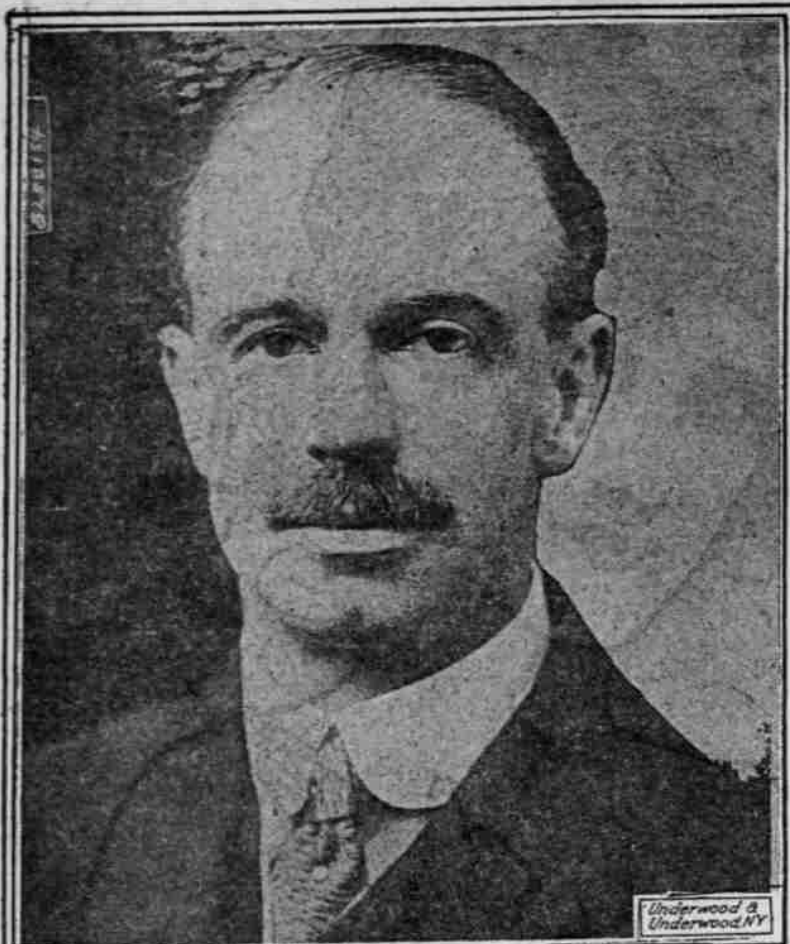




Sir Eric Drummond,
Appointed First Secretary of the League of Nations

NEWS OF WORLD AS SEEN BY CAMERA

PRESIDENT WILSON has nominated Sir Eric Drummond to be the first secretary-general of the league of nations. Sir Eric is 43 years of age and has been in the foreign office since 1900. He is a graduate of Eton, and the half-brother of the fifteenth earl of Perth. He visited America with the Balfour mission in 1917.

The Duchess of Roxburghe, formerly Miss May Goelet, who is a favorite of Queen Mary, is soon to visit her mother in this country. It is reported the duchess will arrange the social affairs for the visit to America of the Prince of Wales.

Danzig, situated about 150 miles from the Russian border, was important in the grain and wheat movement before the war, and is a great city. It will be

one of the chief ports of Poland, but is to be a free city under the conditions of the treaty of peace.

Twenty thousand soldiers of the 77th division passed in review from Washington square to 110th street, New York. General Alexander, who commanded the division overseas, was the reviewing officer.

Ralph De Palma won the international sweepstakes in the race at Sheephead bay speedway, driving his Packard. In the 50-mile race the world's speed record was broken before a crowd of 40,000 people.

to the cruiser St. Johns for information to reshape her course.

