

MAN'S FIANCEE GIVES UP WITH BODY

Harry S. New Admits Murder Near Los Angeles.

SAYS HE'S SENATOR'S SON

Indiana Son, Claimed as Father, Refuses to Comment on Matter in Any Way.

LOS ANGELES, July 5.—"I killed her because I loved her and she wouldn't marry me as she promised. I love her still, and am ready to die for my act because I want to go to her."

Lying on a cot in the city jail here tonight Harry S. New of Glendale, who said he was the son of the divorced wife of Indiana Senator Harry S. New of Indiana, thus concluded a detailed description of the murder of Miss Frieda Lesser, his fiancée, which he admitted he committed at a lonely spot in Topanga canyon, about 25 miles northwest of here, early this morning.

New walked into police headquarters at 2:30 this morning and said there was a dead woman in his automobile and he desired to give himself up as a murderer. He then led the officer to a sedan type car outside the station, where the body of Frieda J. Lesser, 21 years old, was propped in the rear seat.

Later, when New was told comment on his story of relationship had been refused, he amplified it by saying his mother, now Mrs. Lulu M. Burger, was the divorced wife of Senator New, a had separated from him about 15 years ago, before he attained prominence. His sister, who gave her name as Edna Clancy New and her age as 25, visited him at the jail, and according to the police, verified his statement.

New's early statement of the affair was reduced to writing and he read it over and signed it in a legible hand without tremor. He said he would not employ attorneys or make a defense. He said he was willing to let the law take its course.

"I have nothing to live for now," was his conclusion.

WASHINGTON, July 5.—Senator New issued a statement tonight denying he and Mrs. Burger ever were married or divorced.

INDIANAPOLIS, July 5.—Mrs. Lulu Burger, mother of Harry S. New, who today surrendered to the Los Angeles police as the murderer of Miss Frieda Lesser, left Indianapolis early this evening for her home in Glendale, Cal. Mrs. Burger, who is the divorced wife of Senator Harry S. New of Indiana and that she was divorced from Senator New about 15 years ago, Mrs. Burger also said she expected to visit Senator New and solicit his aid in behalf of her son.

WIVES OF CLERGY LAUDED

Notable Tribute Paid to Women at Toronto Synod.

TORONTO, Ont.—That the high cost of living was "murdering" clergymen's wives" by causing their premature breakdown because of their inability to engage assistance in their work, was a strong statement made at the Toronto Anglican synod.

The high cost of living issue became a feature topic when Archbishop Warren moved the adoption of the report of the synod's mission committee in a declaration by Bishop Sweney, who, rebelling in the surprise of the episcopate, declared that there was no class of people so splendidly heroic as the wives of the clergy of this great diocese of Toronto, and that considering the many calls upon their time and strength, it is no wonder that so many are broken down.

Archbishop Warren declared that the committee had aimed at raising the minimum stipend to \$1000 a year. This is to be raised to \$1200 for the coming year with a view to a minimum of \$1500 next year. To do this will require a diocesan mission fund of \$25,000, of which \$1515 come over as a balance from 1918.

Archbishop Warren expressed the impossibility of a clergyman maintaining a family, especially if there were several children, and giving the best of his time to the church on \$1000 a year in the present high cost of living.

The delegates vied in extolling the self-sacrifice of the wives of clergymen, the climax being Bishop Sweney's personal tribute.

Y. M. C. A. IS CALLED 'IMKA'

Services Are Extended to Czechoslovakian Armies.

PARIS.—The Czechoslovakian name for the Y. M. C. A. is so lengthy that even the Czechoslovakians have discarded it for the brief name "Imka," their perfectly reasonable pronunciation of Y. M. C. A.

The canten and hut service that has been a feature of the Y. M. C. A. work with the allied armies in Europe is being rapidly extended to all parts of the new republic. Czechoslovakian troops with athletic directors and recreation leaders are already in operation along the border, where most of the Czech troops are now.

When the Czechoslovakian republic was formed Czechs who had been fighting in the French army returned home with the request the "Imka" should be allowed to come, too.

Unsettled conditions along the disputed border line make the country one of the most dangerous territories in which the "Y" exists today. The people have admirable culture and are said to hold the world's record for literacy—only 1 per cent being unable to read and write. They have a native school of music and a national opera, which though closed during the war is now giving a grand season of works by native composers.

The Czech-Slovakian army is full of musicians, many of whom, the "Y" secretaries of Mersey and Europe, and American capitalists, and all the soldiers can sing.

BOY ESCAPES GERMANS

Baby Lost in France Reaches American Home.

NEW YORK.—Through the friendly interest of Jacques Langman, an exporter, living at 278 Nostrand avenue, Brooklyn, Mr. and Mrs. Natchiz of 25 St. Mark's place were united with their 3-year-old boy, Albert Natchiz, whom they had long believed had been killed by the Germans. The boy, who had been separated from his parents since he was eight months old, having been with a nurse in that part of France held by the Germans from the early days of the war, was brought back by

PALMER POLICY ASSAILED

Attorney-General Declared to Be the Friend of Dye Magnates.

WASHINGTON, D. C.—A new attack on Attorney-General Palmer was made in the house by Representative Moore of Pennsylvania, republican, during consideration of an appropriation of \$1,400,000 for the suppression of an archaic disorder.

Mr. Moore took exception to the organization of the chemical foundation by Mr. Palmer when custodian of alien property. He declared that by means of this organization financiers, including Otto Bannard and Cleveland H. Dodge, favored by Mr. Palmer, had obtained a grip on the American dye industry through the seizure of the German dye patents. He said 4500 patents had been seized.

