seem to favor a substitute measure providing for loans and entitling soldiers and sailors to purchase the town or country property that they desire without the necessity of residence to acquire it.

Politics to Be Tabooed.

In face of these objections serious attention is being given to the matter because at the present time Idaho has a large delegation of citizens in Washington urging the passage of the Mondell bill. Aside from the four members of the congressional delegation, Governor D. W. Davis, ex-Governor Frank H. Gooding, Judge J. H. Richards and others have appeared before the public lands committee and urged passage of the act.

A strong effort will be made to keep politics out of the convention. Leaders among the service men realize, they say, that an effort would be made to use the convention for political purposes if that is possible, but they propose to prevent it.

That the organization of soldiers and sailors will prove to be a strong factor in influencing affairs in this state, if properly organized, is generally conceded.

Mr. Hazeltine served with companies M, I, L and K of the 54th infantry, sixth division, and carries with him a letter signed by every man in one of the companies asking that when the organization was sent into Germany Mr. Hazeltine be sent with them.

Mr. Hazeltine is now in Oberlin, Ohio where he was met by Mrs. Hazeltine, and both are attending the graduation of their daughter, Miss Lella, from Oberlin college.

HOTEL ELMORE IS SOLD

INVENTORS ARE STILL BUSY

Army, Air Service Has Many Devices Needing Perfection.

WASHINGTON, June 21.—Indestructible gasoline tanks, automatic cranks and portable hangars are a few of the airplane equipment devices which the army air service's engineering section is seeking to perfect. American inventors have been asked to assist.

The gasoline tank desired would withstand 75 salvo of 15 shots fired at a range of 20 yards, the ammunition consisting of service, tracer, incendiary and armor-piercing bullets, without fire resulting. A maximum weight limit of 75 per cent more than the ordinary tank has been fixed.

An automatic cranker, mounted on a truck and electrically driven, is under experiment. This instrument is designed to offset the great difficulties now experienced in starting the big bombing planes which are expected to be the type adopted in aerial commerce. A flexible arm is attached to the propeller, giving the twist necessary to start the cylinders to firing, and is then automatically disconnected.

Portable hangars of canvas, of the type now used, are very unsatisfactory, according to aviation officials. They are either too small for the purpose or are easily blown down by a moderate wind. The hangar sought would be large enough to hold big planes and would be capable of being solidly fixed when erected.

British Honor American.

DUBLIN, June 21.—At the funeral in Dublin of Lieutenant Kretner, an officer of American origin who had joined the British army and seen service with the royal air force, the coffin, instead of being borne on a gun carriage, as is customary at military funerals, rested upon one of the carriers used by the R.