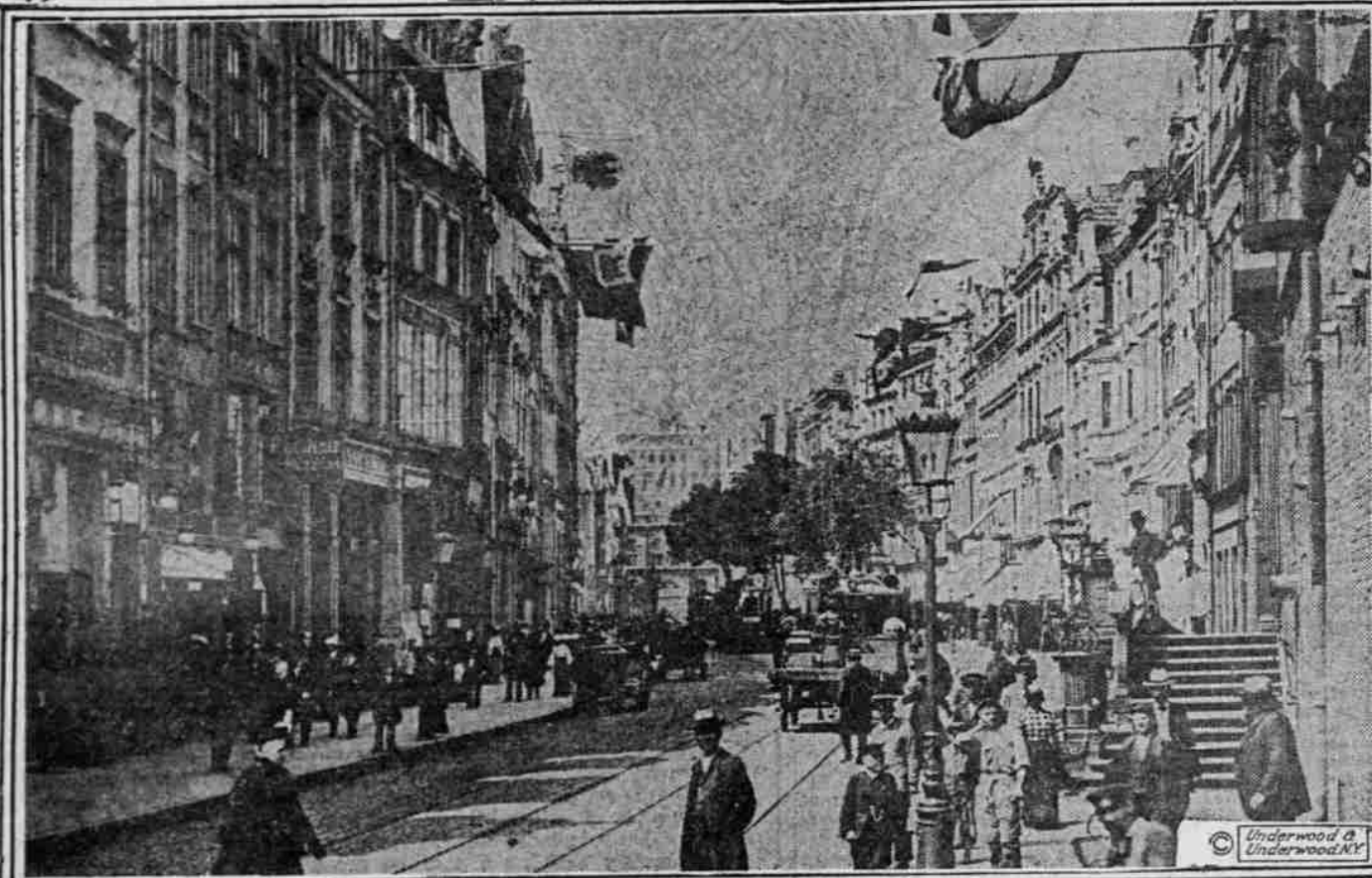
King Albert entertained President Wilson at the royal palace, Brussels, during his stay in the land that suffered so severely under invasion of the German armies.