Mr. Moore's outburst followed a statement by Byrns of Tennessee, democratic member of the appropriations committee, that Mr. Palmer had told the committee that Francis P. Garvan, former assistant district attorney of New York and the attorney-general's successor as alien property custodian and president of the Chemical Founda-

tion, had consented to act as assistant attorney-general to aid in the crusade against anarchy.

"How are we ever going to apprehend these bomb throwers?" asked Mr. Moore. "The government was appropriated a million dollars last year to catch them, and are now asked for an appropriation of \$1,400,000 to catch them. If Mr. Palmer's policy is to be continued, that work, devotes a large part of this time to writing sensational magazine and newspaper articles concerning the brilliant activities of his service, and if Mr. Garvan, who is at present alien property custodian, is also president of the Chemical Foundation, Inc., capitalized at \$200,000 for the purpose of engaging in the manufacture of dyestuffs in the United States?"

WELDING SOCIETY FORMED

Organization Effected Through War Committees.

BOSTON.—The American Machinist has placed before its readers the plan adopted for forming the American Welding society, a national organization intended to be a disinterested and dependable source of information on welding, not only for the benefit of the manufacturers of welding equipment, but also to aid those who use welding in their production or who purchase welded goods.

This society will merge the welding committee of the Emergency Fleet corporation and the National Welding

council, and will include others who may be interested. It will give greater stability to welding by standardizing welding processes, and thus make its economies available in a wider field of industry.

The new organization will deal with all the various welding processes—forge welding, electric resistance welding, including spot welding, electric arc welding, gas welding, thermite welding, etc.

The society will be governed by a board of 24 directors and the usual officers, and its principal work will be done through a committee to be known as the American Bureau of Welding, which will be made up of the above-mentioned individuals and one representative from each of the following scientific societies and government departments: American Bureau of Shipping, American Chemical society, American Engineering Standards committee, American Institute of Electrical Engineers, American Institute of Mining Engineers, American Physical society, American Railway association, American Society of Civil Engineers,

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A PATCHED GARMENT

Or a New One?

"No man putteth a piece of new cloth into an old garment, for that which is new will take from the old, and the rent is made worse. Neither do men put new wine into old bottles; else the bottles break, and the wine is spilled, and the bottles are made of straw."

By this striking analogy our Lord made plain the significant fact that the Gospel He taught was something new, in the sense of reformation and independent enactment. True, the Gospel itself was no novel system, then first created; for the Gospel is eternal, and so far as the human race is concerned, was introduced to earth through revelation to Adam. See Pearl of Great Price, p. 35; and an earlier article of this series entitled "Antiquity of the Gospel."

Christ's message of salvation was bitterly and relentlessly opposed by Judaism, which held to the Law, and while proclaiming the ever coming Messiah, crucified the Messiah who had come.

Half-converted Jews tried to reconcile the living Gospel with the dead letter of the Law. Pagan priests sought to enslave the followers of Christ into an unnatural union with heathendom. The assured failure of such an adulterate combination was forcefully expressed by Jesus Christ in the parabolic comparison cited above. The Gospel had come as a new revelation, through the greatest of revelators, the Lord Himself.

Attempts to patch the threadbare robe of Judaism with the new fabric of the Gospel could result in nothing more sightly than a hideous rent. The new wine of the covenant could not be bottled up in the time-rotten, leather containers of Mosaic libations. Judaism was belittled and Christianity nevered by the incongruous association.

The Law of Moses was at once fulfilled and abrogated by the Gospel of Jesus Christ; albeit no jot or tittle of requirement as to morality and righteousness embraced in the former is lacking from the latter.

When the risen and glorified Christ appeared in Person to the sheep of the Western fold, He declared "that old things had passed away, and that all things had become new."

The Nephites, who had persisted in observance of the essentials of the Law, were perplexed, and the Lord proclaimed the truth in plainness, affirming His antemortal Godship as Jehovah who had given the Law, and His Messiahship as Jesus Christ, who, through mortality and death, had accomplished its fulfillment. Note His explicit affirmation:

"Behold, I say unto you, that the law is fulfilled that was given unto Moses. Behold, I say unto you, that the law is fulfilled; therefore, the law in me is fulfilled; therefore, I have come to fulfill the law; therefore, I have an end." (See Book of Mormon, 3 Nephi 15:4-8).

And so in these last days, when a restoration of the Gospel and a re-establishment of the Church of Jesus Christ became necessary, through the world-wide apostasy, the new dispensation from the heavens was made definite and independent. It was no patching up of man-made systems, the best of which deteriorate with time, but the Lord to establish His righteousness, but every man walketh in his own way, and after the image of his own God, whose image is in the likeness of the world, and whose substance is that of an idol." (Doctrine & Covenants 1:16, 18).

Some applicants for membership in the Church cited their earlier baptism into the several sects to which they had belonged—baptisms by sprinkling, by pouring, or even by immersion—and asked admittance to the new ceremony. The distinction between the ceremonies of men and the ordinances of God appears in a Divine revelation relating to this question, given in April, 1820:

"Behold, I say unto you, that all old covenants have I caused to be done away in this time, and this is a new and an everlasting covenant, even that which was from the beginning. Wherefore, although a man should be baptized a hundred times, it availeth him nothing; for you cannot enter at the straight gate by the law of Moses, neither by the law of the Gentiles, nor by the law of men, but by the law of the Father, who is the Father of our dead who have caused this last covenant and this Church to be built up unto me, even as in days of old. Wherefore, enter ye in at the gate, as I have commanded, and seek not to counsel your God. Amen." (Doctrine & Covenants 23).