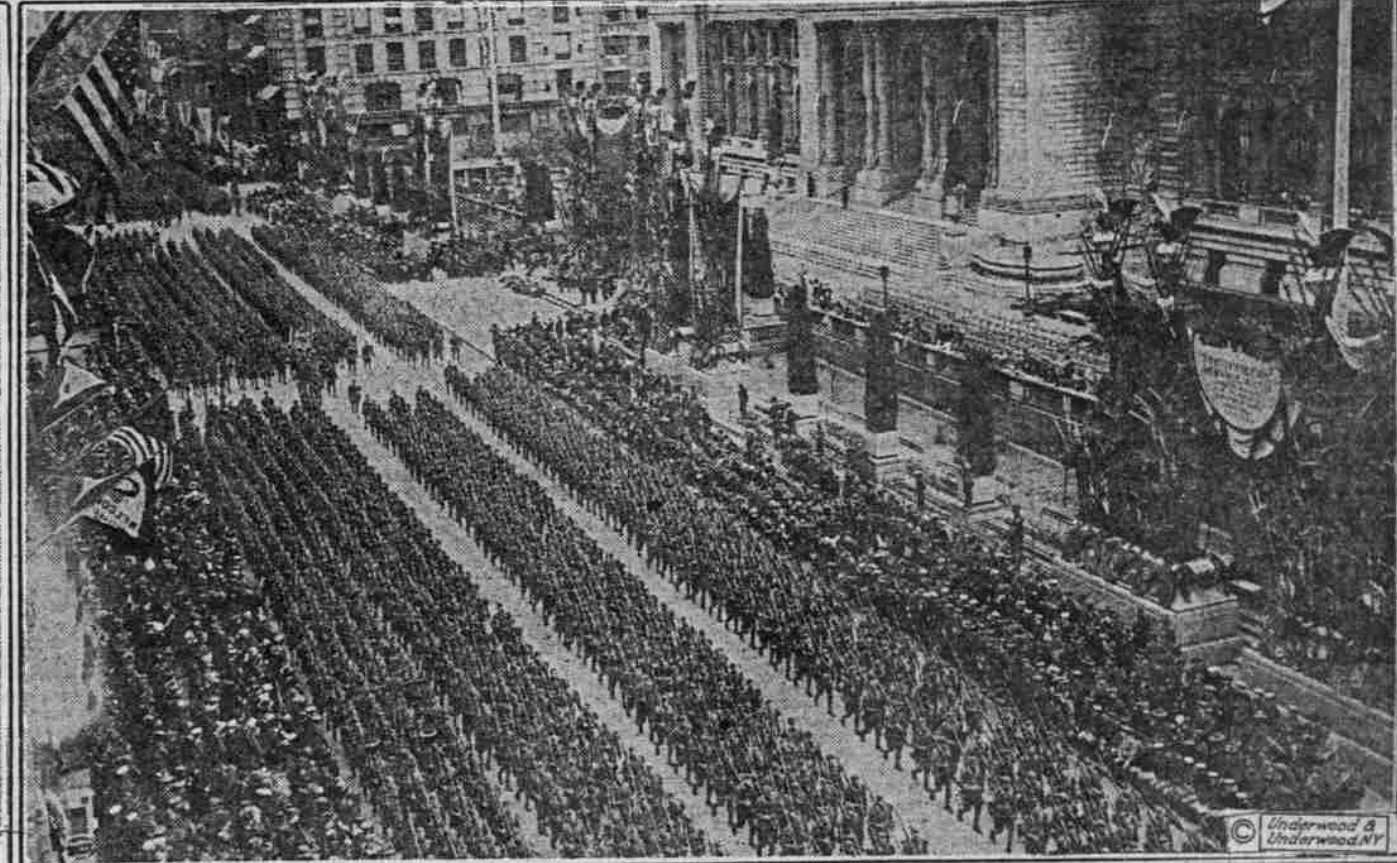

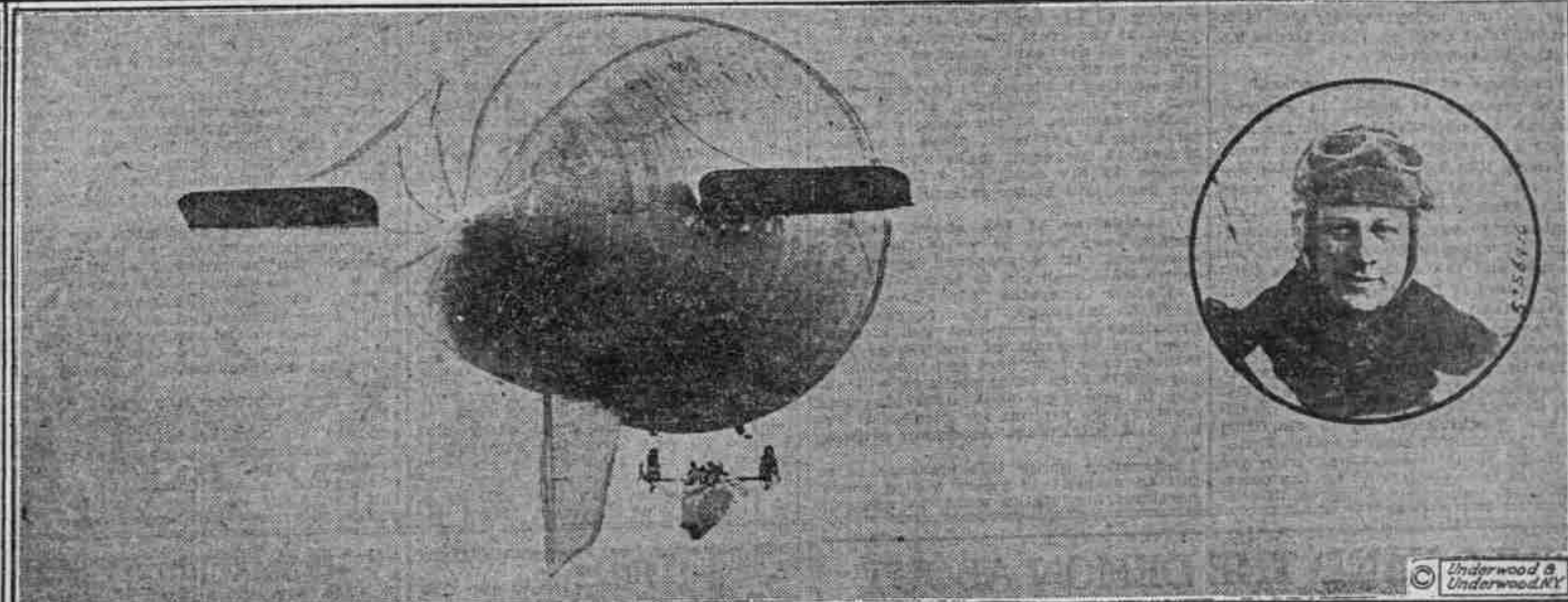

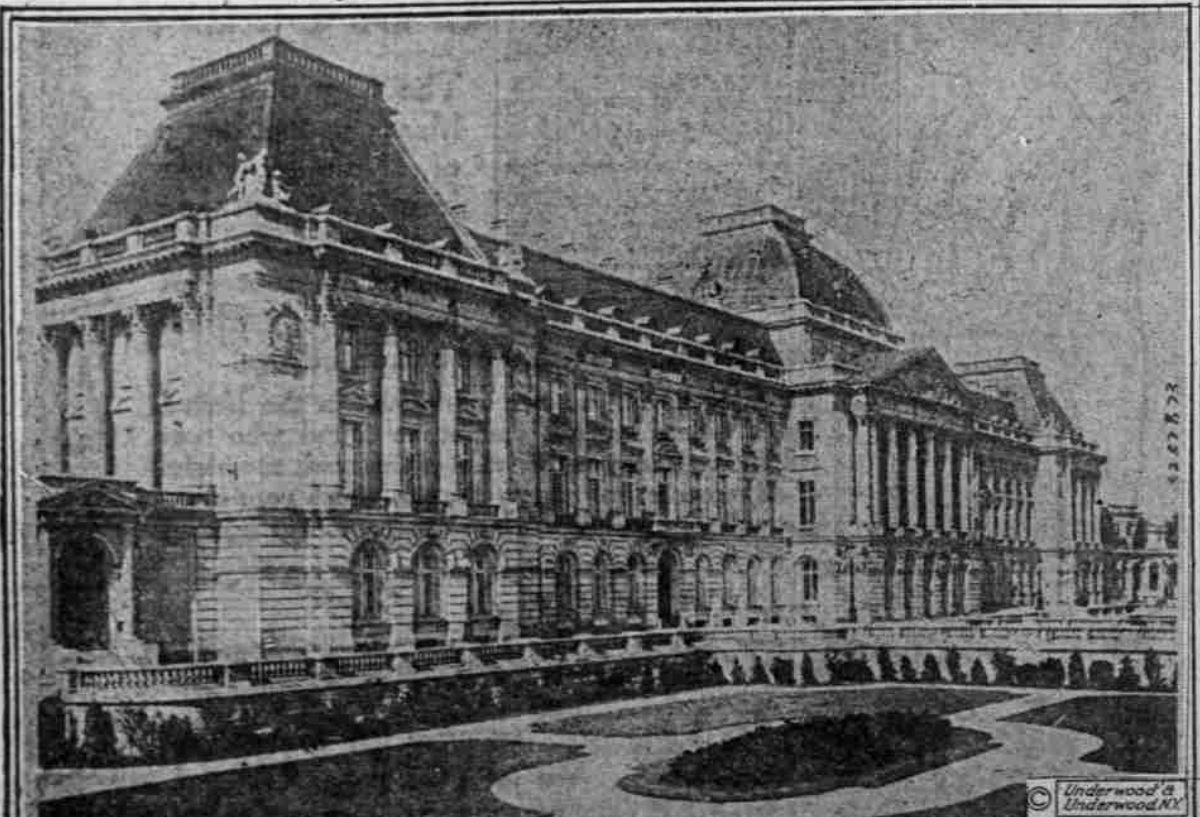
